Police Find Boy With Knives Near School

State Reduces Seniors' **Funding**

CHARLEVOIX - The Charlevoix County Commission on Aging board learned of cutbacks from the state of Michigan's Office of Services to the Aging at a board meeting on Monday, Nov. 30.

The state office has an overall reduction of nearly 14 percent and expects a sharp curtail in services. But, David Emmel, interim director for the Commission on Aging in Charlevoix County, said that the county's senior millage would soften the blow.

"Our COA is mostly funded by a millage, so it won't be affected by state and federal cuts so much? Emmel said. "It will have minimal impact."

The state's Office of Services to the Aging funds the Area Agency on Aging

assistance of a sheriff's deputy. The police found two more knives on him. East Jordan Police Chief, Dan Reece, commended Officer Payton for

his quick action in keeping the schools East Jordan Public Schools super-

intendent, Chip Hansen, said the schools went into a "lock down" at the request of the police. All doors were locked at approximately 8:15 a.m., but were reopened just before 8:30 a.m., following the police taking the boy into custody.

Superintendent Hansen applauded the school staff for their reaction to the incident.

"This morning's incident was a type of situation that we had planned and trained for and our staff did an excellent job." Hansen thanked the city's police department and the sheriff's office for the swift response.

The 15-year-old was taken to the Charlevoix County Probate Court offices. His name is being withheld because he is a minor.





Three-Fold Increase in Traffic by Second Week of Operation

What began as a seed of an idea this past August is now a reality, and quickly gaining momentum as the number of recipients visiting the new Boyne Valley Food Pantry has increased three-fold since the facility opened on November 19th.

"This came together very fast," states Pastor Wayne McKenney of the Boyne Falls United Methodist Church. "Penny Massey originally came up with the idea of starting a food pantry, our congregation joined in, and soon after St. Augustine Church became involved."

Pastor McKenney adds, "We feel this is much needed in this area, especially right now when there are so many people falling through the cracks, particularly those who are underemployed and suddenly find themselves unable to cover their basic food costs."

The Boyne Valley Food Pantry receives donations for area churches, businesses and individuals in both nonperishable food items as well as money that is utilized to purchase food items and supplies through the Manna Project in Petoskey.

"We currently do not have specific qualifications for individuals using the pantry," notes Bill Cousineau, who also spearheads the Food Pantry project. "If someone doesn't have the money to buy their food and they live in the Charlevoix County area, they are welcome at our pantry."

So far, most of the recipients visiting the pantry reside in the west side of , the county, primarily in the Boyne Valley area. As the program grows, additional guidelines may be established for utilizing the pantry.

Boyne Valley Food Pantry hours are Thursdays from 2 pm until 5 pm. The exception is they will be open on Wednesdays instead of Thursdays the week Christmas and New Years.

THAT'S OUR CHRISTMAS TREE!

Choosing, and Caring for, that Special Tannenbaum

"O Christmas Tree, O Christmas Tree, Your branches green delight us."

So begins one of the Christmas seasons most treasured carols. Yet with so many tree species to choose from, and so many needles to sweep off the floor, how can the fearless Christmas tree hunter and gatherer be sure the enduring holiday symbol that graces their abode will indeed offer delight throughout the yuletide season?

"First of all," notes Keith Martell of Martell's Northwoods Tree Farm in Gaylord, "when shopping for a tree, be sure to ask when it was cut. Many of the Christmas trees sold in lots were cut as long ago as October, so they are almost two months old already. So it's no wonder people get disappointed when needles begin to fall off as soon as they get the tree home. Our trees are definitely fresh cut...we've been told by some customers that our trees actually sprout new growth after being placed in the stand!"

Ah, freshness, like when

selecting produce, is the first consideration. Yet if unsure about a tree's freshness, there is a simple trick to help optimize the trees ability to draw water after it's been placed in tree stand.

"When you get the tree home, if it's not fresh-cut," Keith observes, "saw about one-half inch off base. That reopens the pores so the tree can draw water freely. The tree should use over a gallon of water the first day. And never let a tree run low on water. A fresh cut tree will last for at least a month if kept hydrated."

What about species?

Among the most popular species are Frasier Fir, Balsam Fir, Douglas Fir, Blue Spruce Norway Spruce, Scotch Pine, Eastern White Pine and Concolor. Generally speaking, Firs tend to retain their needles best, Spruces have stiffer branches (especially good for heavy, homemade ornaments), Scotch Pine has good needle retention and sturdy branches (though the nee-

dles are sharp) and Concolor hold needles well and have a slight, citrus odor, which is refreshingly unique.

"We find the more popular choices tend to be Frasier Fir, Blue Spruce and Concolor," states Debbie from Marvin's Gardens in Charlevoix. "The Concolor has longer needles that retain well. Fraser Firs also hold needles well, and the trees are usually a little skinnier, with a long tall look."

Debbie adds, "Blue spruce is one of the most popular. People like the color and it has shorter needles that are a little picky. It has a very traditional Christmas tree look. They do tend to drop their needles a little quicker. Scotch pine is the most economical tree. They tend to be dyed by the tree farm as they naturally get a brown hue to them in the fall as they go into dormancy."

"Another option is a live tree," notes Betsy Berry of Twigs & Blooms in Gaylord. "That way you have something left after the season. The limit, however, is about two days in the house or it will go dormant. After being inside, it's important to slowly bring the tree back

out to the cold by keeping it in the garage for a few days. You should have the hole dug and covered before the ground freezes so you can plant it."

Dave Gearhart, of North Star Trees, Inc. in Wolverine, advises that even a fresh cut tree should not always be brought indoors too hastily.

"If you pick a tree when it is very cold, it's a good idea to let it set in the garage for several hours so it thaws." He adds, "It can be easier getting the tree into the house while it is still baled, set it in the stand, and then cut the baling rope. Also, keep the tree away from heat registers and other heat sources. Wood heat and spaced heaters are especially damaging to a tree because it's a drying heat A humidifier is a good idea to put moisture back

into the air."

Above all, buy a tree from a reputable merchant and don't hesitate to ask questions regarding tree selection and care. Finding "that special tree" should be an exciting adventure, and as Charlie Brown demonstrates year after year...each Christmas tree has its own special character.

"Regardless of the species," observes Dave Gearhart, "my favorite tree is one that looks good."


EAST JORDAN — City EMS director, Jay Peck, is a patient man. Since 1997, when he joined the ambulance service, the department has not had adequate housing for its equipment, vehicles and personnel. Currently, part of the department occupies about 3,200-square-feet at Lake Street Center.

Peck found out that the ambulance department could all be situated in one spot if the department buys approximately 8,000-square-feet at the same location.

Peck appeared before city commissioners on Tuesday, Dec. 1, to review the plans for additional space. He asked for a letter of intent from the commission that he could give to builder Floyd Wright who would design and construct the space.

But, several commissioners asked Peck to present the commission with a detailed accounting of expenses and revenue, and the source of the revenue. The estimate for the project is \$333,320. Peck will work on the request and present it to the commission. He said he contacted the rural development arm of government and was told it was likely that a low-interest loan would be approved for the project.

East Jordan EMS will end the year

with approximately 1,200 calls for EMT and ambulance services. The department has a Paramedic ECHO unit, four transporting vehicles and an ATV. It employs four people, Peck and two full-time paramedics and a part-time billing clerk. More than 20

The new space would have an office, three bedrooms for on-call EMTs, an exercise room, a stock room and an expanded garage

HOLIDAYS ARE HARD ON THOSE WHO'VE EXPERIENCED TRAGEDY

QUESTION: My husband and I struggle around the holidays. Everywhere we look we see images of happy children. We love kids, but we lost our young son several years ago and it's sometimes hard to manage our emotions. Do you have any insight?

DR. DOBSON: I am so sorry for your loss. There are many others who have experienced similar tragedies. For you and the others who have lost a precious child, the entire month of December is filled with its own peculiar variety of sorrow. Cherubic faces and toys and televised cartoons only serve to intensify indescribable longings.

Hearing of your predicament, I'm reminded of a letter I received years ago from a man who has reason to understand this period of vulnerability. His words, written to the memory of his daughter, revealed a father's broken heart of love. But the note also contained a certain sense of triumph and blessing. Apparently his little girl had suffered from an extended illness and together they had endured a long season of sorrow. He wrote, "Bristol, now you are free! I look forward to that day, according to God's promises, when we will be joined together, completely whole and full of joy. I'm so happy that you have your crown first."

To this father I would say, "Thank you, sir, for sharing this most intimate note to your precious daughter. It made us feel that we have walked a few steps down the lonely road you have trod. Your indomitable spirit will strengthen and inspire others who harbor their own private sorrow during this season of celebration. There are millions who would identify with your travail, I'm sure."

Because of what we celebrate at Christmas and later, Easter, death has no permanent victory over those who believe. The grave has lost its sting. The trials and tribulations of this life are but momentary setbacks in light of an eternity of joy and bliss. This is the true meaning of the season, and I pray that despite the unavoidable sadness of this broken world, that assurance might provide you with some measure of comfort.

(is consolidation a smart move?)

Dear Dave,

I've got my beginner's emergency. fund in place, and I'm close to wiping out my consumer loan debt. I still have

about \$32,000 in debt from six different government-insured student loans, but they're in deferment at the moment. I was wondering if I should try to consolidate them.

Well, you get to consolidate these one time. After that, you're stuck. So, you'll want to make sure that the net interest rate you get through consolidation is lower than your current rate. Also, make sure the interest rate is fixed. You don't want to jump through hoops to make this deal happen, and end up with an interest rate that's equal to or higher than the one you had before!

Student loans are the only things I'll tell people to consolidate. They're a little different animal than ongoing loans and other kinds of credit. Chances are you're not addicted to going to class, so you probably won't go out and ring up more student loans after you've finished your education and paid off these things.

Just maintain that gazelle intensity, keep working hard to get out of debt, and pay these things off early. Remember, too, that in lots of cases consolidating student loans will move them out of deferral. There's a good chance you'll have to start making payments right away!

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

struction, water, sewer, storm sewer work or tree trimming, for instance.

Cain reported that the city facilities study is undergoing research by the city staff. The city is considering moving some of the departments, such as the fire department, to another location off of the waterfront. The staff will present a recommendation to commissioners within the next 60 days, Cain said.

Commissioner Mike Cummings said citizens have expressed to him that the Main Street Program/DDA should be located within City Hall. He asked that the city staff review the possibility of moving the Main Street/DDA office to a conference room that is not being used in City Hall.

"It would save \$4,000 to \$5,000 a year," Cummings said. "We want to bring it in, the city residents want to come into one central place. We want this to be a community; we don't want two separate entities."

Cain said the concept is being reviewed and discussed at facilities study meetings.

that, in turn, allocates funds to the COA and that is where the COA will see a drop in funding. However, the COA is still slated to receive \$77,000 in 2010 for its congregate and home delivered meals program. It received \$80,000 in 2009.

The COA continues to hold more than \$2 million in a savings-investment account, but Emmel said that would not be used to make up for cutbacks. He did not know what the board planned to do with the millage funds in the account.

The reductions in the proposed 2010 state budget will impact services such as personal care and medication management. Nutrition services that include both congregate and home delivered meals will be affected, as will respite care.

In other business, Emmel reported to the board that the COA has received 13 applications in response to the advertisement for a COA director. The County Board of Commissioners has requested that the COA pare the number of applicants down to four or five for them to interview.

The board continues its work on revising the COA bylaws that the board of county commissioners will review for approval.


The 2009 Michigan High School Volleyball Coaches Association All-State roster includes two players from Charlevoix and one from Boyne City.







Lake Michigan Conference All-League football team announced



Muzzleloader season opens next week

Deer harvest should be up unusually mild firearm season; archery season also reopens this week

The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters that muzzleloading deer season opens Friday, Dec. 4, in Zone 1 (the Upper Peninsula) and Zone 3 (southern Michigan).

The season runs for 10 days in the U.P. and 17 days in southern Michigan. Firearms licenses, combination licenses and antierless-only licenses are valid throughout muzzleloading season. Hunters may use archery gear or crossbows during muzzleloading season.

Muzzleloader season opens Dec. 11 in Zone 2 (northern Lower Peninsula) and runs for 10 days.

"With the unseasonably warm weather during much of

the firearms season and with more standing corn than is typical for this time of year, there may be a lot of deer out there that haven't shown themselves to hunters yet," said DNR deer research specialist Brent Rudolph.

"We'd like to remind hunters that this is an excellent opportunity to fill any unused antlerless deer tags and we'd particularly encourage hunters in southern Michigan to do

Hunters also are reminded that archery deer season is open Dec.1- Jan. 1. Deer hunters may not use crossbows, except in Zone 3, unless there is a firearm deer season

The muzzleloader season for the northern Lower Peninsula opens Dec. 11 and extends for 10 days

Grouse season reopens this week

Grouse and pheasant season runs through Jan. 1 with limit of five per day, 10 in possession


The Department of Natural Resources reminds small-game hunters that the season on ruffed grouse and pheasant reopened on Tuesday of this week and runs through Jan. 1.

Grouse season is open statewide with a limit of five per day, 10 in possession, in the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula (Zones 1 and 2) and a limit of three per day, six in possession in southern Michigan (Zone 3).

Pheasant hunting resumes across much of southern Michigan, east of US-131 and south of M-20 and US-10. Check the 2009 Michigan Hunting and Trapping Guide for exact boundaries. The limit is two roosters daily, four in possession.

"Bird hunters often find opportunity in the late season in areas that were too wet earlier in the year, but can be accessed in December because the standing water is frozen," explained DNR upland game bird biologist Al Stewart. "Hunters who concentrate in high-quality habitat should still be able to find birds."

Hunters must have a valid small game license.

Old Dogs Celebrates Faithful Friendships

Great Cast, Good Laughs, Comfortable Story

Author Bonnie Wilcox once proclaimed in her book, "Old Dogs, Old Friends," that "Old dogs, like old shoes, are comfortable."

That's a fair observation of the film, *Old Dogs*, as well. It's the story of two aging friends and business partners, Charlie and Dan, (John Travolta and Robin Williams) who are on the verge of culminating one of the biggest sales contracts of their 30 year business venture. These are classic "old dogs;" single, wealthy, set in their ways, and about to be introduced to a few "new tricks."

It seems that seven years ago, Dan had a brief fling (and even briefer marriage) with a woman named Vicki (played by Kelly Preston, Travolta's "real life" wife) and unbeknown to Dan, their interlude resulted in a pair of fraternal twins.

Seven years later, pending a short stay at the local jailhouse for staging an environmental protest, Vicki decides to introduce Dan to





his offspring, and he winds up caring for them for a couple of weeks. The ensuing juggle of taking care of the children, while trying to wrap up the big business deal, results in some hilarious moments.

Yeah...it's definitely a storyline that owes it's reality to the imagination of Hollywood script writers. There are plenty of "what the heck" and a few "ya gotta be kidding" moments in *Old Dogs*, but there are also plenty of genuine laughs, tremendous star power, and a good old-fashion dose of comfort by the time the credits roll at the end of the films slightly less than 90 minute run.

In addition to a respectable comedic chemistry between Travolta and Williams, *Old Dog's* cast in-

cludes the late Bernie Mac (this was his final film appearance), Matt Dillon, Ann-Margaret and Seth Green. So there are a host of comfortable faces on screen as the film moves along.

Old Dogs is rated PG, apparently for some questionably rude humor, but this is a film that should be safe for the whole family to see.

Not surprisingly, *Old Dogs* hasn't received much in the way of critical praise, but it really isn't intended for high brow review. Like Bonnie Wilcox's old dog, this is simply a comfortable film about lifelong friends sticking together, providing the audience with a few good hearty laughs along the way.






