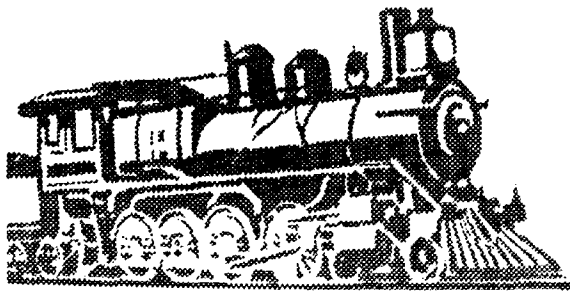


Weather

East Jordan tax increase

The East Jordan City Council adopted a resolution of intent to raise property taxes 3 mills at a meeting May 3.

The 1994-95 fiscal budget is based on revenues from the tax increase, which will raise general operating taxes to 18.6 mills.

According to the language of the resolution, the increase is necessary to continue to provide the current level of services to the community and to avoid further depletions of cash reserves.

Council will hold a public hearing on the increase Tues., May 17, 6:30 p.m. at the City Hall.

The council also approved a resolution to increase city water rates for the first time since 1984.

City Superintendent Bob Johnson explained the increase as a necessity because "we only have enough revenue for day-to-day operations." Johnson said the increase will amount to about 12 percent for the typical user. A \$12 per year fire stand-by fee will be charged to all customers, whether they have continuous service or not.

The new charges will be reflected starting with the July 1 billing quarter.

Owners must scoop

Dog owners walking their animals in the City of East Jordan will be in violation of the amended pet ordinance if they fail to scoop.

The amendment provides that "no person shall permit...an animal to defecate at a location which is not the owner's property." However, pet owners can avoid the violation by immediately removing the offending pile to a trash receptacle or other permissible disposal area.

The amendment will become enforceable at the beginning of June.

Yard refuse costs

A request by resident Donna Anderson resulted in a break in yard clean-up costs for senior citizens.

Anderson told of raking 22 bags of leaves from her elderly mother's property.

"Fifty cents a bag makes it hard on the budget," said Anderson. She complained that many leaves came from neighbor's yards and "city trees."

Council member Greg Chappuies explained that the bag price was raised because the costs of yard refuse pick-up were sinking the budget.

"It was an attempt to recover some of the cost from those using the service," said Chappuies. He agreed that seniors should get a break, so he moved that the cost per bag be 15 cents for senior citizens.

Council member Guy Vallance pointed out that the bags cost the city 19 cents each. He objected to losing money, but Ruth Gee seconded the motion and the council passed the 15 cents per bag cost.

The cost will only pertain to new purchases. No refunds on previous purchases will be given.

Mayor arrested

The East Jordan Police Department reported the arrest of Mayor Russell A. Peck in the early morning hours of Sun., May 1.

Peck, 38, was arrested at 2:25 a.m. for operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor and was transported to the Charlevoix County Jail. He was released on a \$200 bond at 3:22 p.m. Sunday.

Peck was scheduled for arraignment at 10:30 a.m. May 10 in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix.

Deputy reprimanded

A Charlevoix County deputy sheriff will be disciplined for killing a cat with his service revolver.

The incident took place April 30, in South Arm Township, when the officer was responding to a domestic dispute. The officer was seriously bitten by a cat, who also bit its owner. When the officer was attacked by the cat again, he fired at it.

The deputy was treated at a local hospital for the injury. The cat is being evaluated for disease.

Department policy requires an investigation whenever an officer discharges his or her weapon (except when destroying injured wild animals such as deer.) It was determined by the incident hearing board that the officer made an error in judgement.

"This deputy has been a dedicated, loyal, honest and hard-working sheriff's officer for 13 years. I concur with the shooting incident hearing board that he made an error in judgement," said Sheriff George T. Lasater. Lasater said he wanted to work with the officer, as well as dealing with the incident.

"We can still salvage this officer and correct the problem so this type of incident does not happen again," Lasater continued. He noted that the officer has received numerous letters of commendation during his department tenure.

The deputy will be removed from law enforcement duties for 30 days and reassigned as a communication/security officer in the jail. During that period he will be evaluated by a police psychologist. He will also be required to review firearm policies and orientation of use of firearms with the Sheriff's office certified firearms instructor.

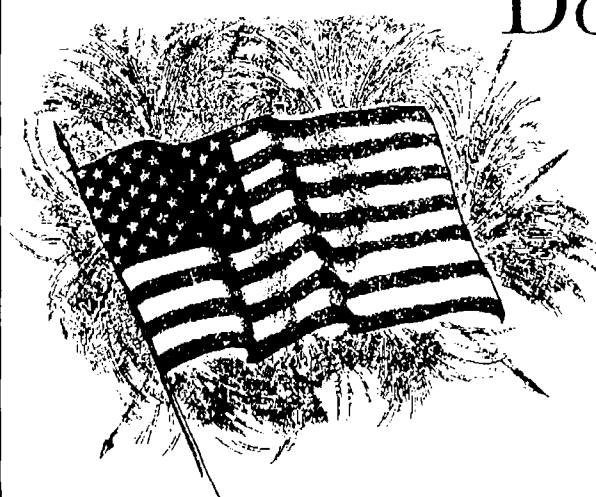

Finding beauty in common castaways

Two East Jordan area women, artists and friends, will celebrate their common bond in an exhibition at the Jordan River Arts Council May 15-22.

Celebrating their environment in art is one of the characteristics Hazel Colburn and Betty Osborne share. Both are still life and landscape artists and though they diverge stylistically and in the media they choose, their subject matter may often be the same.

That's because they both love to paint or draw old things, used things.

"I like to paint things people have used and handled," Osborne explained, with Colburn nodding in agreement.

They scrounge flea markets and garage sales and both save objects and "junk" to paint.

"Objects develop character as they age - all the little knicks and bumps," said Colburn. "We don't like new or plastic things."

Colburn, who sketches with pen and ink or colored pencils, as well as painting in watercolors, seeks out old buildings,

or even the remainders of old buildings. She photographs intriguing sections of a window or foundation, a burned wall or peeling paint; then she sketches from the photo.

"I rarely do a full building," said Colburn. "The lighting, the stonework or beams are very inspiring."

Colburn, who grew up on a farm in the East Jordan area, sees herself as documenting the utilitarian lifestyle, fascinated by the farm implements or piles of old objects commonly found on farms.

Although expressing herself through oil painting alone, Osborne also forms links with the past. For example, she is currently painting a series that includes pieces of antique lacework from her collection.

"I like the connection between my painting it and the woman who did the lace," she explained. "I hope to spark memories," she continued, speaking for Colburn as well.

Colburn often sketches or draws people. Though her three children are common subjects, she enjoys fashioning Victorian-style women. While Osborne doesn't put people in her paintings,

"you know they are nearby - a glove is left, a teacup, or piece of lace," she noted.

Both women grew up in artistic families and always had materials available. And while neither had a formal art education, they agree that the need to express themselves this way comes from deep inside. The tools and skills are gained through individual study and practice.

Both noted that the substantial community of artists in the East Jordan area encourages them, as well as the natural beauty of the surroundings.

"We inspire each other," said Osborne.

The friends collect each other's work, inspiring and influencing as well. Their bond seems like that of sisters. It's thicker than, well, paint.

The exhibition, with a variety of works by Hazel Colburn and Betty Osborne will open with a reception Sun., May 15, from 2-4 p.m. at the Jordan River Arts Council Center, 301 Main St., East Jordan. Continuing through May 22, the gallery is open 12-4 p.m. daily.

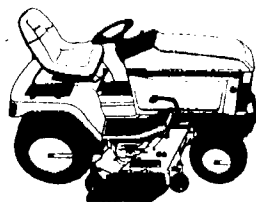
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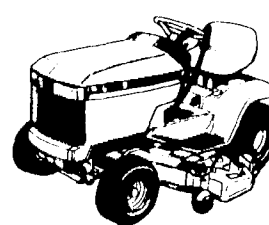
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Lionesses honored

Survey looks at progress of former students

ELLSWORTH—The E² Task Force began mailing out surveys this week to people who graduated from Ellsworth schools or who attended but dropped out.

Targeted are those who graduated or left school within the last five years. The survey asks what the people did immediately after leaving and where they moved, if anywhere. It also asks what became of the former students four years after they attended Ellsworth schools.

The task force is a group of parents, students, teachers, non-teaching student employees, business leaders and citizens of the community interested in improving the Ellsworth school system.

Task force membership isn't rigid, and it varies from about 15 to 25 people, superintendent Rick Diebold said.

The task force hopes to learn if what the kids are being taught in Ellsworth is helping them at college

or in the job market.

"For the college kids, we want to know if they had to take any remedial courses at college. Are they still going? Did they graduate?" Diebold said.

"For the other kids — how long did it take them to get into the job market? Did they have to relocate? Were they refused a job or promotion because they lacked skills in math, science or English?"

The survey asks the former students to critique other areas of their education in Ellsworth as well.

Teachers, counselors and administrators will

also be evaluated in the survey.

In the past, E² surveyed parents and students still in school. The group hopes to take the information they obtain, develop specific school improvement goals, and present them to the school board, Diebold said.

Central Lake seventh in Posen

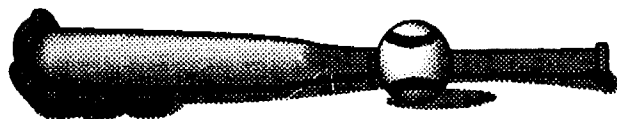
Central Lake runners traveled to the Posen relays May 6, coming out of the pack to finish a respectable seventh overall.
