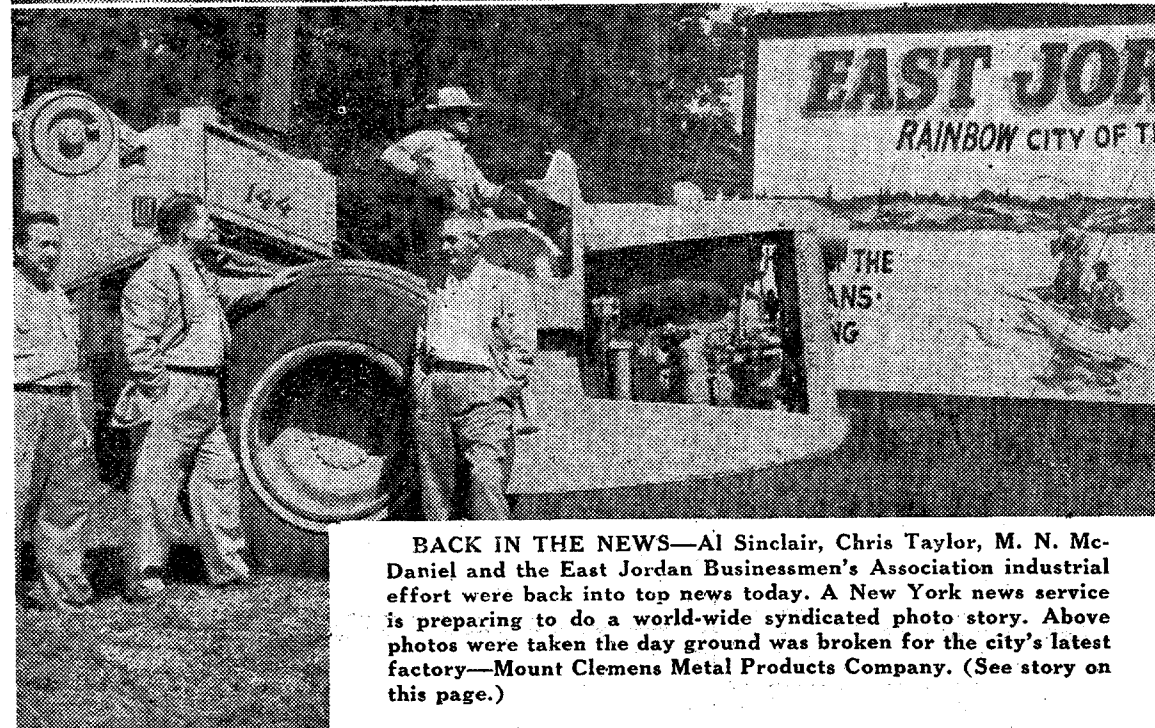
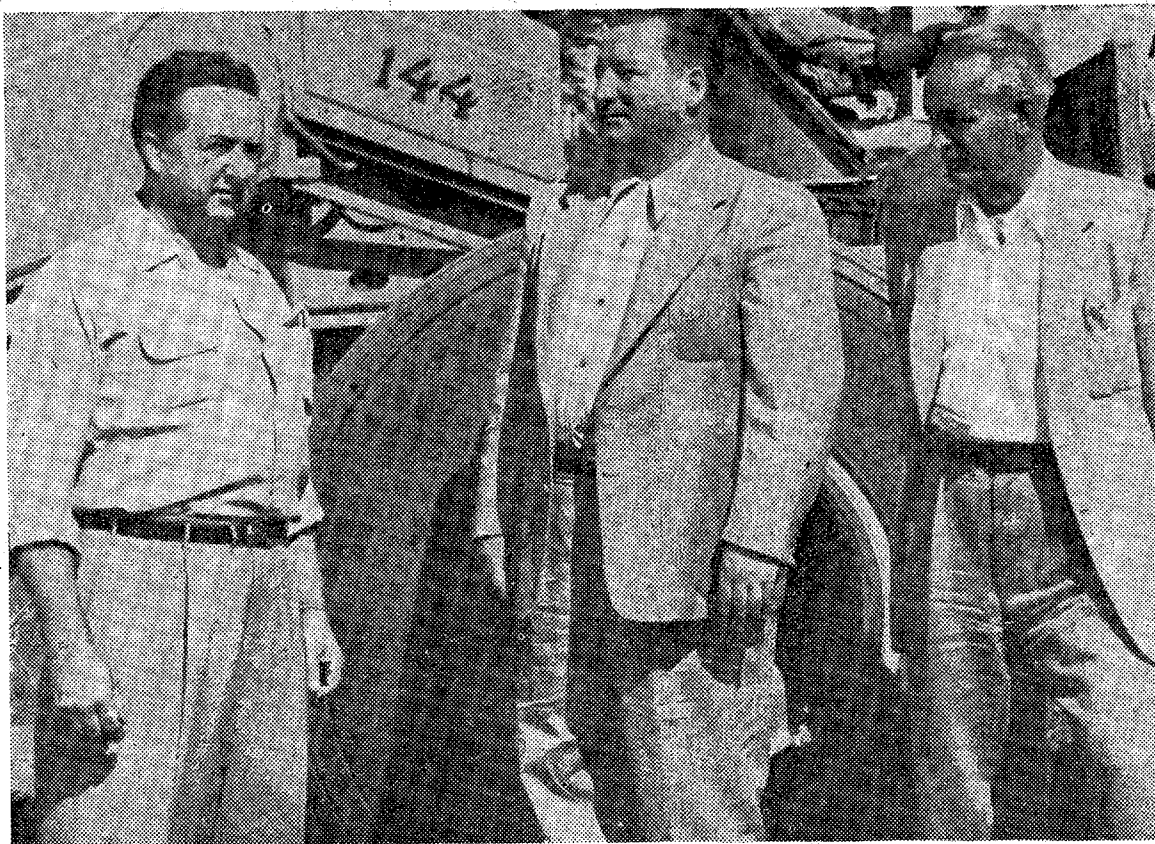

East Jordan Farm Woman Sells Home Invention

Local Songsters To Compete At Wolverine High

Saturday was a big day for Mrs. Gordon Gibson, of East Jordan route 2.

She was in Detroit selling baby bibs at a large Woodward avenue store.

The store introduced her home-made plastic bib which she designed here in East Jordan for her 18-month old son who kept dumping cereal in his lap.

The bib fastens over arms of the high chair as well as the neck of the baby, and cups up in front, catching anything baby spills.

THE BIB WAS designed at her farm home on the Peninsula road. She has turned out 5,000 of the bibs and after attempting to open a Detroit market for them has been given opportunity to sell them at least at one Detroit store.

Her husband, who has helped at night with the production work on the new-type bib, rigged up a kitchen-table system for cutting six dozen at a time.

Mrs. Gibson had hoped to introduce the bibs on the Detroit market last winter. But the hazards of farming prevented.

Farming has been easier, however, than making her way past secretaries and assistants who surround buyers in Detroit stores.

If mothers find the bib as useful as she did, Mrs. Gibson with the help of neighboring farm women of East Jordan, is set to go into big scale production.

At the time the News-Herald learned of her invention, Mrs. Gibson was in Detroit and could not be contacted personally before press time.

Primrose Trial Set At Bellaire

Eugene Primrose, 23, of R-1 Elmira, is under \$200 bond awaiting trial in circuit court at Bellaire as the result of a negligent homicide charge brought against him by East Jordan residents who were in an auto accident January 7th near Alba.

Antrim County Prosecutor Harry Cook, of Bellaire told the News-Herald Wednesday that Primrose appeared before Justice Raymond C. Sexton Monday and after examination was bound over to the March term of court. Circuit Judge is Charles L. Brown, of Traverse City.

The charge was brought against Primrose when his auto crashed into another driven by Mrs. Glen Campau, of East Jordan. It was a head-on smashup.

Mrs. Martha Dean, 70, of Brown City was killed outright and Mrs. Beatrice Graham, 44, of East Jordan was sent to the hospital seriously injured. Mrs. Campau was first to be released from a Gaylord hospital after the accident, Mrs. Campau and Mrs. Graham were daughters of the late Mrs. Dean.

Son Of Former E. J. Minister Dies At Toledo

Allan D. Grigsby, son of the former Rev. and Mrs. A. D. Grigsby of East Jordan, died at a hospital in Toledo, Ohio on January 18, 1954. Funeral services were held January 20th.

He was born in London, England October 22, 1883 and came to United States with his parents.

Surviving are his wife, formerly Clara Hurd; two sons, David and John; five grandchildren; three brothers, C. S. Grigsby of Saginaw, W. T. Grigsby of Hastings, and Rev. Maurice Grigsby of Kalamazoo, Florida; and two sisters, Olive E. Zuleba of Grand Rapids and Myrtle Gidley of East Jordan.

Expand Taylor Grocery To 1,000 Feet Of Floor Space

One of the oldest grocery stores in East Jordan is being remodeled and enlarged for more modern operation.

Taylor's Market, on the corner of Bridge and Water streets, is being increased to 1,000 square feet by Contractor Donald Clark. Work is already underway.

In the Taylor family since 1928, the grocery was purchased from Elsie Taylor by Mr. and Mrs. William Taylor in 1943 and has been operated by them for nearly eleven years. Their living quarters will remain in the rear of the building.

Taylor said the new expansion will double the size of the grocery, 44 feet across the front and 22 feet deep. Plans call for 24 feet of glass windows across the front in the center of which will be glass "in and out" doors.

TAYLOR SAID the work should be finished in about two months at which time additional lines will be added to the business. They will include drugs and magazines. The store has always sold daily newspapers.

The original building was repaired off and on since the 1880's and is again in need of repair, Taylor said. In addition the business requires additional floor space for a more complete line of groceries and fresh meats.

Construction materials to be used are cement block, glass, steel and wood.

Taylor said business would continue as usual during the expansion program.

Report 2nd Antrim Audit At Bellaire

Probate Judge William C. Severance, of Antrim County was back in the news this week when State Auditor General John B. Martin reported findings of a second audit of estates handled by Severance.

It was reported in Lansing that Severance has been accused of irregularities in handling of estates probated in his court at Bellaire.

The audit covered all of 1953 and has been turned over to Attorney General Frank G. Millard, the Antrim county prosecutor and county board of supervisors.

In was said in Lansing that an unsatisfactory condition appears to have prevailed for a long time and the report questions whether or not any improvement can be reasonably expected in the future.

Born in Pleasant Valley, Mr. Gibbard has been a farmer in that area all his life. In 1909 he married Vivian Wilson of Pleasant Valley.

Surviving besides his wife are seven sons, Max and Dorton of East Jordan, Denny of Ann Arbor, Stanley of Marquette, Lynn of Ann Arbor, Norman of Petoskey and George Jr. of Muskegon; two daughters, Mrs. John DeYoung of Atwood and Mrs. Lloyd Taylor of Gaylord, and 22 grandchildren.

Methodist Church Sponsors Scouts

A council composed of Rev. Moore, Clifford Gibbard, Tom Breakey Irving Bennett and Edgar Bowerman and several prospective den mothers met with John Murchie, field representative of the Northern District of the Scenic Trails Council, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Bowerman. An outline for the procedure in organizing and the duties of the various officers was made.

Nearly fifty boys have brought in signed slips stating that they were interested in joining.

The syndicate is processing a full newspaper page photographic layout to tell the story. It will be sent to more than 100 newspapers in the United States.

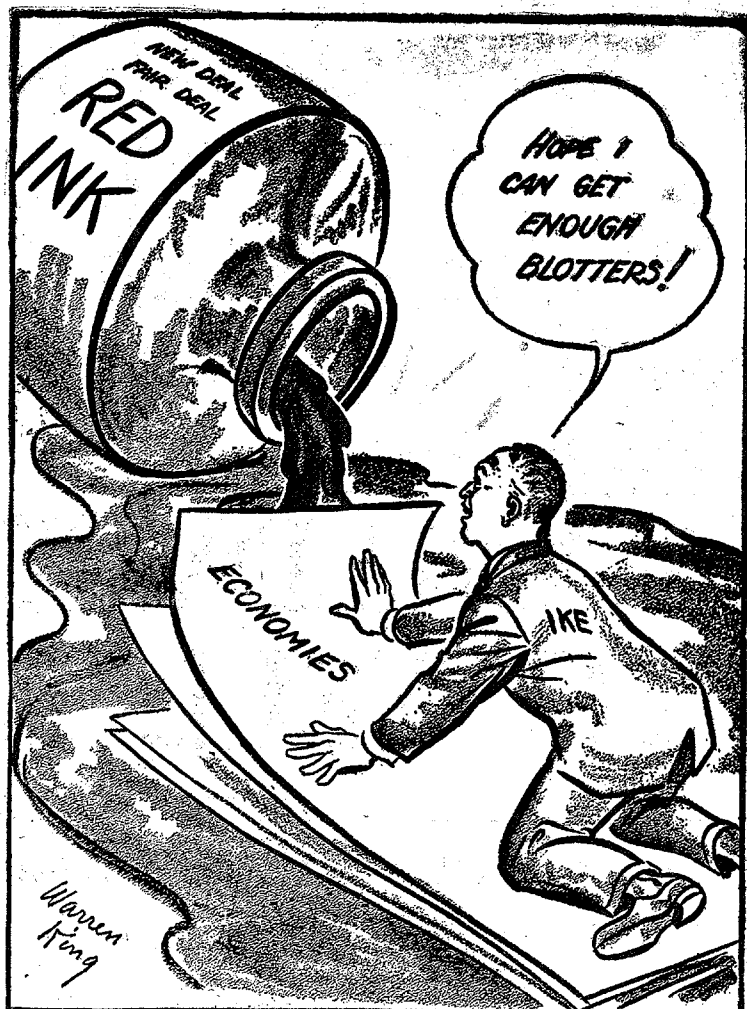

MSC Requests Name MSU

A request that the name Michigan State College be changed to Michigan State University has been sent to the state legislature and the governor by the State Board of Agriculture, governing body of the college.

"Michigan State College," the board members said, "is a misleading name. We are really a university in that there are many colleges involved in the organization."

The change, if approved by Michigan lawmakers, would come in 1955, the year MSC observes its 100th anniversary.

MSC Pres. John A. Hannah, in stating that he is in favor of the move, said that "We have been a university in every sense of the word since 1930. Although it has been generally understood in the midwest that Michigan State college is a university, a great deal of explaining has been necessary to convince those in other parts of the country and foreign countries that we are a university."

"I don't think that there will be any confusion over the change in names," he added. "It will continue to be known as Michigan State."
College officials pointed out that similar changes have been made by other institutions in recent years. In November, the name of Pennsylvania State college was changed to Pennsylvania State University.

Citing that there is ample precedent for the move, Pres. Hannah said, "Most of the land-grant universities began as agricultural schools or agricultural universities. There are few of us left that don't have the name university."

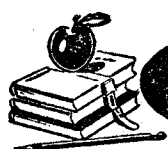

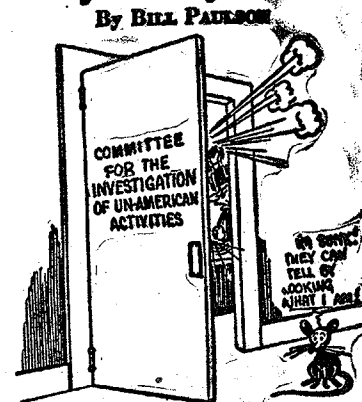

Ask Higher Fishing Fees To Aid Dept.

Proposed increases in hunting and fishing license fees, requested by the conservation commission, must now go to the state Legislature for approval or rejection.

The commission, in its January meeting, approved the several increases suggested by department workers as one method of regaining financial ground lost through rising costs of recent years.

The suggested increases are: Resident fishing license, from \$1.50 to \$2; annual non-resident fishing license, from \$3 to \$4; 15-day non-resident fishing license, from \$2 to \$3; trout stamp, from \$1 to \$2; and resident small game hunting license, from \$2 to \$2.50.

Department revenue officers say the increases, if approved, could not take effect until 1955. By then, they say, most reserve money stored up in the fish and game protection fund will have been used up in meeting yearly department deficits.

Workers say the proposed increases would net about \$1.6 million yearly, enough to satisfy present budget requirements.

This meeting will call together the friends and families of 50 men and boys journeying from the scenic trails council to the shores of the Pacific in California last summer to attend the 50,000 boy scout Jamboree. This will mark the first reunion of these boys and men.

Cherry Grafts Interest Growers

A method for certifying budwood used in fruit tree grafts as being free of virus disease will be of interest to county cherry growers.

It is reported by nurserymen to be of immeasurable value to nurserymen and buyers of cherry and peach trees.

For the past two years all of the Montmorency tart cherry trees grown in Michigan were propagated from certified budwood, and today 95 percent of all of the stonefruit nursery stock in the state is grown under Michigan's new program.

Practically all of Michigan's established nurserymen are using the system of budwood certification. It was worked out by MSC and the state agriculture department's bureau of plant industry. Michigan is the first state to have this program which assures trees to be virus-free. A fruit tree infected with virus is unthrifty and less productive.

This year about 300,000 cherry trees will be offered from budwood certified stock by Michigan nurserymen.

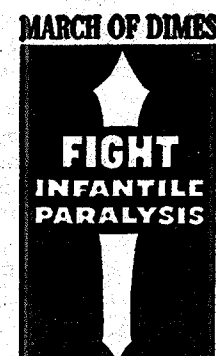

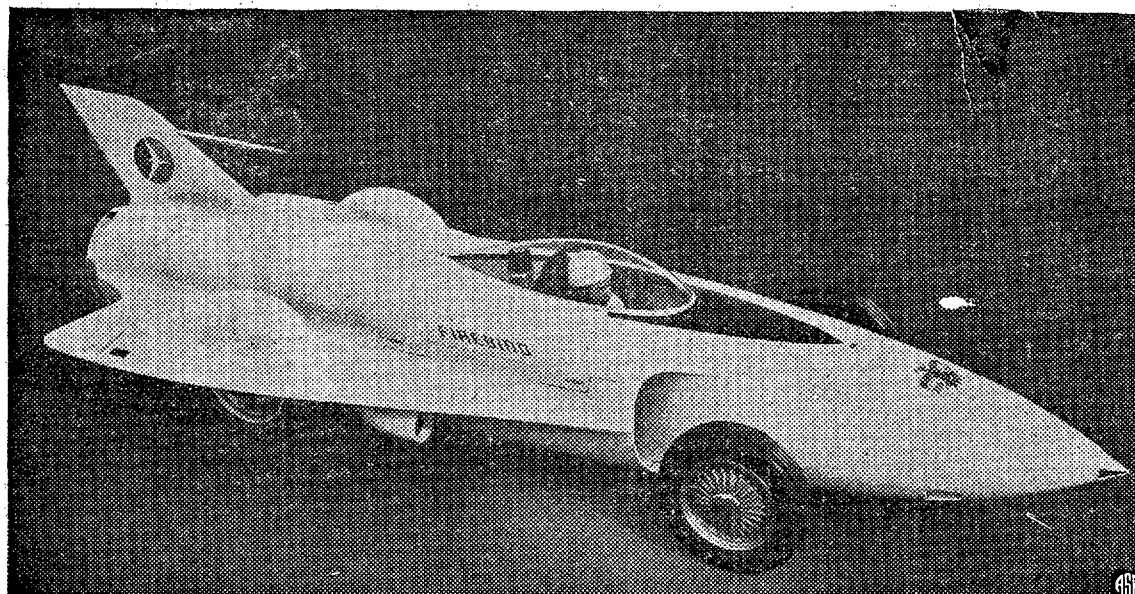

GM Builds First U.S. Gas Turbine Car



The XP-21 Firebird, first gas turbine automobile in the United States, has been announced by General Motors. In the cockpit, beneath a plastic bubble, is Test Driver Mauri Rose who put the car through shake-down paces at GM's proving grounds near Milford, Mich., and Phoenix, Ariz. The car's aerodynamic styling has an aircraft motif with a "needle" nose, swept-back delta wings and vertical tail fin.

Because the gas turbine uses large volume of air, the Firebird has scoops on either side of the driver's cockpit and a large tail cone for exhaust gas. Its kerosene burning engine, mounted at the rear of the driver's seat, consists of two mechanically independent parts, a gasifier section and a power turbine. The power turbine delivers power to the car's rear wheels via a two-speed transmission.

The Firebird is an experiment to determine whether gas turbines will be feasible for ground vehicles.

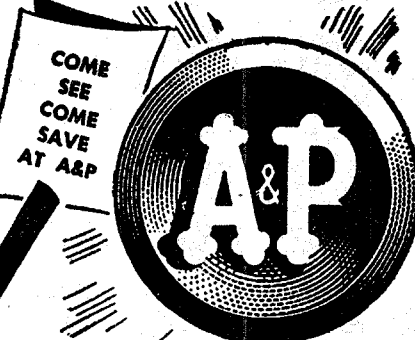

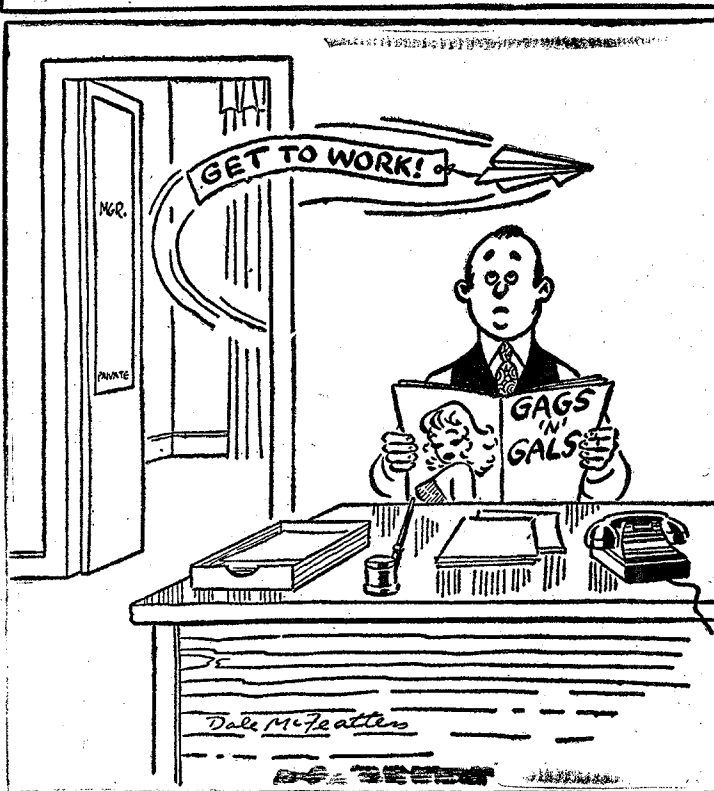

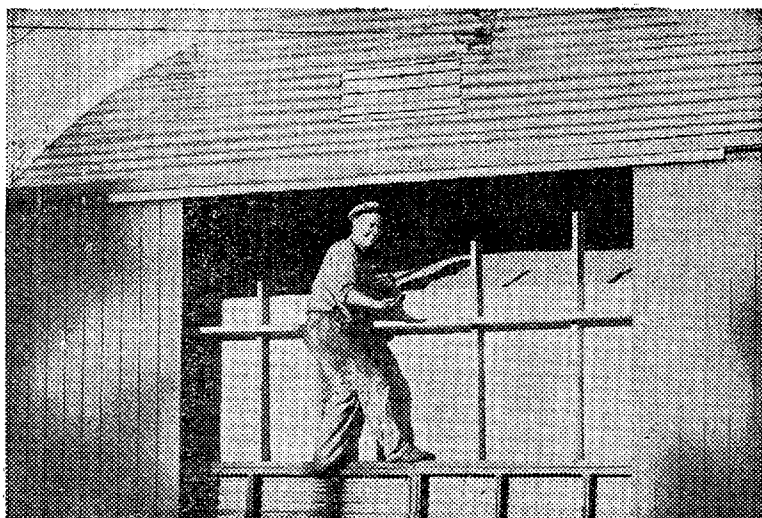

Frozen Storage Retains Fresh Qualities Of Meat

Cleanliness and temperature control are the major factors in preserving the home meat supply.

The first rule in assuring a wholesome and high quality meat supply is that slaughtering, cutting and processing be done by a sanitary workman in a clean place.

Slaughtering and cutting sanitation determine to a large extent the length of time meat can be stored, MSC experts say.

Carcasses that are soiled during dressing or later in processing cannot be cleaned satisfactorily. The meat from these carcasses will discolor quicker and produce off odors sooner than

cleanly dressed carcasses.

Frozen storage retains the fresh qualities of meat to the highest degree.

In preparing meat for frozen storage, veal and pork should be cut and wrapped as soon as the carcasses are thoroughly chilled. Beef and lamb of good and higher grade can be aged 7 to 10 days at from 32 to 36 degrees. Good wrapping materials are moisture and vapor proof cellophane, aluminum foil and laminated papers. Waxed locker papers are good only for short periods.

FARM GOSSIP COLUMN

Farming is big business in Charlevoix county. That is if \$2,000,000 is big business. That's about what our farmers gross each year.

But there's room for expansion and development and plenty of adjustment of the farm scene.

For example 10,000 acres of land have been worked as farming areas which have been graded by state and federal officials as not suitable for farming.

IN FACT ABOUT \$5,000 acres in the county have been marked off as not suitable for farming.

Use of land for farming upon which you cannot raise your hat was one reason the county board of supervisors was asked to promote rural zoning back in 1940.

It is not unusual in Charlevoix county to see poor questionable farms and good farms joining each other. That's because of the very rough and variable topography throughout the county.

People who leave the cities and come north to settle down on a farm should have a look at a land use planning report made out for Charlevoix County. One farmer can be making good but the land across the road from him may be a booby trap for the uninformed.

THE PLANNING report was made up after an intensive survey of all land in the county and will give you a fairly accurate idea where the best land lies.

This rural zoning idea is more important to city dwellers than many realize.

Many of us remember the early 30's when people left the cities in the wake of the depression. Hundreds came north and took over abandoned farm houses and old shacks—any place to settle their families, raise vegetables and some livestock.

What the majority of newcomers discovered was that the run-down places they took over had mighty good reasons for being run down.

Someone before them had tried to work land that was worthless. So these depression fleeing people soon discovered that nothing could be raised on the land. What happened? County taxpayers were obliged to dole out county welfare money to support them.

THAT'S WHY WE need good rural zoning laws with teeth in them. Some arrangement to prevent people from trying to work land which competent farm scientists have found worthless.

Such land should not be sold for farming purposes. Zoning laws could prevent anyone from trying to "farm it."—just as city zoning laws prevent you from setting up a factory in a residential area.

Anyone starting in as a new farmer in Charlevoix county ought to know there are 150 frost free days on the west of the county and about 110 on the east. They ought to look at a planning map and find out where there's suitable land for farming—land that won't give up in a couple of years.

These people should find out where the 10,000 acres of good farm land is in the county that isn't being worked at all.

The average assessed acre of farm land in Charlevoix county is about \$20, maybe less. Average value per acre for sale purpose is around \$40.

City folks with a farm on their mind look at these figures and rub their hands. But chances are they are liable to come up here and purchase a number of those 85,000 acres which are worthless for production.

THE CHARLEVOIX county farm picture is not dark—in fact it's good for those who know what they are doing.

Livestock and livestock products earn our county farmers more than \$1,000,000 each year. We have 255 dairy farms doing a half million dollar combined business here. Poultry and poultry products bring in another \$300,000 each year. The farm crop turnover brings in more than \$1,000,000 to our farmers. We have about 40,000 cherry trees in the county producing well over \$100,000 worth of fruit.

Poor farmers attempting to work poor land impair the work of good farmers and pose a future threat upon all county taxpayers.

Poultry will be highlighted on Thursday with the able assistance of J. M. Moore and George Amundson, while Friday will close the Little Farmers' Week with a discussion on Dairy.

The all-boys choir of the Evangelical Lutheran Church will make their first appearance during the evening service Sunday, January 31 at 8 p.m.

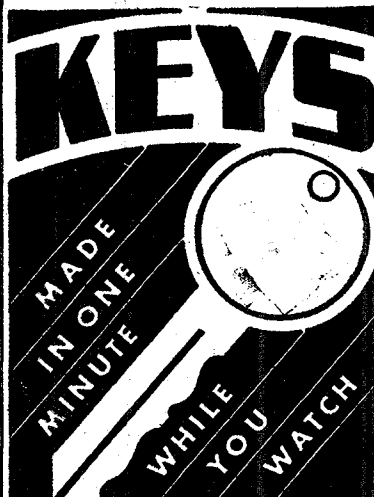
