EJ breaks ground on new state of art foundry

ELMIRA - Michigan Lt. Governor Brian Calley joined a host of state and local dignitaries and company leaders at the recent groundbreaking for a new \$125 million foundry being constructed for the manufacturer EJ, previously called East Jordan Iron-works.

What began in 1883 as a humble, family-run foundry situated on the shores of Lake Charlevoix in East Jordan that crafted castings for machines, ships and railroads has grown into a global corporation that is still run by the same family and now provides parts for infrastructure projects in some 150 countries.

According to the company website, EJ bills itself as "the leader in the design, manufacture and distribution of access solutions for water, sewer, drainage, telecommunications and utility networks worldwide."

The East Jordan Iron-works foundry originated in East Jordan 135 years ago as a business started by William E. Malpass and his brother-in-law Richard W. Round and has since been handed down to be owned by generations of the Malpass family.

Fourth generation family members Fred Malpass, Tracy Malpass and Tad Malpass have led the business since the mid-1980s, during which time they have multiplied its production value and capabilities through acquiring numerous foundries nationwide and around the world.

EJ has grown to include affiliated companies in France, Ireland, Canada and Australia that are all conducting business under the same EJ name and brand and have a commercial presence in five continents.

But along with EJ's steady global expansion came increasing demands on the business, and the Malpass family and company officials realized they had outgrown their foundry in East Jordan and needed to build a bigger one. They did not want to leave northern Michigan, however, and they especially did not want to lose or jeopardize any of the 340 jobs that EJ provides to the area.

Working closely with local and state officials as well as with the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance (NLEA), the Michigan Economic Development

(First, get a real job)

Dear Dave,
I currently have student loans in deferment from earning a degree in hospital management. My career goal is to own a mobile food vending company, so I'm putting most of the money I make from eBay and ride-hailing services — around \$1,000 a month — aside in savings for that. Should I forego my business idea for the time being, and knock out the student loan debt instead?
Nicholas

Dear Nicholas,
You should put this business idea on hold for now, unless you can start it for less than \$1,000. The first thing you need to do is go

out, and get a real job. I know you have this dream of being self-employed, but right now you're not doing so well as an entrepreneur.

With a hospitality degree, you can make \$30,000 to \$50,000 a year within the industry, clean up your mess, and build out the eBay thing on the side. Just think about how quickly you could save up money for a jump into the food truck or mobile food business, then!

Pay your way through it, Nicholas. Don't sit around scraping by on the kind of money you're making now and call that winning. You have a real economic engine at your fingertips, because you have the knowledge from the degree you earned. And it's a valuable degree. If you go in there and bust it, you can escalate yourself

upward through that industry in a hurry.

While you're doing that, you can clean up all your student loans and save up money for your food truck. Boom! You're self-employed and you learned a lot of stuff you can use in your new business. Go make some real money, then follow your dream, man!

(A bad move)

Dear Dave,
I have a whole life insurance policy with zero cash value due to loans I took out per the advice of my agent. I finally realized this wasn't a smart move, as I now owe premiums plus interest every year. Am I still on the hook for the policy loans if I forfeit the policy to buy term insurance?

Dear Tanner,
No, you are not. Get your term insurance in place first, then when you cancel the policy your cash value will offset your loans.

They won't loan you more

than your cash value. It's seldom that they will loan you 100 percent of cash value, so you might actually have a cash value that is above your loan amount. If they have loaned you the full amount of your cash value, it'll be an exact break even, and just canceling the policy means you cancel the interest and cancel the premiums.

It was bad advice to buy the policy, and even dumber advice to clean the whole thing out and sit there paying interest to borrow your own money and pay a premium to keep the loan open. I recommend 10 to 12 times your income on a 15- or 20-year level term policy. During that 15 or 20 years, of course, you should be getting out of debt and building wealth so that you have a big pile of money and no need for life insurance.

EDUCATION 101.0?

To the Editor,

Raised in the exurbs of Detroit, I experienced the downfall of education from at least the nineteen-fifties forward. Remembering the schooling of my earliest years in Canada, I was astounded at the laxity of education in "The States".

In fact I was the smartest kid in class in 6th grade with few close peers. And I didn't even have to try, just acted naturally. There was of course the incursion of auto and peripheral workers to the Detroit and contiguous areas from the South to taint the waters, black and white alike. Detroit was once the hub of sophistication and higher endeavor back in the day of innovation and invention. As the outward movement progressed out Woodward (the first paved road in America) – "Wood Ward" as the innovator phrased it even though his name was Woodward – the declension transpired in terms of quality education, today rather dismal in public terms. By the time I came around it was almost depleted but not quite. That ending emerged in about 1955 when I entered 7th grade and never revived until reaching college years in the early sixties. Detroit, Chicago, many other earlier American hubs, had excellent educational systems

founded mostly by the English colonists who took the land from the indigenous Indian tribes, French, Dutch, Spanish, Vikings &c, but education remained paramount for the elite, for a while the peons.

I could not avoid note that the mentality level had lapsed in my incursion to the United States at a very young age. This was still cowboy country in the late forties, early fifties and everybody knew it. Of course this was Second World War aftermath days and everyone was coming out of that electrifying funk and well met at that, lots of vitality then, creating the great middle class whereof all of us could be educated to higher degrees and many of us took advantage of that great opportunity. It was unprecedented and now a thing of the past.

What is discovered upon entering college is that it's quite different from grade school after 6th grade. One immediately senses the discovery quotient of learning for learning's sake as we found when very young. In this age though the impetus is geared to making a living wage way before learning for learning's sake. Learning is secondary now, sad to relate, now akin to educating women in the 19th century and before in the sense of begetting sophisticated persons who might uplift the

general demeanor of what is taken to be decent society. Guile, sophistication, speciousness and deviousness do not equate with intelligence, assuredly not wisdom.

Now that the US government has supplanted most self-reliant motivation with taxation and restrictive malfeasant laws, these have been replaced with handouts known as entitlements, benefits, security and the like. More on this at another time, but suffice to say America is no longer a free country if ever. As to education, only the erudite and dedicated to certain higher educational specialties are truly educated; the rest are certified to work at higher wages than most untrained persons can expect. Someone who has the financial stability to scoot right through a pair or thrice degrees is hired as a reiteration of whatever discipline s/he has chosen as career and proceeds accordingly to thereupon reiterate that art, science or bureaucratic reiteration – can't reiterate that word enough.

Formal education is a good thing in the sense that one is enabled to get beyond the strictly auto-didactic waters of ponderous semi-learned demagoguery. We find this in academia too, the pomposity of faculty, those ivy-clad towers of wise-old-owl professorships with mis-

matched shoes or dresses worn inside out. All well and good for sake of the upcoming who truly want to learn as well as those who want to earn. Students can easily discern the impetus behind those who presume to teach. A student with enough financial levity can zip right through a master's degree, land a job teaching college-level curricula, settle into that lifestyle of academia with relative ease. Without the moolah, it's still possible but a little harder usually involving long-term debt. When I myself was going through college course era there was no such thing as debt for schooling. Fathers made enough money to cover all bases, mothers were always at home, one could work summers otherwise to gather enough money to make it through two more semesters, part time work to supplement if needed. Personally I had tuition covered but worked a party store job more for the neighborhood "feel" than the money which was probably \$1.00 an hour. I still remember those kids, prostitutes, students and neighbors.

One nonetheless is advised that once formally educated the learning process has only begun. Then the real education begins.

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Ellsworth Community Schools announce new PK-12 Principal position

Ellsworth Community School has announced the creation of a new PK-12 Principal position. The district currently operates with a single building administrator, Superintendent/Principal, Aaron Gaffney. The soon to be hired principal will collaborate with Gaffney with a primary role of working directly with students and parents.

"For the past 10+ years Ellsworth has operated with a single administrator serving as both a Superintendent and a Principal," explained Gaffney. "While this model has

served us well, we've grown to the point where one administrator cannot effectively meet the needs of our students."

In order to financially afford the creation of the new position, the district needed to be creative. Gaffney will be staying on as Superintendent/Principal, but will be moving back into the classroom two hours per day to teach high school math.

"You don't often hear about Superintendents teaching classes, but being flexible and thinking outside

of the box is one of the things we do best in Ellsworth," Gaffney emphasized. "I'm excited for the opportunity, and doing so will free up the resources to hire another administrator."

While exact roles will be precisely defined based on the skill set of the new hire, the tentative plan calls for Gaffney to retain responsibility for teacher supervision and staff development in addition to Superintendent duties, while the new assistant principal will be in charge of day-to-day student operations re-

lated to attendance, grades, and discipline, as well as parent communication.

"As a board, we are excited about this new staff position which will strengthen our ability to provide big school opportunities through the continued development of small school relationships," said ECS School Board Treasurer, Pastor Chris Wallace. "We believe this new position with the enhance our ability to meet the educational and relational needs of both our students and their families."

Ellsworth Community School is currently accepting applications for the position, and plans to hold interviews the week of August 7-11 in order to have the new principal in place by the start of the 2017/18 school year.

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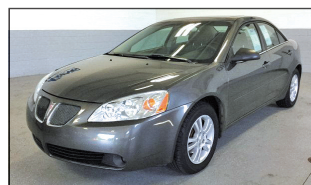
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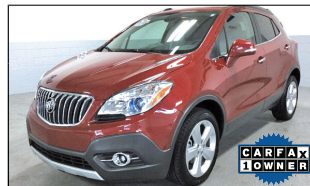
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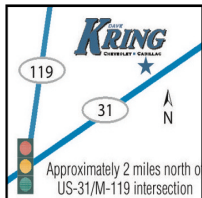
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Charlevoix Circle of Arts hosts Duo Vif Masterclass & Concert

The Charlevoix Circle of Arts / Duo Vif Masterclass and Concert with Mark Gallagher, clarinet / Brent Weber, saxophone on August 15. The Masterclass will be from 6:00-7pm, and the concert begins at 7pm.

Duo Vif is a clarinet-saxophone duo based in Western Maryland that has performed both nationally and internationally. Mark Gallagher (a native of Charlevoix) and Brent Weber began playing together in Spring of 2013 and both are faculty members in the music department at Frostburg State University in Maryland. Their varied repertoire consists of music from several stylistic periods including works by Georg Philip Telemann, Bernhard Henrik Crusell, Francis Poulenc to the more contemporary literature of Roshanne Etezady, Gregory Wanamaker, Nikola Resanovic, and Violet Archer.

Clarinetist Mark Gallagher, is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of

Music where he received a Bachelor of Music degree in clarinet performance and studied with Lawrence McDonald. He also holds a Masters of Music in Performance and Literature with a Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music having studied with D. Stanley Hasty and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Other major teachers included Robert Marcellus and Alfred Zetter, both of the Cleveland Orchestra and Dr. Linda Bartley who is the clarinet professor at University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Dr. Gallagher has performed with the Washington Contemporary Music Forum, Musique Vivante de Paris, United States Navy Band, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, Washington Opera, Cincinnati Ballet Orchestra, Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, Bronx Symphony, New York City Ballet Orchestra, Wisconsin Wind Orches-

Saxophonist Brent Weber, has enjoyed a diverse musical journey as a performer and educator. After earning degrees in saxophone performance from Southern Oregon University (BA) and University of Georgia (MM) Mr. Weber joined the faculty as Assistant Pro-

fessor of Saxophone at the Sichuan Conservatory of Music in the capitol of China's Sichuan province, Chengdu. After two incredible years teaching and freelancing in Southwest China, Brent returned to the U.S. to pursue his Doctorate in Musical Arts at the University of Georgia. From 2009-2012 he had the opportunity to

study with teachers Kenneth Fischer, Eugene Rousseau, Joseph Wytko, and Connie Frigo. Brent completed his doctoral studies in the spring of 2014 with a dissertation detailing music for saxophone and cello duos.

Experienced in multiple genres of music from classical to jazz, rock 'n' roll and beyond, Brent advocates versatility. His work with the contemporary jazz group Jake Mowrer Quartet featured him performing and recording throughout Northern Georgia. As a concert saxophonist, he is active with the North American Saxophone Alliance performing in conferences in Minnesota, Louisiana, Florida, Oregon, and Georgia. In 2007 Brent presented the European premiere of Todd Barton's Diastems II at the World Saxophone Congress XIV in Ljubljana, Slovenia. As a winner of the University of Georgia Concerto Competition, he performed Ingolf Dahl's Concerto for Saxophone and Wind Ensemble.

Most recently Mr. Weber was part of the 2012 Naxos release Street Song featuring the University of Georgia wind Ensemble under the direction of Dr. John Lynch.

People Fund Grant Awarded to Camp Sea-Gull

Charlevoix County's Hayes Township was awarded a grant from the Directors of the Great Lakes Energy People Fund for \$10,000. The grant money will be used to construct rain gardens at Hayes Township Park Camp Sea-Gull on the north shore of Lake Charlevoix. The purpose of the rain gardens is to protect the water quality of Lake Charlevoix.

The Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council defines a rain garden as a “planted depression that receives and absorbs rain and snowmelt runoff, also known as stormwater, from impervious surfaces like roofs, driveways, walkways, parking lots, and compacted lawn areas. Rain gardens help filter out pollutants such as lawn fertilizers and pesticides, oil and other fluids from cars and machinery, and debris and litter. Rain gardens are a very effective and low cost way to protect water quality.”

The extensive rain gardens will catch

and retain stormwater from the access road, boat launch, fishing pier access pathway and parking lot thus preventing stormwater from reaching Lake Charlevoix. The rain gardens were specifically designed by Site Planning Development, Inc. to catch, retain and filter the stormwater. After being filtered through the soil and plants in the rain gardens, the water will percolate into the groundwater.

The People Fund is a program of Great Lakes Energy in which customers "round up" their electric bills to the nearest dollar. The People Fund monies are then awarded to non-profit organizations and charitable activities for community projects in the Great Lakes Energy service area. Hayes Township residents, many of whom receive their electricity from Great Lakes Energy, are encouraged to sign up to participate in the People Fund program.

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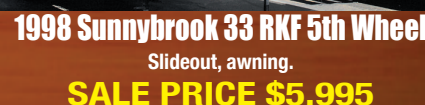


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Rummage Sale to fund Kentucky Mission Trip

Flax flack: what’s that all about?

One of impressionist painter Jean Renoir’s favorite techniques was to dilute oil paint with linseed oil and turpentine so that it ran down the canvas. He called it “juice.” Well, these days linseed — what we call flaxseed — is having a Renaissance moment as a food and oil that leads to better health.

The benefits of flaxseed: Flaxseeds (always use the ground variety, not whole) deliver a substantial amount of vitamin B-1/thiamine as well as some B-2, B-3, B-5, B-6, folate (B-9) and choline. Plus every tablespoon of ground flaxseed contains almost 2 grams of fiber and 1.6 grams of omega-3 ALA fatty acid (which can ease symptoms of diabetic neuropathy). One of flaxseed’s great assets is that it contains 75 to 800 times more lignans, a form of polyphenol, than other plant foods! The lignans and other nutrients in the seed are associated with a reduction in risk of cardiovascular disease, the slowing of prostate tumor growth, tamping down your stress response and quelling inflammation.

What about flaxseed oil? The oil is a great source of ALA, but it becomes rancid easily (store in the fridge no more than six to eight

weeks). And, it does not contain the lignans, fiber or protein of the ground seeds.

So how do you get this power-packed seed into your diet? Grind the seeds in a coffee grinder as needed; aim for eating 2-3 tablespoons a day. They add flavor and texture to salads, soups and cereals, steamed veggies, broiled fish and smoothies.

Drinking (coffee) to your health

According to the Oxford Dictionary blog, three unusual words for a cup of coffee are: “skilly,” nautical slang for a too-weak brew; “sergeant-major,” military slang for coffee with milk and sugar; and “coffee Biggin,” a cup brewed in a filtered drip pot first invented by George Biggin around 1780. Then there are the more down-to-earth synonyms of “java,” “mud,” “jamocho” and “Joe.”

But whatever you call it, this universal beverage improves cognitive function and heart health. And the good news keeps coming: An observational study of 500,000 people in Europe published in the Annals of Internal Medicine showed that drinking at least three cups a day — caffeinated or decaf — improved liver and immune function and, during 16 years

of the study’s followup, reduced the chance of an untimely death.

For the 54 percent of Americans 18 and older who already drink 3.1 cups a day, enjoy the benefits! But if coffee isn’t your beverage of choice, here are some other great beverages that confer bountiful health benefits.

Green tea: Helps lower lousy LDL cholesterol, and a Japanese study showed that five cups a day reduces your risk of death from cardiovascular disease, including stroke.

Black tea: Although most tea studies feature green tea, drinking black tea is also a heart healthy choice.

Chicken broth: While some studies show that drinking this soothing liquid may help tamp down the common cold and stimulate nasal fluids that help block infections, others indicate that it may be an anti-inflammatory. We say, it tastes so good, why not enjoy?

No ED meds before anesthesia

We have a new, firm warning from the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists to the millions of guys taking erectile dysfunction drugs who are heading into surgery: When combined with anesthesia, medications such

as Viagra (sildenafil), Levitra (vardenafil) and Cialis (tadalafil) can cause a dangerously severe drop in blood pressure. That’s because ED meds contain — and promote the body’s own ability to produce — nitric oxide. Nitric oxide opens blood vessels and relaxes muscles, making it much easier for erections to occur. Adding anesthesia and other medications used during surgery to the blood-vessel dilating actions of an ED med can increase those effects.

Since the average American male can expect to undergo more than nine surgical procedures during his lifetime, and a growing number of ED pills are dispensed to men in the U.S. (annually it’s around 1.2 million Viagra and almost 3.6 million Cialis), this is a warning lots of guys need to take seriously. We also predict that when generic Viagra is available this December, there will be a big increase in the size of the market — and with that, an increased risk for the one-two punch of ED drugs and anesthesia.

Our advice if you’re taking an ED medication and headed for surgery:

—Stop taking ED drugs 48 hours before the procedure; that will allow the drug to clear your system.

—Presurgery: Alert your anesthesiologist to all medications and supplements you’re taking, including ED meds. Your emergency contact also should know to tell medical staff about any ED drug use.

Hair dye linked to breast cancer

Did you know Kristen Stewart, star of the “Twilight” series, famous for her raven locks, actually has strawberry-blond hair? Scarlett Johansson, who we’re guessing you know as a blonde, is a natural brunette. And Katie Perry? Also origi-

nally blonde.

How about your hair? If you can’t remember what your hair’s natural color (or texture) looks like, a new study published in Carcinogenesis shows it would be a good idea — with a nod to Cindy Lauper — to let your true colors shine through.

Researchers looked at the hair product use data on over 4,000 women and found that dark hair-dye shades were associated with a 51 percent increased overall risk of breast cancer, and a 72 percent increased risk of estrogen-receptor positive breast cancer among African-Americans. The researchers think that it may be because darker dyes are more likely to be contaminated with chemicals such as endocrine disruptors and potential mutagens that have a destructive effect on cell genes. Also high-risk for some: hair relaxers. Their use is associated with a 74 percent increase in breast cancer in Caucasian women, but not African-American women. Go for both dark dye and hair straighteners? The risk jumps even higher.

So before you turn your tresses brunette or raven, talk to your doc about your risk of breast cancer and whether it makes sense to avoid dark hair dye. We suggest that everyone consider avoiding chemical relaxers. But if you do use one, know that the lye-based ones are considered most dangerous.

When your child becomes what you drink

“Prevengé,” a 2016 movie written, directed and starring Brit cult favorite Alice Lowe, is about a pregnant woman whose fetus instructs her to do terrible things. While that’s clearly a fantasy scenario, sometimes the opposite — a pregnant woman directing her unborn’s be-

havior — is not.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 10 percent of pregnant women say they’ve had some alcohol, and one out of every 33 admits to binge drinking in the past 30 days. That indulgence can cause terrible things to happen to a fetus — and your future child. What’s more, according to a new lab study published in the journal Cerebral Cortex, the damage doesn’t stop there. It can be passed on through subsequent generations, to grandchildren and great-grandchildren!

Besides triggering these behavioral problems and maybe fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, depression, anxiety and impulse control problems, drinking while pregnant can make it more likely that your offspring will have to contend with addiction.

Research scientists at the University at Buffalo Institute on Addictions found that prenatal exposure to alcohol triggers changes in reward systems of the brain, mostly affecting the brain’s own cannabis-like chemicals called endocannabinoids. Those changes persist and make an adult’s dopamine neurons more sensitive to an abused drug’s effect. That increases vulnerability to addiction.

So don’t listen to reports that say a sip or two during pregnancy is OK. There’s no reason to ever risk your future generations’ health and happiness. Want to raise a glass? Stick with some bubbly apple juice!

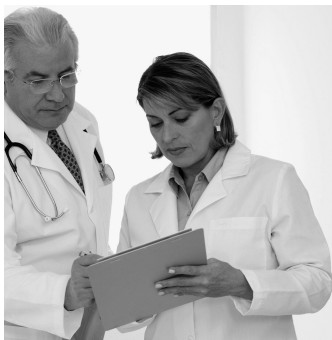

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TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS AT BOYNE MOUNTAIN RESORT

Defending Champion Korey Mahoney Leads Tournament of Champions

BOYNE FALLS – Korey Mahoney picked up right where he left off shooting a 6-under 66 on the Alpine course to take the lead through the first round of the Tournament of Champions at Boyne Mountain Resort Monday.

The 33-year-old former mini-tour player from Manton, last year’s champion, is still selling insurance, and is playing in his only tournament of the year.

The opening 66 gave him the narrow lead on three golfers at 67 – this summer’s Michigan Open champion Matt Thompson of Marshall Country Club, mini-tour golfer Mike Nagy of Manistique and Brian Cairns of Fox Hills Learning Center in Plymouth.

Lee Houtteman of Manitou Passage in Glen Arbor, the 2011 champion, and Joey Garber, a Boyne-sponsored mini-tour player from Petoskey, shot 68, and three golfers checked in with 69s – Oakland University golfer James Kneen of White Lake, former PGA Tour pro Tom Gillis of Lake Orion and last year’s runner-up, Eric Lilleboe, a mini-tour player from Okemos.

“I’ve been playing golf and getting ready for this week, and it feels great to get off to a good start,” said Mahoney who a year ago shot a closing 64 to win. “I have always loved this course and came close to winning here back when I was play-

ing (mini-tours). I came back last year just to have fun and compete again, and it is kind of the same feeling this week. I play pressure free. I’m just here to have fun.”

The field of 115 golfers, all champions of selected significant Michigan golf championships, includes juniors, seniors, professionals and amateurs of both sexes all playing for one title from different tee positions. They play a second round Tuesday, this time on the Monument course, before a 36-hole cut determines the low 60 scorers and ties for Wednesday’s final round on the Alpine in the 54-hole \$55,000 championship.

Mahoney said bogeys with tree troubles on Nos. 13 and 14 were the only problems in his round.

“I got refocused after that and birdied 15, 16 and 17 coming in,” he said. “I made sure I got a good round out of the way I was playing.”

Cairns, a senior professional at age 53, led the morning wave of tee times with his 67 and predicted somebody would top the score.

“It’s out there today because the golf course is in perfect shape and the wind just cools you off,” he said. “I had a no stress round. I stuck to my plan and hit driver every hole. I’m going to stay with the plan and stay aggressive.”

Thompson, playing in his first

Tournament of Champions as the Michigan Open winner, shot 5-under 31 on the back nine with eagle on No. 12 and birdies on Nos. 13, 15 and 17.

“I had chances on the front and didn’t make anything,” said the 27-year-old former mini-tour player who just this year took the head professional job at Marshall CC. “Once I got that eagle putt to go in at 12 and made a good birdie at 13 the round jump-started.”

Nagy, a 24-year-old first-year professional coming off a \$16,000 win on the Dakotas Tour eight days ago, said his round was nothing flashy.

“I managed to make some birdies and not make too many mistakes,” said the former University of Tennessee golfer. “I’ve been playing great and I’m trying to keep it going. Winning early in my pro career was definitely a big boost. I’m confident my game is going in the

right direction.”

Steve Vecellio of Birmingham Country Club, who shot 70, had the shot of the day with a hole-in-one on No. 3. He hit a 5-iron 188 yards and it rolled in the hole for the fourth hole-in-one of his career.

Here’s a look at seeing things from another point of view

MICHIGAN — As athletes, parents, fans, supporters and sometimes administrators, we often forget about the importance of a referee or umpire that officiates our games.

At one time or another, most people associate sports officials as the people that show up just before game time and with a few whistles or calls, could ruin your sports evening. But without their commitment to their craft, sports would not be the same.

What does a sports official bring to the table? Sports officials are put in place to enforce the rules of the activity and as some would call it, “police the action”.

While the game of sport is filled with judgment calls, it is oftentimes the ones that would never dream of putting on a striped shirt or protective mask that are the biggest critics. And while some calls are missed or incorrect, it is the human factor aspect that keeps a lot of calls during playing action exciting.

Each official has a responsibility to cover an area in their respective contest, so it does no good to holler at an official that is on the opposite side of the playing surface about a call that was not their responsibility. As games get faster the officials are moving to position themselves to make proper calls, they may miss something along the way. So next time you blame the ref, perhaps you’ll stop and consider whether you could have done a better job.

Every sporting event has that one “person” who is a major critic. They often don’t know the rules of the game, or in fact understand them, but still feel the need to holler and scream, oftentimes embarrassing the institution and the players participating in the contest.

I believe it is important that all those involved in the game, in any capacity, appreciate the value they add.

What are some of the benefits of being a sports official? Umpiring or becoming a referee for any sport provides you so much more than just the ability to officiate the rules of the game. It can make you feel connected, respected or energized.

Connected – Officiating is a great way to make friends for life and be an integral part of the vibrant

sports community.

Respected – Officials provide the opportunity for everyone to play the game in a safe, fair and enjoyable environment. Officiating also develops skills that can be used for life: communication, resilience and leadership just to name a few!

Energized – Officiating lets you experience the thrill of the game, contributes towards maintaining a healthy lifestyle and offers a pathway to participate in the sport at the highest level.

There are many opportunities to become involved as official in Michigan, the MHSAA is always looking for new or more men and women that enjoy working with schools and athletes with clear pathways and support structures available for those aspiring to officiate at the highest level.

Without officials, there would be no organized sports. If you’ve ever played a game of pickup basketball or recreation baseball/softball, you are sure to relate to knowing what

it is like to go without an official. Sports officiating is an honorable hobby or second occupation that seeks people, male and female age 18 and up, with strong moral character and integrity.

Bill Case, a local official was asked a few questions regarding his take on becoming an official.

(Q) Why did you get into officiating?

(A) Getting into officiating was a win/win for me. At first I thought having some extra money would be nice. But after you do it for awhile it becomes much more than that. My dad officiated basketball for years, I suppose that played into me starting. Ultimately, I’m such a sports fan that this was the best way for me to stay involved in the sports I love.

(Q) What do you feel you get out of umpiring/refing?

(A) It feels good to give back to the sports that I grew up playing. There is such a need for officials right now, so it’s nice to know that I’m helping in that aspect. It’s very nice to see these young student-athletes progress from middle school thru high school.

(Q) What is it like to see the game from another perspective?

(A) It’s very different, the calls always seem much easier from the stands or behind the fence. It’s like anything else you do, you have to be confident and always work hard to improve.

That being said, to become an official, you must be fair, have the courage to make tough and quick decisions and possess excellent people skills to build rapport and professional relationships with fellow officials, coaches, athletes and administration.
