
Weather



Jordan Valley Freedom Festival preview

What do baby elephants, storybook parades, basketball, triathlons, miniature golf, talent shows, dunking tanks and fireworks all have in common?

The 12th annual Jordan Valley Freedom Festival, that's what! This year's festival, from Thursday through Sunday, June 30 to July 3, promises to be bigger and better than ever.

"We're still adding to the activities," said festival board director Dawn Pringle. "Requests for concession and game spaces keep coming in."

Carnival games, as well as the East Jordan Garden Club Farmer's Market are just two of the most recent additions.

Shows and entertainment include Laura the Baby Elephant; There's magic in books; a children's magic show; a country variety show; an art exhibit; local talent shows; a battle of the bands; a brass showband

and fireworks.

Two parades, the grand parade with a large number of entries, and the youth parade, "Celebrate with storybook characters," are planned for July 2.

Sports events include a triathalon requiring contestants to swim, cycle and run; a "3 on 3" basketball tournament; a Par 1 "closest to the pin" competition; and "orange crate" races.

Concessions, games, crafts sale and a flea market will continue through the weekend.

"I'm really excited," said Pringle. "There's so much going on." She credits her Freedom Festival board and other helpers for putting it all together.

"We have really good people," she said.

A \$1,000 give-away raffle, as well as festival supporter buttons are helping to fund the fireworks. But according to Pringle, the board still needs donations.

THE 12TH ANNUAL Jordan Valley Freedom Festival promises to be even bigger and better than last year's parades and festival. A variety of activities is planned, beginning Thurs., June 30 through Sun., July 3.

"Last year, the city gave \$5,000," said Pringle. "This year there is no city funding for the fireworks." She said the cost of the Saturday evening spectacular is about \$6,000.

"Fortunately, East Jordan businesses have really come through," she continued.

Pringle said the banners, signs and T-shirts this year will be extra special. Mark and Penny Postma of Signs Letters & Graphics designed and produced them. Brackets for hanging banners were financed by a special holiday banner fund from the City of East Lordan.

Papa was umpire: The Bennett Family baseball team

In the early 1900s in East Jordan, "baseball" and "The Bennett Team" were synonymous terms.

William J. Bennett, an avid baseball fan, who owned 615 mostly wooded acres south of town, kept a crew of 35 or 40 men (including his nine sons) cutting timber.

It was always easy to a good ballplayer to secure work with Mr. Bennett and many stayed with him for several years.

East Jordan men also formed the habit of loading into a dray Saturday afternoons, driving out to the Bennett Farm, and playing ball all afternoon. They usually stayed for a big supper, topped off with four or five gallons of homemade ice cream.

The Bennetts' first bat and ball were brought home from town by the oldest son, Bert, in the summer of 1900. That evening Duncan McMillan, a neighbor who was working at the Bennetts went out to play with the boys.

Unfortunately, the game ended in disaster when Duncan threw the ball to Short, who caught it on the point of the bat, driving it up under catcher Bert's nose and breaking it. Mother Gertrude lost interest in the game as Bert came into the kitchen with blood streaming down over his clothing.

Their first catcher's glove was made by Mr. Bennett from a sheepskin. Later, two Grand Rapids players, catcher Jim Best and shortstop Johnny Plast, came to East Jordan, went broke and sold their chest protector, mask and glove to Mr. Bennett.

This equipment demanded real suits, so he bought a quantity of heavy black cloth from which Mrs. Bennett made uniforms for the team. Nothing but the best would do for his team, although Mr. Bennett had no idea what kind of material should be used. So the boys sweltered for years in the thick suits, lettered across with the name, ECHO in green felt, after the name of their township.

The nine boys were born between 1883 and 1907 and by 1904 four of them; Bert, Cal, Hank and Short, were on the regular team. As they grew up, the younger ones were taken on as older ones dropped off. They played only three games as a family team, the last one at Traverse City about 1915. Mr. Bennett never played, but acted as umpire.

When Saturday games with other teams were scheduled, the Echos always quit work at noon on Wednesday and spent the afternoon at the barn practicing. Mrs. Bennett appreciated these days because it meant she did not have to pack and send a noon lunch to the woods. If they were short-handed, Mr. Bennett would hitch up and drive to town and recruit players to make up his nine.

One member of the team was Frank Shortley, for-

merly with the Barney Kings, a major league team in Chicago. Drink had cost him his job with the Kings and he had drifted north into the Bennett fold.

Once when a game was coming up on Saturday, he went over to a neighbors' filled up on cider, then went to town for something stronger. He ended up in the village jail and sent for Bert. Shortley asked Bert to have his father get him out, but when Mr. Bennett learned where Frank was he told Marshal Bill Johnson to keep Frank there until time for Saturday's game.

One of the earlier girls teams, the Boston Bloomers Girls, came here for a game with the Bennetts in 1912, but were defeated 11-2. This team was owned and managed by Maud Plummer, who took them all over the United States. They played with the same type ball and field that the men used.

Hank Bennett was pitching that day and decided to go easy on the girls at the start, giving them two runs. His father and Dan Goodman said if it was going to be turned into a farce they would ask for their money back and go home. That ended the girls scoring.

There was one game the Echos played with the Bellaire Red Sox, in which the only score was made by Art Howard in one inning. He rounded the bases on four errors.

Another happy memory is of a game they played at Frederic. They were tied 6-6 in the last half of the ninth. With Frederic at bat and the bases loaded, a clean hit was made to right field.

Short was catching and as the man on third, a big fellow weighing more than 200 pounds, started for the plate, Short put his hands down pretending to catch the ball, then started for his opponent. The man turned and ran back to third where he met Pete Berg coming in from second base. Pitcher Bert Bennett, signaled Earl Batterbee to right field for the ball. Earl shot the ball to Short, who put out all three men. The game finally ended up in the Echos favor.

Bert recalls when he was serving on the board of supervisors during one of its sessions he was asked to play with the team against Mancelona at a Central Lake homecoming. The boys adjourned, and went to play the game.



Baseball, the Bennetts and Echo Township

Papa was umpire: The Bennett Family baseball team came to the Torch/Journal via John Bennett of East Jordan, formerly of Echo Township.

Now 91 years young, John is the last surviving brother

of the Bennett team. He still recalls the three games that the brothers all played together.

"We never won any," he chuckled, "because some of the brothers were too old by then, and some of us were too young!"

John, as second youngest, recalls being only about 12 years old in the three games.

The Echos were one of many ball clubs in the area. Although the game was young when William J. Bennett started the team, there was already plenty of

competition in the neighboring small towns. John recalls that annual fairs in every town always included tournaments. Several of the older Bennett boys were outstand-

ing players, and went on to play semi-professionally in Flint and elsewhere. The Echos were good enough in those early days to earn a chance to play against Ty Cobb and the Detroit Tigers in postseason, but unseasonably bad autumn weather cancelled the game.

John said he played ball until he got married to Ledah Barnes 69 years ago. Today, John and Ledah live comfortably at Lakeview Manor. They have photos of the Bennett homestead on Vance Road. and Ledah's family homestead in Pleasant Valley,

Most of the Bennett boys (they had no sisters) stayed in the area, and John can't even guess how many relatives he has around; but he does know that over 200 people showed up at his 90th birthday party last year and most of them were related!


Free scout registration








Ellsworth School Board Briefs: June 13 meeting

Possible budget deficit in '95

Even with all of their millages passing June 13, the school system could face tight financial times next year. The expected budget for the 1994-95 school year calls for a \$10,000 operational deficit, superintendent Rick Diebold said.

The deficit could occur because of two major employee expenses for the school system: Social Security and retirement funds.

Michigan schools, unlike previous years, have to cover Social Security expenses for their employees with no refund from the state.

"We prepared for this eventuality a lot better than some other school districts," Diebold said. "Many districts are spending well into fund deficits."

Retirement funds for school employees, to which schools must contribute, increased dramatically. Schools had to match 5 percent of every dollar of salary into the retirement fund in 1993-94. In 1994-95, they must match 14.21 percent.

"The amount we pay for retirement in our elementary school budget will increase from \$14,000 to \$38,000 next year," Diebold said.

"I anticipate that once the audit is complete for next year's budget, and the actual numbers are plugged in,

we'll be pretty close to break-even," he said.

Computer purchase plan approved

The board approved investing up to \$40,000 in a computer purchase program discussed at the May meeting.

The program will allow teachers and some other school employees to purchase a computer at the discounted rate the school receives. The employees could spend no less than \$1,000 and no more than \$3,000 for the units, hardware and some schoolapproved start-up software.

The board decided to finance the program through the school rather than through a bank.

"There's hardly any discernible difference in the bookkeeping and paperwork," Diebold said.

"As a financial investment, we'll get more return on our money than we could anywhere else. As an investment in people, we receive indescribable benefits," he said.

Diebold said employees in the program will have to pay off the purchase within two years through payroll deduction, at an interest rate to be set by the superin-

"I'll look at what the banks in our area are currently

charging for interest, and set ours one-half to one percent lower," he said. "Within two years, we'll have all \$40,000 back, plus whatever interest."

Diebold and principal Marv Ruis said they will pare down the applicants to "about five or 10" to interview before the full school board.



Texas Instruments jobs secure

CENTRAL LAKE – The recent arrival here of workers from a Texas Instrument Plant in Mexico has apparently sparked a flurry of speculation among some local residents.

Rumors range from the sale of the Central Lake T.I. facility to a Massachusetts company to the loss of fulltime status and benefits for local workers.

Plant manager Brad Cooper declined to comment on a possible sale of the facility, in keeping with the company's official policy on activities such as mergers, sales and acquisitions.

Human resource representative Sue Mahan stated the Mexican workers are involved in training on a line that will soon be transferred to the Mexican plant. About eight to 10 local workers are expected to travel to Mexico in July to complete the training process at the new site, she said.

The transfer of the line will not affect local workers at all, she added.

As for loss of full-time status and withdrawal of paid health coverage, "There have been no changes in regular employee benefits whatsoever," Mahan said.





Salmonella alert issued

The District Health oughly. Department has issued a warning concerning Salmonellosis.

It is an illness caused by the salmonella bacteria, found in the intestines of domestic and wild animals, including birds and poultry, pigs, cattle, rodents, and pets.

Salmonella is a commonly reported cause of food or waterborne illness, according to the health department. The majority of cases are isolated and many times the source is unknown.

Symptoms of the illness include headache, muscle aches and pains, fever, nausea, stomach pains and cramps, and diarrhea. In most cases the illness does not require treatment.

However, at times, individuals can become very ill and require medical treatment to include hospitalization.

Four cases have been reported since April in the Petoskey area. That local health department is conducting an investigation to determine if the cases are associated.

Simple measures in the kitchen can prevent many forms of intestinal illness.

- Choose foods processed for safety.
 - Cook food thor-

- Eat cooked foods immediately.
- · Store foods immedi-
- Reheat cooked goods thoroughly and quickly.
- Avoid contact between raw foods and cooked foods.
- Wash hands repeat-
- Do not prepare food if
- Maintain adequate hand washing facilities.
- · Do not touch readyto-eat foods served to others with your bare hands.
- · Keep all kitchen surfaces meticulously clean.

- · Protect foods from insects, rodents, and other animals.
- Use water and ice from approved sources.
- Frozen food must be thawed in a refrigerator, or under cold running water, or in a microwave, or as part of the cooking process.

The local health department can answer questions and concerns about food safety or food handling.

The important factor for the public to know, according to the department, is how to prevent the spread of illness.



Central Lake Township Briefs - June 15 meeting

Plea for lower speed limit

The board was approached by Rev. Ralph Dunlop and his wife Mary Helen with an appeal for support to lower the speed limit on East Torch Lake Drive from 55 to 45 mph.

The Dunlops presented a petition with 324 signatures of residents or regular travelers on the road supporting the reduction.

They also told the board they have the support of Helena and Forest Home townships, as well as Sheriff Dale Roggenbeck.

Ralph Dunlop stated the reasons the change was necessary as:

- Between Alden and Eastport, the road is increasingly residential.
 - There are many curves, hills and blind spots.
- There is danger for drivers entering or exiting driveways and side roads.

Dunlop said a delegation will approach the State Highway Patrol in Traverse City with the documentation of support from residents, townships and the sheriff department. The state will conduct a traffic study and decide if conditions warrant a change.

Supervisor Paul Vernon discussed other township roads that may also need lowered speed limits, including Rushton Road and East Intermediate Lake Road. Vernon suggested tabling the issue until a review can be made on all the roads.

The suggestion prompted another resident of East Torch Lake Drive, John Ross, to appeal to the board to act on the Dunlops' presentation immediately.

"While I'm sure the other roads are worthy of consideration, it's important to act on this project quickly," Ross said. "The sheriff is anxious to have the state survey done this summer."

Ross said the last survey was done during autumn months when road use was not as intense and the state elected not to make a change.

The board then approved a resolution to support the Dunlops' efforts.

Auditor's review

Board supervisor Paul Vernon conducted an assessment of the auditor's review for the 1993-94 budget. He called the results positive and commended the board and fire department for their efforts on the budget.

The township was able to resolve a discrepancy on records filed improperly with the IRS during the 1990 fiscal year. The township will receive a refund on an overpayment made in May to prevent a fine while the problem was being corrected.

Vernon recommended the auditor, Tobin & Co., be invited to the July meeting to explain the audit and answer any questions.

Audience comments

Township resident William Bybee pointed out several errors in the treasurer's report, as well as commenting on remarks made by Vernon. It was reported in local press that Vernon said he intends to make public the names of those who circulated and signed the petition requesting his recall.

"I signed the petition," said Bybee. "I don't like it that you're trying to intimidate people."

Bill Scholtes, Florida resident who owns property and summers in the township, spoke in support of Vernon.

"You must be sure you have a candidate with the qualifications to replace Paul," he told the audience. "Well, let's hear who it is."

Diane Boatwright asked the board why a letter written by her husband Cliff had not been read at the meeting.

She was told the letter had been improperly addressed to the clerk only, instead of the full board.






