City Commission Meeting of Boyne City, Jan. 14, 2025

Boyne City Commissioners Receive Financial Award in Excellence

Upon submitting a financial report for 2023, Boyne City was awarded the Government Finance Officers Association Award in Excellence for financial reporting at the committee meeting on January 14, 2025.

City Auditor Joe Verlin stated that only 49 of the reporting cities in Michigan received this honor and Boyne is receiving the award for the eighth consecutive year for submitting the audit. Verlin said, "The city has \$10,586,248 of unrestricted net position as of April 30, 2024. That number is very much theoretical. What does matter is whether or not that number is improving or decreasing over time. Total revenues for the city came in at \$12,260,599 during the year. Total expenses came in at \$10,266,000 leading to an increase in that position of just about \$2,000,000 during the course of the year...

So that second bullet point shows the revenues and expenses at an increase in that position of \$1.994 million. The third bullet point shows that the governmental fund of the city is the general funds, all the governmental funds of this city had a total ending fund balance of \$7,268,515. That represented an increase of about \$1.54 million during



of fund balance. The last bullet point -fifth bullet point shows that the general fund has unassigned fund balance of \$4,891,602. So the unassigned fund balance is the most important element of fund balance within the city's financial statements. It's the amount that the city has available for day-to-day cost of running the city. They can use it for wages, utilities, supplies, things of that nature."

Verlin concluded that the city balance has about one year's worth of reserves and reported an increase in cash and investments of \$1.5 million. The city earned 11.6% percent on pension assets during the year, which drove down liability. The complete report is available online. Commissioners also discussed a proposed easement at 647 Woodland Drive. The

in 2023. Commissioners emphasized that the city is not giving away public land, rather attempting to arrive at a solution for a landlocked property that will provide public access at the property.

Commissioner Sandy Pritchard pointed out that a portion of the land falls under Evangeline Township. The property owner had proposed a four-foot-wide woodchip path for public access. Previously, the city proposed a City Waterfront Master Plan in 2006 which created a plan for the site along with other waterfront properties. Mayor Tim Nemecek along with Evangeline Township contacted **Executive Director Pat** Weeks of the Charlevoix County Road Commission for input regarding the project. The current driveway goes across the platted

roadway into the township.

The property in discussion was originally in the Glenwood Beach Resort Plat of 1907 area where a promenade for townspeople had been proposed. Several detailed maps were presented for viewing including an aerial map of the property today, the plat map of 1907, a map of the proposed easement, and a map of the 2006 plans for the property.

Owner Mary Ellen Sheets said, "I would never have thought to stop people using the public right away. I thought by cleaning it up it was a win-win for us and Boyne City..., I never meant to take the public access away from the people."

Reviews for the proposed easement were mixed and several citizens requested clarification regarding the use and care of the land and existing property. Commissioner Marty Moody stated he had received calls about the easement with concerns that city land would be given to the property owners. He clarified that the easement would be created and not granted to the property owners.

Commissioner Moody said, "As far as the easement itself this started when we were looking to clean up these road ends and get this property cleaned up... going forward I think the road ends will be taken care of a lot better if we mark them off properly, stake

them properly with actual markers so the Joe Public will know when they're on or off or where they should be on public lands."

The commissioner expressed hopes that the easement would allow for the public to view the lake access more clearly and open the area for the enjoyment of all citizens and visitors.

Commissioner Pritchard referred to the original Plat map from 1907 that designated the property as being in front of a road. According to Pritchard, the land had access in 2006 and 2023.

Commissioner Pritchard said, "I would like to begin with the statement that it's a road end. If you look at the Glenwood Beach Resort Plat and this is so cool, because it was in 1907, this guy designed a subdivision and at that time, it was still horse and buggies. The road if you will notice, there are beginning from your right, there is a Shady Lane that is now full-on grass.

Yes it does show in 1907, Woodland Drive continuing to the lake and I gather that the lake was down at that point because it does say that they wanted to have a promenade and people would be allowed to go in front of the homes all the way down and if you proceed to your left there is

another Birch Place, which I don't know the status of, but it's overgrown and I don't know if the family lives across the road is allowed to use it, I don't know if that's public access or if it's somehow appropriated. Is it public access as well? Is it Evangeline?

My point being that then you come down to what is shown as the park, I mean this guy was thinking ahead. He has a wharf. You know, it was going to be allowing for the boats to run back and forth to town. And the road, if you notice the road shifted in front of the properties. And what you had in the back was a horse lane and the carriages were to be in the back."

Pritchard summarized the state of the land Plat by saying, "It's been known for years that this piece of property has been landlocked, and I appreciate

the developments that have been made, but they are extensive and that includes a great deal of very expensive landscaping that you did put in. But if you look at any of these, the cabin itself encroached upon the public access," Pritchard said.

Mayor Nemechek summarized his opinion of the issue and said, "I know that I've sat here for three years, and it has been a consensus for this commission to earmark these public access points to take care of these public access points to permanently landmark these public access points and three years later we're still talking about it... I know I'm for it. At the end of the day, it's not giving away public property, it's finding a solution that's the most win-win situation for all parties involved."

The motion for the easement was tabled. The Commission proceeded

to introduce an ordinance for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund which provides for septic systems to continue to be used until the system no longer functions, when new buildings are constructed, or when an existing septic system is being modified. The ordinance will be sent to EGLE for approval and will be open for future readings.

Maple Lawn and Wilson cemeteries requested bids for maintenance. Two bids were received, and the contract for \$165,000 was awarded to Rainey's Landscaping LLC. if fertilizing is included in services.

Commissioners approved the submission of a grant millage of \$10,000 for the Top of Michigan Mountain Bike Association (TOMMBA) for the maintenance of the Boyne Forest Trail System and for a changing station at the portion of trail system pertaining to the city.

The organization raised \$8,500 and will request a grant of \$10,000 from Charlevoix County Parks millage. The total cost of the project is \$18,000. It was stated that an average of 170 riders per day enjoy the trails from June to September.

The Commissioners discussed snow removal and the Downtown Development Authority's role in keeping streets, corners, crosswalks, and ramps clear. Planning and zoning or police were named in an ordinance for enforcement. The existing ordinance has not been enforced. The city is the enforcement agency, the Department of Public Works is the lead agency with regards to that but has gaps. On weekends it falls to the police department if there is an emergency. If there is a violation, the planning director should be contacted.

Emily grew up in Loveland, Ohio, near Cincinnati, attended schools there and then on to Michigan State to run track and cross country under the coaching of Walter Drenth, who grew up in Charlevoix. Emily majored in Environmental Biology and Zoology. More about that later.

Emily won individual Big Ten titles in cross-country, 3k and in the 5k both indoor and outdoors seasons.




the DNR, and others.




well as a search and rescue operation for a missing teenage paddle boarder.

Emergency Fund for Teens

Dear Dave,

Our son is in high school, and he has a car and a part-time job nights and weekends. We've worked with him on saving, spending and giving, but should a teenager have an emergency fund, too? If so, how much do you recommended them setting aside?

-Dominic

Dear Dominic,

This is a great question! I'm glad to know you're working with your son and teaching him wise financial habits.

I always recommend an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses for adults, and I think that's a fair expectation for teens, as well. He won't need as big an emergency fund as a married couple with kids if his expenses consist only of those connected to his car and social life. So, I'd suggest him saving up three months' worth of what it takes to operate the car-gas, insurance and maintenance.

I think those are fair financial responsibilities for a responsible teen in his situation.

Dear Dave,

I'm a non-traditional student in my last semester of college. In May, I'll graduate with a degree in elementary education and have a job waiting for me. It will bring our household income up to a little over \$100,000. We're already living on a budget, but the problem is we'll have \$15,000 in student loan debt to repay, plus \$5,000 in credit card debt. What should we address first?

Dear Marta,

It sounds like all your hard work is about to pay off in a big way. And I've got some more good news for you. If you two keep living the way you have been, and put the rest toward debt, you can have that student loan and credit card debt knocked out in just a year or so.

But I want you to pay close attention to what I'm about to say next. Just because you're making more money doesn't mean you should start buying a bunch of toys or pick up a car payment. Sit down together now—don't wait—and practice making a written monthly budget based on your new income. Give every dollar a name before you spend it, and don't forget to work the debt snowball, too. List your debts from smallest to largest, make minimum payments on the largest, and then attack that credit card debt with a vengeance.

Chances are you can get the credit card debt taken care of in two or three months. Then, roll the money from that payment over, and apply it and any other cash you can scrape Dave up toward the student loan

> With just a little more work, you folks are going to find yourselves in a really great place soon!

Thanks to the coordination of school nurse, Jamie Klooster, The Health Department of Northwest Michigan and Dental Clinics North brought a dental sealant clinic to Ellsworth Community School for Kindergarten through 8th grade students.

Dental hygienists completed dental assessments, fluoride applications and when needed, they applied sealants and silver diamine fluoride (SDF).

Sealants are a thin, plastic coating that covers the grooves on molars to help keep food and bacteria from causing cavities. If cavities are already present, applying SDF stops the growth of bacteria which can help stop the progression of a cavity from getting worse.

After an office space at the elementary school was converted into a temporary dental clinic, 30 students




The girls' team finished 4th in both events and





How Can Two Similar Homes Vary in Price by More Than \$10,000?

Forgetting, for a moment, the interior improvements that set one home apart from another, there are exterior factors that also influence price. For instance, homes on primary ingress and egress streets - that is, the main streets that lead in and out of a tract - generally appreciate more slowly than those within the tract that are not on primary streets.

Primary ingress/egress streets generate more traffic and are therefore, generally less desirable. Thus, they have lower prices.

Within a tract, a home on a cul-de-sac may generate a higher price for the same reason-less traffic. Cul-desacs are frequently like a maze and they discourage drive-throughs, which is, of course, a definite benefit to residential privacy.

Even properties on one side of a street can be worth more than a similar property across from it. Why? Certain communities, because of their name, are more prestigious than others.

Beverly Hills, California, of course, is one. It is known worldwide for its high-end shopping, expensive housing and impeccable name. In sections where Beverly Hills is divided from other cities and/or communities by a street, the homes on the Beverly Hills

side of the avenue command a higher price than those in the non-Beverly Hills city across from it.

Existing homes may differ radically in price for another reason-one homeowner wants to sell, and the other has to sell. The motivation for each is quite different, and so may be the pricing strategies.


Some other factors that influence price: What commercial developments are adjacent to the tract? How (un)desirable are they? And, don't forget supply and demand.

The wise buyer checks one other thing-a community's master plan. This is a must, especially if a tract (or home) is surrounded by vacant land. Most communities have one. It is usually drawn up by planners within the city of county and approved by a local planning commission. Find out what is going to be built nearby and determine how it might impact the value of the tract.

All this, of course, takes time and homework. But, it is well worth it, especially when you consider that the purchase of a home is usually going to be the largest, single financial investment most people make in a lifetime.





