East Jordan Signs up Interim City Administrator

EAST JORDAN — An interim city administrator who topped the list of nine candidates began his job at City Hall on Tuesday,

Dennis Jason who lived in East Jordan for 30 years, now a resident of Eveline Township, was sworn in on Monday, Jan. 11.

"I expect it to be busy, there's a lot to do," Jason said. First, he would like to talk with the city commissioners to find out where they want to go, and he will spend some time getting to know people. It won't be long before the fiscal year ends and

the city will need a new budget and the list goes on. "I'm looking forward to it. There will be a transition period and like any management position, things change every day,"

Jason has served on many boards in the county in a variety of positions, but he said he has cut back to just the Charlevoix County Planning Commission and will remain on that board.

He expects the East Jordan assignment to run about three to six months. The city will hire a permanent city administrator in the near future.

After losing first two games, Ellsworth has put together a three-game winning streak. PG 9

Avalanche Park plans approved

BOYNE CITY — The master plan for Avalanche Park met with favor from the Boyne City City Commission on Tuesday, Jan. 12, following an overview of the design created to enhance the park and recreation area.

The city and its consultant, Mark Robinson, held several public input sessions to assist in formulating a design from the comments and suggestions made by residents.

"What we heard over and over, is that people like the park the way it is," Robinson said. So, the plan is to primarily maintain and conserve the property

The carefully chosen improvements would include an approximately 12,000square-foot ice rink, warming house, more trails and spaces for parking vehicles. Robinson said there was no discussion of designing a rink for hockey.

The one issue that people have differing views on is whether or not snowmobiles would be allowed in the park and on the trails. Those who want quiet serenity as they walk or cross-country ski would prefer not to allow snowmobiles or that they have a separate trail. Snowmobilers currently use the park.

Commissioner Dan Adkison liked the idea of separate trails.

"I understand where Parks and Rec is coming from because snowmobiles can be loud. I'd like to see a separate trail and separate the trails as much as possible," Adkison said. The city's parks and recreation department recommended not allowing snowmobiles.

Resident John Betts didn't want snowmobiles allowed in Avalanche Park at all and he has been an avid rider for 40 years.

"That is a beautiful park and this community is so fortunate to have it," Betts said. "It will be dangerous to the people who are snowshoeing or walking. And it doesn't matter what you set the speed at, I can guarantee people will speed and go where they shouldn't go."


Commissioner Laura Sansom said she did not care for snowmobile use, but she suggested that time frames for snowmobile operation might be a good compromise.

"Personally, I don't like the noise or the fumes in the air, but I do not want to prohibit people from their rights," Sansom said. She thinks the city could try allowing snowmobiles at certain times and/or days.

Police Chief Randy Howard was asked by the commission about his views. Howard said there are quite a few snowmobilers in the park, but he hasn't received any complaints.

"There isn't that much up there in terms of violations and if it becomes an issue where we have problems, we can make a separate trail," Howard said.

The commissioners voted to adopt the master plan for Avalanche Park.

City and Realtor Work to Resolve Issue

EAST JORDAN — A realtor who bought a portion of land from the city unearthed an unpleasant surprise, and wants the city to be involved in its removal.

Gary Strange of Charlevoix Properties said he was "shocked" to learn of a sewer force main found on his property at 650 Water St. He told city commissioners at a Jan. 5 meeting that when he purchased the property it was never disclosed to him that there was a force main and title records showed no easement by the city that would have given an in-

dication that infrastructure equipment was underground.

Strange said he knew about two public telephone booths on the property that were removed, but he didn't know about anything underground otherwise.

Commissioner Jane Booze questioned city attorney Scott Beatty about the force main not being recorded and what obligation the city may have.

Beatty said it is an issue that needs to be addressed.

"It creates a problem for everyone as the easement should have been recorded," he

Strange said he hoped his planned development would be well received as people are having a hard time keeping their jobs and there is little activity elsewhere. Strange said the project will retain 15 jobs and create approximately six jobs.

Booze said she didn't want to discourage development, but that she is not comfortable asking taxpayers to pay for removal of the

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Avalanche Bay picked as #1 **Sledding Hill** in the State

Michigan Blue magazine has picked Boyne City's Avalanche Mountain as the top sledding hill in the state. Travel writer Jim DuFresne wrote in the magazine's Winter issue: "In the 1950s Avalanche Peak was a downhill ski area complete with a chairlift. Today it's our choice as the number one sledding hill in the state. The observation deck at the top is reached by a climb of 462 steps, but we've yet to see anybody begin from there. Most kids haul their sled only halfway to the peak and still have trouble making it down right-side up."

- The City of Boyne City is starting a sled loaner program for Avalanche. They are asking area residents who may have unused plastic sleds to donate them for use at the sledding hill. While the City has been offering the loaner skates for many years, the idea of offering the sleds is new this year. The idea came up after city staff heard many comments from visitors who would like to sled at Avalanche but did not have room in their vehicles to pack sleds, or from families who were not aware of the Avalanche sledding hill until arriving in the area. The sleds would be distributed on a first come - first served basis and would not be taken off property. Sled donations may be dropped off at City Hall, 319 N. Lake St. Sleds must be plastic and in good condition; no toboggans or runner sleds, please.

HOURS for the Avalanche warming house are Monday through Friday from 4 to 9 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Holidays when kids are not in school will follow the weekend schedule. The sledding hill and skating rink may be used outside of these hours; however, the warming house is not open. off development. It is our goal to protect the taxpayers," Booze told

Commissioner Ray Fisher asked Beatty if there was any research he could do on the issue and Beatty said he could look at the AT&T easement to see if it is strictly for the telephones that were on the property, or if it might cover the force main.

Jan Kellogg of Northern Lakes Economic Alliance said funds to remove the force main would be available with a Community Development Block Grant, as long as jobs would be created.

Kellogg said the exact amount is not firm yet, but she estimates the CDBG portion would be \$25,000 to \$30,000. The remainder would come from local match funds and from

Eating Well as We Age

Our mothers always warned us that if we wanted to grow up big and strong we should eat our vegetables. And increasingly, scientific evidence is demonstrating that eating healthy foods and being physically active can help us remain healthy throughout our lives. Eating a well-balanced diet that includes plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables is one of the smartest things you can do to improve your

Foods can be powerful medicines that control how we look, feel and perform. By choosing healthier foods, we can lose fat, grow muscle, gain energy and literally turn back the clock. Controlling blood sugar is one of the best "tricks" available to force your body to shed fat. Instead of eating foods with lots of refined flours and sugar, switch to whole grains, beans, fruits and vegetables for a steady stream of energy. Researchers on aging have found that those who consume massive amounts of processed foods hasten the aging process. Slow-burning carbohydrates Reep blood sugar in a healthy range and maintain a constant level of mental and physical energy. Slowburning carbohydrates include oatmeal, baked beans, lentils, barley, wheat bulgur, broccoli, tomatoes, åsparagus, lima beans, peas and arichokes. Fast burning sugar products to avoid include white bread, pancakes, bagels, soft drinks, desserts, muffins, doughnuts and candy. Fiber is also an important part of a healthy diet. The more ber you eat from whole grains,

vegetables and fruits, the slower

sugar is absorbed into the blood from the intestine. Fiber also slows the absorption of carbohydrates from the intestine into the bloodstream. The best fibers for keeping blood sugar levels down are soluble and include high quality breakfast cereals, whole grains and beans.

Although all vegetables and fruits have a place in a healthy diet, some are better than others. A sweet potato contains half the USRDA for Vitamin C and 3.4 grams of fiber. Carrots are rated a close second with more than four times the USRDA for betacarotene. Spinach, collard greens, kale, dandelion greens, mustard greens and Swiss chard are stars of the vegetable stage when it comes to nutrients. Papaya and cantaloupe top the list of best fruits with each providing almost a complete daily dose of Vitamins A and C along with healthy doses of potassium. Strawberries, kiwis and apricots are actually rated higher than apples as healthful fruits.

Beans top the list of the world's healthiest diets. They are a rich source of carbohydrates, protein, fiber, minerals and vitamins. Soybeans head the list followed by pinto beans, chickpeas, lentils, and black-eyed peas. Many nutritionists consider whole grains among the most valuable of all foods. Top whole grains include quinoa, whole-wheat macaroni and spaghetti, amaranth, buckwheat bulger, barley and wild rice. Not all dairy products are bad for you. Great sources of protein, the following choices have high calcium content and low fat. Try adding plain nonfat yogurt, skim milk, low-fat plain yogurt, one percent

milk, nonfat vanilla yogurt and nonfat cottage cheese to

The American Cancer Society has developed a set of guidelines for diet and nutrition to help reduce the risk of cancer.

1. Choose most of the foods you eat from plant **sources.** Eat five or more servings of fruits and vegetables each day. Eat other foods from plant sources. such as breads, cereals, ain products, rice, pa or beans several times each day. Fruits and vegetables contain important vitamins,

minerals and fiber. In addition to being a healthy snack, they can reduce your risk for many cancers.

Eating five or more servings may seem difficult but if you study how much a serving really is, it's fairly easy to incorporate more into your daily diet. The following are examples of a serving:

1/2 cup fruit

3/4 cup 100% juice

1/2 cup cooked vegetable

1 cup leafy vegetable

1 medium sized piece of fruit

1 slice of bread

1 ounce of dry cereal

1/2 cup cooked cereal, rice or pasta

2. Limit your intake of high-fat foods, especially from animal sources. It's pretty easy to make low-fat foods a part of your daily routine. Use cooking spray instead of oil; try tuna packed in water instead of oil. Select nonfat or low-fat dairy products. Choose baked, broiled and roasted foods instead

of fried. Foods made with whole grains rather than processed (refined) flour products are higher in fiber, vitamins and minerals. Beans are great sources of vitamins, minerals and fiber and can be useful as lowfat, high protein alternatives to meat. When you do eat meat, choose cuts that are lean, not marbled with fat. Eat smaller portions of cooked meat, fish and poultry. Stir-fries and casseroles are a good way to mix smaller portions of meat with larger portions of veg-

When eating out in restaurants, check the menu for low-fat choices. Most restaurants now offer low-fat and healthy choices or will prepare your meal to order. Keep in mind that fat-free and low-fat foods don't necessarily translate into low calorie. Read labels carefully for fat, sugar, sodium and calorie con-

3. Limit your consumption of alcoholic beverages. For men, limit alcohol to two drinks a day; for women, one drink a day. A drink is 12 ounces of regular beer, 5 ounces of wine or 1.5 ounces of 80proof distilled spirits.

4. Combine with at least 30 minutes of moderate exercise each day. You can be active for 30 minutes each day by walking briskly, swimming, gardening, doing housework or even dancing. Thirty minutes of activity doesn't have to be continuous. Try taking the stairs instead of the elevator, park farther away from the mall to get in some extra walking or do some type of exercise while you watch TV.

The American Heart Association stresses that it's important to choose foods low in saturated fatty acids, cholesterol and sodium. Total fat intake should be no more than 30 percent of calories daily. Saturated fatty acids and trans-fatty acids should be less than 10 percent of those calories, polyunsaturated fatty acid intake should be 8-10 percent of calories, and mono-saturated fatty acids should make up no more than 10-15 percent to total calories. Cholesterol intake should be less than 300 milligrams per day. Sodium intake should be no more than 2.4 grams per day.

The AHA offers the following tips for a heart healthy diet: Buy lean cuts of beef and pork.

USDA Select beef contains the least fat. The second leanest grade is

Eat fish at least one or two times a week. It is low in saturated fat and can be prepared in many ways. Buy fish filets and bread and bake them yourself. The coatings on prepared fish add to their fat content, weight and cost.

Extend meat flavor by serving small portions of meat with vegetables, pasta and rice.

Buy fat-free and one percent fat milk rather than 2 percent fat or whole milk. Skim milk in half gallons costs less than quarts.

Health Dept. encourages prevention and screening for cervical cancer January is **Cervical Health Awareness Month**

There is a vaccine to prevent cervical cancer and a screening test that can identify it early when it is easy to treat, but about 12,000 women still die from cervical cancer in the U.S. each year. During January, Cervical Health Awareness Month, public officials are recommending human papillomavirus (HPV) immunization for girls and young women and Pap tests for women.

Since infection with human papillomavirus (HPV) is the most important risk factor for cervical cancer and precancers, it is important to avoid genital HPV infection.

HPV is a common virus that can be passed from one person to another during sex. According to Joshua Meyerson, Medical Director for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, at least half of sexually active people will have HPV at some point in their lives.

"Because HPV infection is so common, it is important for women to follow guidelines for Pap tests," he said. Keep in mind, many people will have an HPV infection at some time in their lives, but few women will get cervical cancer. Pap tests can identify cervical cancer when it is entirely curable."

Women should get Pap tests every two years beginning at age 21, or three years after sexual activity starts, whichever comes first. For certain women 30 years and older who have had three consecutive normal screening results, testing can be done every two to three years.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan offers HPV vaccination, a series of three shots, for girls age 11 and 12 and for girls and women age 13 through 26 who did not get any or all of the shots when they were younger. HPV vaccination is available by appointment at Health Department clinics in Bellaire, Mancelona, Charlevoix, Petoskey/Harbor Springs, and Gaylord. Ask if you qualify for the reduced fee of \$15.

Pap tests are available for free or lowcost through the Health Department's Breast & Cervical Cancer Control Program, Reproductive Health Program, and Plan First! program.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. Substitute low fat or nonfat buttermilk yogurt, ice cream, sour cream and frozen yogurt for the regular items.

Low fat cottage cheese can replace ricotta cheese in most recipes.

Buy bread that's whole grain and enriched with B vitamins and iron. Try no-fat baked goods and naturally

sweetened products. Try adding other greens like endive, escarole, spinach and cabbage to salads.

Limit your intake of pickles, relishes, olives, etc. They are very high in sodium. Buy fruit juices instead of fruit drinks and choose juices high in Vitamin C like orange, grapefruit and tomato juice.


Turn to fresh fruits and vegetables as snacks and desserts instead of high calorie cakes, cookies and pies.

Purchase fat-free, low fat, low sodium and baked varieties of crackers and snack chips but remember low fat doesn't mean there are no calories. Substitute flavorful salsa and hummus for fat-laden sour cream and cheese dips.

The International CES (Consumer Electronics Show) is the world's largest tradeshow for consumer technology, unveiling the latest advances in the electronics marketplace. If a technology or device makes waves at CES, chances are very good it will be at the top of the wish list for someone you know (or perhaps even your own) in the very near future.

This year, CES was held in Las Vegas, January 6th through the 9th, and featured a record number of new exhibit areas highlighting over 20,000 cutting-edge products and technologies. 3D Television, mobile DTV, tablets, netbooks, and eReaders were among the hottest products under the scrutiny of more than 120,000 industry professionals attending the show.

"The innovations unveiled this week at the 2010 International CES brought new optimism and opportunity to our industry and the global economy," said Gary Shapiro, president and CEO, CEA. "This show exceeded expectations with its innovation, optimism and excitement. What a great way to kick off the new decade."

Among the many highlights of the show were countless demonstrations of 3D-compatible HDTV's. Sony, Samsung, LG and Toshiba all announced additions to their television product lines in the 3D category.

Yes, viewers will need to wear special glasses in order to marvel at the 3D visual effects, and programmers will need to catch up (although ESPN and Discovery have announced upcoming 3D networks, and 3D Blu-rays are coming soon), but just when you thought that a Hi-Def flat screen was the

Tablets, or slates, are devices that look like small laptops but do not have a keyboard. Using touch screen technology, tablets allow users to do most of what they would normally do on a laptop, but utilizing a much more compact device. While several manufacturers introduced tablets at CES, the much anticipated release of Apple's tablet is still anticipated...with a rumored "big announcement" coming on January 27th

Not to be confused with a tablet, but somewhat similar in appearance, eReaders were another major draw at CES. These portable viewers allow users to download and electronically read books, magazines, newspapers, or jot down notes of their own. Among the new products introduced in this category were two new Samsung units, one with a six-inch screen and the other having a ten-inch viewing area. Plastic Logic unveiled the QUE, an electronic reader and also a storage device for documents including Word and Excel files, PowerPoint presentations and PDF files. Just don't let the charge run down before the last page.

While Apple's iPhone continues to dominate the Smartphone market, several manufacturers, including Motorola, Google and AT&T, unveiled new Smartphones at CES that run on Google's Android application platform. Motorola's Backflip, with a slim design that opens like a book, supports 3G, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and GPS. Among the five new AT&T Android Smartphones to be released is the Dell Mini 3, which has Bluetooth and GPS capabilities, a three and a half inch touch screen, and a Mini USB connector.

And to keep track of that Smartphone, ZOMM unveiled the first wireless leash for Bluetooth enabled mobile phones. About the size of a poker chip, the unit not only locates your phone, it functions as a speakerphone, has a panic alarm and will call for emergency assistance. Let's hope they have a model for remote controls in the works.

With a promised availability by the 2010 holiday

season, a new development for the very popular Xbox 360 gaming system is "Project Natal." Using motion sensor technology to capture the user's body movements, this NUI (new user interface) device allows players to control their gaming experience without using a physical gaming controller.

And on a more fleeting note, Pocket Radar claims to be the world's first pocket-sized radar device. It uses a Doppler radar signal to measure the speed of any moving object up to 375 mph.

Applications? Pocket Radar hopes to find a market in such niches as NASCAR race fans, track and field events, will or parents wanting to check out the speed of their kid's fast of ball.

has been watching your course. I want to begin investing early to take advantage of compound interest, so I want to start a Roth IRA. Which mutual funds would you advise investing in while I'm still trying to save for college?

Jeff

Dear Jeff,

I love the fact that you're thinking ahead, but I want you to save for college before you worry about investing. The best investment you'll ever make is an investment in you, and that's exactly what college is all about.

Now, if having money for college isn't a big issue, you can go ahead and begin putting a little bit of money into a Roth IRA. You can put as much as \$5,000 a year into one, but the great thing is that you don't have to put that much into one. It would probably be pretty hard for you to invest to that extent while you're still in college, any-sway.

When it comes to a first mutual fund, I'd suggest a simple growth-stock mutual fund. They're pretty calm, and they will do some great things if you can find one with a good, long track record of success!

Dear Dave,

I'm looking at allocations for my mutual funds. What's the difference between mid-cap growth and mid-cap value?

Dear Jason,

For purposes of allocating, a mid-cap is a mediumsized company. Generally, these fall into the growth stock mutual fund category. Try thinking of value funds this way: Let's say you buy an expensive home in a good neighborhood. It's okay that you paid a little more, because it's a good area, and you're just going to wait things out. It's that kind of value mentality versus bargain hunting and trying to get a great deal.

When it comes right down to it, the differences in the two types are small. I'd go with whichever one has the best track record and rate of return. Regardless, always remember to spread your money across these four types of mutual funds: growth, growth and income, aggressive growth, and international.

Dear Anonymous,

Start by having a gift-giving category as part of your budget. This works both ways, one for each of you. That way, you'll both know how much goes into that category, but you won't know where something was purchased or what was bought.

I think the gift category is the best and most fair way to give you both input and control over the budget. The idea that you're going to sneak up on your wife or husband with a \$10,000 gift is pretty unrealistic if you're working on your finances together!



with Dr. James Dobson

Father's Influence Key to Daughter's Self Esteem

QUESTION: Talk about a father's impact on his daughter and what he should hope to accomplish through that relationship.

DR. DOBSON: Fathers have an incalculable impact on their daughters. Most psychologists believe, and I am one of them, that all future romantic relationships are influenced positively or

with her dad in the childhood years.

If that is true, then fathers should give careful thought to this responsibility and seek to be what their daughters need of them. There are, I believe, at least seven components to that assignment.

negatively by the way a girl interacts

First, a dad's leadership at home should be a model of strength and authority, but always tempered by love and compassion. Harsh discipline tends to close down a sensitive feminine spirit, but permissiveness and capriciousness can create lifelong disdain for men.

Second, a dad must remember that he

is being watched closely by that little girl around his knees. The way he treats her mother will teach her volumes about how men and women should relate to one another. Blatant disrespect toward his wife will not be missed by the child.

Third, I think it is good to begin "dating" a daughter when she is six years of age, or even earlier. Dad should let the child help plan their evenings and then see that they occur when and where promised. These times together are not intended simply for fun, although that is important. The father can also use them to show his daughter how a man treats a woman he respects. He can open doors for her, help her with her chair, and listen attentively when she speaks. Later, when she is a teenager, she will know what to expect -- or insist on -- from the boys she dates.

Fourth, a dad should always look for ways to build the self-confidence of his little girl. If she believes he thinks she is pretty and "special," she will be inclined to see herself that way. He holds the key to her self-acceptance.

Fifth, a father should keep the lines of communication open throughout child-hood so that he is seen as someone to whom his daughter can turn when she needs advice. She will need that counsel before she is grown.

Sixth, God designed men to be the "providers and protectors" of their families. Their daughters should perceive them that way. Dad is often his little girl's "hero," and it is wonderful when that kind of relationship develops.

Seventh, a father must be the spiritual leader of his family, making clear his devotion to Jesus Christ and to the principles in Scripture. He should give the highest priority to bringing up his daughters, and his sons, in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

It's not an easy responsibility raising girls, is it? But those who do the job properly can rest in the knowledge that they have given their daughters the best chance for a successful marriage, if they choose to wed.

Christmas Shopping Gets Retail Market Hopping

How about some good economic news?

It seems Santa got some of his usual stride back this holiday season as data liferom several retail analyst firms, including Retail Forward, Retail Metrics and ICSC (International Council of Shopping Centers) showed about a three-per-timent rise in same store sales in December compared to the same period last servear. While that may not sound like boon times ahead, last year holiday sales dropped by nearly six-percent, which was the largest decrease in nearly four

- Now three percent isn't a huge increase, but it is better than another season of falling behind.

"We were up about three percent," states Dan Miller of East Jordan True Value, "which is probably right around the rate of inflation. While we are guardedly optimistic, we are still sitting tight."

Patty Brannon, of Book World in Charlevoix, notes, "We had a decent Christmas season but it was a little bit down from last year which may have been due to the weather."

"We had a great holiday season and overall year," states Leslie Neilson of Bali Living Imports in Boyne City, "the best since we opened ten years ago. We were up approximately twenty-seven percent over 2008. And in 2008 we were up twenty percent from our best year previously."

I kept waiting for a hidden "super power" to emerge, transforming legendary detective Sherlock Holmes into an indestructible being as he waged battle with his nemesis; Lord Blackwood. Or maybe close pal and compatriot Dr. Watson would administer a genetically engineered concoction at the last possible second before Holmes was to perish, rendering the great sleuth invincible to the natural world.

But this is Victorian era England, where even the idea of genetically based super heros so common in films today is still a hundred years in the future. Sherlock and Dr. Watson must prevail upon their wits, intuition, deduction, a little black powder and a lot of good luck to track down their villains and avoid

meeting their own demise.

That's what makes Sherlock Holmes, a film adaptation of Sir Arthur Conan Doyles literary "super detective" of long ago England, so much fun to watch. It's an exercise of the mind, and Robert Downey Jr (Holmes) and Jude Law (Dr. Watson) run through a two hour and ten minute dialogue at warp speed, demanding the audience keep their eyes on the ball lest they miss the slightest clue.

Downey and Law (or Holmes and Watson) also have an enjoyable chemistry, keeping the mood light throughout the film though Victorian England is a very dark and gloomy place. Even the master villain of this tale, Lord Blackwood, is a very depressing guy; using the powers of "black magic" in his attempt to (you guessed it); "rule the world."

For fans of Sir Doyle's original Holmes stories, there are references

to many of those works scattered throughout the film, such as quotes, character and location names and similar scenes, but the script follows a course of its own. Downey's Holmes has a more contemporary appeal, and he forgoes the legendary detectives deeply curved calabash pipe for a more traditional straight pipe, but at least he smokes one.

oipe, but at least he smokes one. Sherlock Holmes is rated PG-13 for some violence (aka action scenes) and a hint of suggestive material. While the material isn't offensive, if you're the "Lifesaver" type, bring them along.

Much like Baker Street in Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's stories, Sherlock Holmes may have a somewhat dingy feel...but stay sharp...for the material is challenging and clear.



After losing first two games, Ellsworth has put together three-game winning streak

VANDERBILT - Two games. Two wins. One was a bit sloppier than the other, but that's OK. The Ellsworth boys basketball team, after starting out the season with two straight defeats, is on a three-game winning streak, including victories over Northern Lakes Conference foes Alanson and Vanderbilt in the first week of the new year.

"We're getting there," said veteran Lancer coach Tex Drenth on Thursday after his team's impressive 66-39 triumph over the host Yellowjackets. "We shot the ball a lot better tonight than we did against Alanson and I liked our intensity. We didn't come out lackadaisical like we did in the Alanson game. We got after it from the start."

The Lancers (3-2, 3-1) jumped to an early lead and maintained a healthy advantage on the scoreboard throughout the game. The score was 22-9 after the first quarter and 34-13

After showing some holiday rust in the day's 65-40 win at Alanson, the Lancer were smoking hot from the floor against Vanderbilt. Spitfire guard Jordan Muma was the smoking gun in the early going, draining shot after shot. He scored 13 of his game-high 30 points in the first quarter, including three connections from beyond the arc.

"Jordan was hot as a firecracker early in the game," Drenth said. "When he's on target that way, it makes the whole team better."

Vanderbilt coach Chris Rupe focused attention on Ellsworth seniors Jared Danbert and Nate Peterson, seeking to neutralize the Lancers' prolific scorers. The strategy worked as Danbert and Peterson were limited to two points each in the first half. Muma made the strategy a moot point with his assault on the iron, however. While Danbert and Peterson were drawing Yellowjacket defenders like magnets, the mercury-quick Muma found room to shoot and kept racking up the points.

Forward Jeff Sutherland also helped to cre ate the first-quarter gap on the scoreboard, accounting for five of his nine points in the period.

Danbert finally got untracked offensively in the second half, scoring 11 of his 14 points in the third quarter, including a trey. Danbert also collected eight rebounds and seven assists with a typically versatile effort. Junior guard Robert Gruse had a strong floor game, dishing off seven assists and handling the ball efficiently.

Steve Snider scored 10 to pace the Yellow-


"I tip my hat to Tex and his team," said Vandy coach Rupe after the game. "They came in here ready to play. They shot the lights out

At the start of the game, Boyne City did an excellent job breaking the Snowbird press and generating transition buckets. Junior guard Kolbi Shumaker scored eight of his 10 points in the first quarter

and senior point guard Nick Young drained a pair of 3pointers as the Ramblers took a 22-9 lead.

In the second quarter, St. Mary switched to a halfcourt trap and managed to claw its way back into contention.

"They're quicker than us and picked our press apart early," McKenzie said. "When we went to the halfcourt and started doing some trapping, we were a lot more effective."

By halftime, the score was tie at 26. In the second and third quarters, it was anybody's game as each team took turns reclaiming the lead. In all, the lead changed hands 13 times in the seesaw contest.

A pair of free throws from Ameel put the Ramblers ahead 46-45 with 1:22 left in regulation and then a layup by junior guard Caleb Roberts off a perfectly engineered backdoor play increased the lead to 48-45 with 44 seconds left.

St. Mary showed some scrap of its own, however. Senior Phil Spyhalski drained a pair of free throws to trim the Boyne City lead to a point, 48-47, with 38 seconds to go.

Ameel's free throw with 11 seconds left pushed the Boyne City lead back to two points, 49-47, but it wasn't quite enough to close out the victory as the Snowbirds responded to force overtime.


"We have to finish better," Redman said. "We have to continue to play hard and work on those areas that need improvement."


