

Snowmobile Trail Built by Residents

ELLSWORTH — A new snowmobile trail is ready for recreation following the village community pitching in and creating the trail in just three days.

"You can't imagine how many people turned out to build the trail, it was the whole community," said Phil Palajac, who, along with his wife Marci, owns The House on the Hill bed and breakfast.

D.A.R.E. Reviewed by Commission EAST JORDAN

A nationwide program that educates young students about the harmful effects that drugs, smoking and drinking have on lives was a topic of discussion by city commissioners on Dec. 1.

D.A.R.E. is an acronym for

the city police department. An officer is assigned as the D.A.R.E. officer.

City commissioner Ray Fisher and Mayor Russ Peck voiced support for the program. Commissioners Deneille Moes and Jane Booze questioned the cost of the

program to the city. Moes said she personally did not added that she didn't think it was the city's responsibility to pay for an officer at the schools.

But, there is no budgeted line item cost to the city; it is simply the time of the D.A.R.E. officer, according to the city offices.

Police Chief Dan Reece said that the D.A.R.E. officer, Clyde Payton, is at the schools two times a week and that the police department's annual golf tournament raises the funds for all of the D.A.R.E. supplies for the program's students. Reece said there are other benefits to the program. "The kids have formed a bond with Officer Payton. It's very positive," Reece said. Scott Kelly who is the cofounder and executive director of BASES, or Bay Area Substance Education Services, spoke to the commissioners. Some of the steps that East Jordan can take to keep kids away from drugs and alcohol are to support a teen center, to teach healthy behavior and to educate parents as well as students. He spoke in favor of D.A.R.E. and said Boyne City and Charlevoix school districts use the program.

have the police know the kids," Kelly said. Charlevoix county and its school districts need to face the drug situation, he said.

"My goal is to see the end of denial in Charlevoix County," Kelly said.

East Jordan Public Schools has participated in the D.A.R.E. program for about 20 years, said Chip Hansen, superintendent of schools. It was initially administered by the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, but about two years ago the East Jordan Police Department took it over. "We've found the program to be beneficial," Hansen said.

Northern Michigan Ski Academy Season Starts Soon

> Northern Michigan Ski Academy race training sessions start Wednesday, January 6th at Boyne Mountain and Thursday, January 7th at Boyne Highlands. Training sessions take place from 6:30 to 8:30 PM on Wednesdays at Boyne Mountain and Thursdays at Boyne Highlands. A meeting for parents will take place at both locations during the first sessions.

This year the Northern Michigan Ski Academy (NMSA) is celebrating its' 31st anniversary. The NMSA is a non-profit organization that is run by a volunteer Board of Directors and Coaches. The program is designed to teach area youth the fundamentals of ski racing.

Training sessions are held for eight weeks beginning in January. During the Wednesday and Thursday night sessions, skiers ski in small groups with a NMSA coach. Skiers practice the fundamentals of ski racing with racers of their own age and capability. Friday nights are open gate nights only at Boyne Mountain with courses set that the skiers can run as they wish. Coaches are available at the top and bottom of the courses to provide feedback to the skiers.

Each Sunday, from 2:00 – 4:30 PM club races take place. Two of the Sundays will offer timed gate racing in which skiers ski against the clock and themselves. Six of the Sunday club races bring together the "Highlands" and

"Mountain" skiers for combined racing. Giant Slalom races are held at Boyne Highlands and Slalom races are held at Boyne Mountain. Racers are ranked for participation in the NMSA Racing Team that participates in the Northern Michigan Junior Ski Club Cup, which brings together skiers from across northern Michigan. The Northern Michigan Junior Ski Club Championship Cup will be held on Sunday, March 7th at Boyne Highlands.

The approximately two-mile trail, known as "Trail No. 4," starts in Ellsworth and ends on the corner of Detour Road and E. Slough Road. It is part of the East Jordan-Charlevoix trail. "We just connected the vil-

lage," Palajac said. The idea to build a trail started with a few people talking about it and support for it grew rapidly. Excavation equipment appeared when needed and with the number of people working on the trail, it didn't take long to finish it, he said.

The Palajacs and resident Fred Taylor gave easements across their properties and Jerry Rasmussen organized equipment and workers.

MDOT and CRAM remind motorists: "Don't Crowd the Plow!"

December 3, 2009 -- The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) and the County Road Association of Michigan (CRAM) today announced a joint-education effort aimed at urging motorists to remember good driving habits in winter weather conditions that will make the roadways safer. MDOT and CRAM will use the familiar safety slogan again this year, "Don't Crowd the Plow!"

"Road crews put their lives on the line every day to keep Michigan roads safe for everyone," said State Transportation Director Kirk T. Steudle. "Motorists must remember to drive with caution no matter how much salt we use or how often the roads area plowed."

A steady decrease in road funding and an increase in costs have caused state and local agencies to alter their winter maintenance plans. Drivers have been put on notice that plowing priorities and the use of less salt will make their job even more important than in years past. Road crews must have ample room in order to safely clear the many miles of roadway of snow and ice.

"Motorists must do their best to minimize distractions and focus on driving and changes in road conditions," John Niemela, CRAM director, said. "Every year, despite the flashing lights, poor driver behavior near snowplows leads to collisions that can be deadly."

MDOT and CRAM offer the following reminders for motorists: Snowplows have limited visibility and drivers cannot see di-

rectly behind their trucks; Snowplows often throw up snow clouds, reducing visibility on

all sides of the truck; Motorists should never attempt to pass a moving snowplow on


the right. With

new, wing-plow technology, the blade can clear the shoulder and the lane

of travel simultaneously. Motorists attempting an illegal pass through a snow cloud on the right and/or shoulder of the road most likely won't see the plow blade and run the risk of a serious crash; and

Always wear your safety belt and allow extra time to reach your destinations this winter.

Steudle added, "For the safety of everyone, motorists should use extreme caution when traveling in winter weather conditions. We can't emphasize this enough: Don't Crowd the Plow!"

BOYNE CITY COMMISSION Division Street construction plans move ahead

BOYNE CITY — The city commission reviewed the plans to reconstruct Division Street between Boyne Avenue and Pleasant Street at its Dec. 8 meeting, following a public comment meeting recently.

Larry Fox of c2ae, an engineering consulting firm, presented design plans drawn up after citizens. had made comments.

The estimated cost of reconstructing the one mile of Division Street is \$1.2 million. Federal and state funds will partially pay the cost because the street ties into M-75, a state highway.

City commissioners chose not to add bike lanes to the street. Commissioner Laura Sansom said she had talked with people who had other suggestions.

"The people I talked with said they would

rather have a bike lane by the sidewalk." Commissioner Ron Grunch agreed.

"I'm not really in favor of bike lanes on the road," he said. "I'd rather have bikes off the road."

Plans are to rebuild the two lanes to 12-foot wide state standards, with two-foot curb and gutter. The existing path alongside Division Street will be retained and new concrete sidewalks will be constructed where practical, Fox said.

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
In addition, the project includes road grade adjustments, paved driveways to the property lines, street lights installed at M-75, S. Lake Street and S. Park Street, and a new storm sewer the full length of the street.

The anticipated date of construction to Division Street is July 15 - October 15, 2010.


I can close my eyes today and relive the year my wife, two children and I boarded an airplane for

Everybody's Fine...Relatively Speaking

Film Presents a Stark, Emotional, Family Journey of Discovery



1: It wasn't so much what I thought about Everybody's Fine, the excellent remake of the Italian film Stanno Tutti Bene, it was how I felt as the final credits started to roll.

Everybody's Fine is a stark, highly emotional tale which follows Frank Goode, played by Robert De Niro, as he journeys across the country in an attempt to re-connect with his four children just a few months after the death of his wife. Despite his poor health, Frank acts upon an impromptu decision to make a surprise visit to each of his kids after a gathering planned at the family home failed to take place due to a myriad of last minute excuses from the children. Unfortunately, the surprises in store are for Frank.

With each stop he makes, in New York City, Chicago, Denver, and finally Las Vegas, he discovers that the reality he envisioned 1. 11 for his kids is in sharp contrast to the lives they actually lead.

Like many fathers of his generation, Frank spent his life working hard to provide the groundwork for his children to build "better lives" upon. Shielded over the years by their mother's protection, and his children's fear of disappointing their father's expectations, Frank now begins to see his adult



family as they truly are, and they in turn begin to rediscover him.

The acting is superb. De Niro has always had an uncanny ability to realistically portray believable characters reflecting whatever American demographic he happens to actually be in. The aging, middle-class widower Frank Goode hits home as he struggles to come to terms with a lonely world rapidly changing around him. Supporting roles by Drew Barrymore, Kate Beckinsale and Sam Rockwell as his children are also extremely well done.

Director Kirk Jones has given Everybody's Fine a realistic "look" as well. It's not quite documentary style, but it is miles away from the typically Hollywood spit and polish. It's easy to feel these characters and their situations, and feeling is what this movie is about.

Everybody's Fine is rated PG-13, and while the serious nature of the subject


matter may not connect with younger viewers, the content is not offensive. The run time is one hour and forty minutes.

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Health Department warns residents to avoid fraudulent e-mails referencing CDC- sponsored state vaccination program

Phishing emails are a scam, attempts to obtain personal information

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan has received reports of fraudulent emails referencing a CDCsponsored State Vaccination Program for the H1N1 virus. The messages request that users create a personal H1N1 "Vaccination Profile" on the www.cdc.gov web site. The message then states that anyone who has reached the age of 18 has to have his/her personal "Vaccination Profile" on the cdc.gov site.

The CDC has not implemented a state vaccination program requiring registration on www.cdc.gov. These emails are a scam and residents are asked to ignore and delete them. Users that click on the embedded link in the email are at risk of having a malicious code installed on their computer system. The Health Department reminds users to take the following steps to reduce the risk of being a victim of a phishing attack:

Do not follow unsolicited links and do not open or respond to unsolicited email messages.

Use caution when visiting un-trusted Web sites.

Use caution when entering personal information online.


run extending from the midway point of the first quarter to the midway point of the second quarter.

"The play of the younger girls was one of the bright spots for us," said Brown,







Initial DNR estimates are 5-15 percent fewer deer taken in northern Lower Peninsula

Initial estimates indicate Michigan firearm deer hunters killed 10 to 20 percent fewer deer this year than in 2008, according to the Department of Natural Resources. Decreased harvests were most noticeable in the Upper Peninsula and less apparent in the southern Lower Peninsula.

Weather -- both a harsh 2008-2009 winter and unseasonably high temperatures during most of the firearm season -- likely contributed to the decreased harvest, wildlife officials said. Although weather across the state was good to ideal for hunters to sit in the woods, it was less than optimal for encouraging deer movement.

DNR biologists estimate the harvest was down by 20 to 30 percent in the Upper Peninsula, 15 to 25 percent in the northern Lower Peninsula, and 5 to 10 percent in the southern Lower Peninsula.

"The season has gone pretty much as we expected in the Upper Peninsula," said DNR deer

deer, fewer hunters, and deer moving less than usual, those factors are going to have an effect on your deer harvest.'

Biologists were a little surprised by the size of the decrease of the harvest in the northern Lower Peninsula, where a more modest decline was anticipated.

> 'Check stations reported a lower than usual percentage of 1¹/₂-year-old bucks in the Upper and northern Lower Peninsula, an indication of poor survival of last year's fawns," Rudolph said. "Antler development was below average as well, another indication of the impact of last winter's severity.'

In southern Michigan, a cool summer that caused corn to mature late and a wet October put the corn harvest far behind schedule, providing additional sanctuary for deer in many areas.

"The corn harvest was around 35 percent by Nov. 16," Rudolph said. "In an average year it's 80 percent. So it's likely that some deer never left the standing corn. That may become apparent during the muzzleloader season.'

Rudolph emphasized the preliminary estimates show a wide range in the harvest because of changes in data collection this season.

"Because we operated so many fewer deer check stations, we could not utilize the models as we have in previous years for our preliminary estimate of the firearm season harvest," he said. "But we'll have solid numbers next spring after the mail survey is completed and those are the numbers we use for making management decisions."
