#### Labor and Factory Statistics

The twenty third Annual Report of the Bureau of Labor and Industrial Michigan is out and this office is in. receipt of a copy through courtesy of City, Charlevoix, East Jordan West Hon. Malcolm J. McLeod, Com'r of Side, and Boyne Falls. Labor.

Charlevolx County industries were inspected during the months of septs for pencils. ember and October, 1905, by W. S. Tucker, Dep'ty Ins., of Big Rapids. Eleven factories were inspected at East Jordan, 255 persons being employed in these, 12 employed on public work, with an average daily wage of \$1,65. The inspector considers the ndastrial outlook (for East Jordan) good with condition better than a

year previous. includes a review of the Canning industry in this district, and in view of the fact that East Jordan citizens are endeavoring to interest parties along this line, we herewith give an extract concerning same:-

#### Immense Canning Industry.

I wish to say a few words regarding the many good canning factories in this district. We claim to have the largest and best factories of this class in the United States. A factory at Fremont, Newaygo County, has canned the peas from 1,000 acres of bushels of peaches, apples and smaller county, is one of the best canning factories in the state. It is under the management of J. Mikesell & Company. It makes a specialty of preserves, also canning all kinds of They have berries and vegetables. this season put up 27,800 cases of different kinds of fruit, and have paid the farmers in and near Shelby approximately \$20,000. At the village of Hart, Oceana county, is located the largest canning factory in the United States. They employ about 350 men and women, and some boys . They pay their wage earners about \$36,000 anqually and their raw product costs them about \$200,000 - They have canned this season 5.000.000 cans of peas, grown on about 2,000 acres of land, besides putting up 1000,000 cans of corn. In addition to this they have canned thousands of bushels of peaches, apples and small fruits, and have used two carloads of labels for cans this season. At Pentwater, Oceana county, Sears & Nichols are extensively engaged in canning fruits and vegetables. Their output has been about 2.000,000 cans this year and they pay annually several thousand dollars for labor and product. Traverse City, Petoskey, Elk Rapids, Central Lake and Arcadia also have very good canning factories.



Used Indian Labor.

While Mother Katherine's benefactions have always been liberal, it is pian to let the Indians do the work by non-to-lef the Indians do the work whenever possible, in the construction of buildings and work of a similar character. When the Sacred Heart school burned five years ago, and was rebuilt Pottawatomie and Kickapoo Indians made the brick for the new light and the state of the work. structure, and did much of the work towards its construction, working, of course, under the direction of a white contractor. Much of the maintenance of this school, which is claimed to be of this school, which is challed to be the oldest west of the Mississippi river, is borne by Mother Katherine, and it was by her visits to this school that she discovered Albert Negahnquet, the fullblood Pottawatomie boy educated by her, and who is now the only fullblood Indian Catholic priest in the world. After his graduation at Sacred Heart, she paid his expenses through Carlisle and the Catholic university at Washington, finally finishing his edu-cation at Rome, from whence he returned only two years ago, to take up his work among his own people.

TEN MILLION DOLLARS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF GIGANTIC "CONSTITUTION."

More Destructive and Terrible than the new Floating Clant, the English "Dreadnaught"—Old "Constitution

One hundred thousand dollars for the preservation of the old frigate Constitution, and \$10,000,000 for the construction of a huge new battleship of the same name are two provisions be included in the naval appropriation bill. The new Constitution is to be the

most powerful ship of war atlent. She will excel the British Dreadnaught recently launched by King Edward by as much as the Dreadnaught-will excel anything affoat when she is com-pleted. Her authorization may be said to be directly the result of Togo's the British naval attache on board l'ogo's flagship who hurried home after that battle and warned the Admiralty of the needs of the British navy, and this brought about the con-struction of the Dreadnaught. Now we are to follow and eclipse the British naval wonder.

The Navy Department has secured full information concerning the plans of the Dreadmaught, and the arrangement of her powerful armament, so that it is known exactly what umst be done to beat her.

In order that the department not be himpered in any way in deter-mining upon the plans of the new Con-stitution the forthcoming bill will provide that the Secretary of the Navy may use the contingent fund to secure information from ship-builders the world over, if he so desires, before finally accepting the design of tenmillion-dollar pacifier.

The Dreadnaught is planned to carry ten 12 inch rifles. The Michigan and South Carolina are to carry eight 12 inch guns. The Dreadnaught will be able to concentrate six guns for bow or stern fire, with eight on either broadside, while the American ships can use four guns dead ahead or dead astern, and all eight ahead or estern on a quartering fire, with all eight on either broadside. So that in point of fire they are nearly as efficient as the Dreadmught, which excels materially only in the single point of speed. To counterbalance his the American ships have the decided advantage in armor protection.

The Advantage of Guns.
The Constitution will have as high pieed as the Dreadnaught, and the louble advantage over the British hip of greater gun power and more hip of greater gun power and more complete armor protection. She will be more able to inflict blows and better able to withstand them. She will carry twelve 12-inch rifles, so arranged that she can concentrate eight of them in firing dead ahead or dead astern, or off the bow or quarter, and ten on either broadside.
