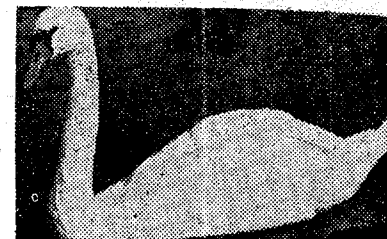

## OVER THE BACK FENCE

Listen dear readers and you shall hear the mid-night ride of Old Man Fear.

He's a soft spoken gent atop an invisible steed, riding faster and faster to plant his seed.

For the first time in a decade the seeds of fear are being planted in the fertile minds of our northern Michigan residents.

Allowed to germinate and grow they would eventually blossom into widely accepted fear of deadly economic depression.

These poisonous whisperings are crawling across northern Michigan not unlike a terrible disease slashing at a vigorous, hopeful youth who has just attained manhood.

For after fifty years of wallowing in economic despair northern Michigan is just now beginning to come "into its own."

Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams said the other day that some people are trying to foist a "fear deal" on the nation and talk the country into depression.

Last weekend the Detroit welfare rolls stood at the lowest point in 27 years.

Also last weekend stock market reporters noted that the industrial share group rose to its highest level since 1930.

Fear mongers point to a similar situation "just before the depression."

There is only one thing that can kill the far-flung progress of northern Michigan. That is fear and fear alone. And if we are capable of being afraid, what difference does it make what we are afraid of?

We are either mice or men. Intelligent men during the depression proved these things. They carried no fear, developing good businesses for themselves. Some helped to build northern Michigan. They started with nothing and worked without fear.

It is not these men who are spreading depression fear. They have no desire to paralyze the wheels of our progressing industry and business.

Check him who delights in spreading such fear and you will find a person who gave little toward sound development of northern Michigan. You will find only the blitherings of an idiot.

Any man who is ready to tear something down was found wanting during the building.

It has taken half a century of plain, hard work to turn the eyes of Michigan upon this section of the state. Ravaged and left bare by a lumber hungry nation, northern Michigan is at last feeling the red blood of progress flowing thru its veins.

We are at the point where a good healthy push will give us the economic and social standing of the rest of the state.

Our opportunities are without limit. Few areas, indeed, offer sanctuary for industry and agriculture as well as resort—a strong three-legged stool forming the seat of a sound economy.

The value of our efforts is found in our growth. What is happening to industry, resort and agriculture in northern Michigan? The story is being told daily. We have but to look around us. Think back and compare.

Northern Michigan industrial progress staggers the imagination of "old timers;" our resort and outdoor sports attractions are developing almost beyond belief; and our real farmers have found themselves, producing only the crops our land will grow profitably and aiming at markets which offer a constant demand.

Physical health, economic progress and untold opportunities. That, at last, is the northern Michigan story.

Surely northern Michigan has produced a sufficient number of intelligent human beings to make use of the great lessons taught them during the depression.

It came as the result of wide-spread fear and left as the result of faith. No matter what we are told by the analysts.

## City Told Road To Be Fixed

The East Jordan Businessmen's Association and the City Council have been informed that State Highway M-32 will not be re-located around East Jordan. In a letter to the businessmen's group State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler said:

"Improvement on M-32 in East Jordan is a small contract in itself, and in order to spread overhead of moving a plant into East Jordan for this work, it is planned that this work on M-32 in the city will be done in connection with the contract on M-66 for reconstruction of that route in East Jordan and south."

The letter was received in answer to a letter written to the department regarding a strong rumor that M-32 would be relocated across Rogers Bridge and on through to M-66.

Ziegler also said that if the department had plans for re-routing M-32 out of East Jordan they would not have built the bridge just easterly from the city about three years ago, nor would they be planning on doing the road improvement mentioned above.

He advised the association that the department knows nothing of a rumor to the contrary, he said he hoped the letter would eliminate the false rumor.

## Andrews Up For Michigan Senate Again

Frank Andrews of Hillman announced today he will be a candidate for re-election to the Michigan State Senate from the 29th District, which comprises the counties of Alpena, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Emmet, Montmorency, Otsego and Presque Isle.

Senator Andrews has served this district in the upper house of the legislature since he was first elected in November, 1948. He was recently named one of the five most outstanding members of the Senate in a poll of accredited legislative newspaper correspondents.

In announcing his candidacy for a fourth term, Senator Andrews said voters in his district need fear no radical changes in the philosophy of government to which he has adhered thus far.

"I intend to reflect the interests of the people I represent in Lansing to the best of my ability," he said. "I believe I know what these interests are. I have no novel or untried panaceas to cure the state's ills and intend to remain conservative in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the people."

"The state government is presently operating in the black and, I believe, giving the people good service for their tax dollars. If there are any inequities in this service, I have always invited and will continue to invite suggestions or criticisms from my constituents."

Senator Andrews is presently chairman of the Committee on Municipalities and a member of the committees on Highways, State Affairs, and Education.

He is also chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee on Reorganization of State Government, sometimes known as the "Little Hoover Commission." This committee has made a thorough study of all phases of state government and recommended dozens of changes designed to streamline state services and make their administration more economical.

The Concert Choir is composed of 64 selected voices chosen on the basis of auditions. Carol Ann Gilpin, East Jordan, is a member.

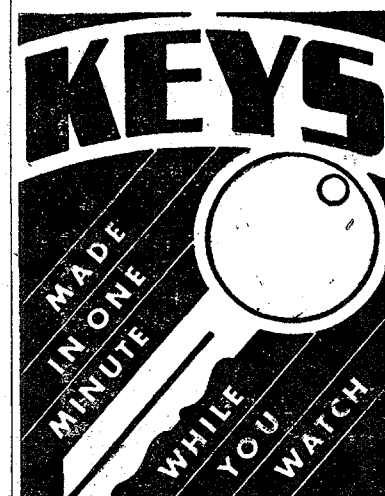
## Government Needs Help For Printing Office

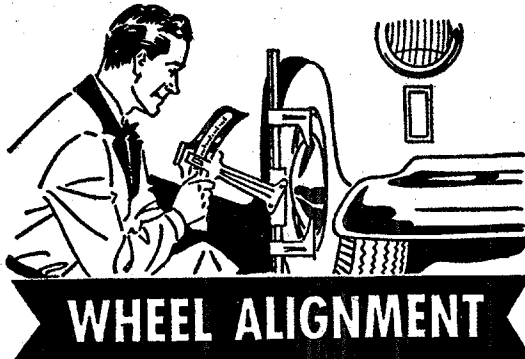

# STRAIGHT FROM THE FIELD

## FARM GOSSIP COLUMN

Farms play a big role in Michigan's timber economy. And here in Charlevoix county sale of farm-cut wood runs into many thousands of dollars.

With 19 million acres of forestland remaining, 52 per cent of the state of Michigan is covered with trees. They are all said to be commercial in character.

Under improving forest management and utilization practices they provide wood needed to supply the state's lumber, pulp and paper, veneer, furniture and other timber-dependent industries.

MORE THAN one-fifth of the income from timber products in Michigan has its origin in timber taken from the farm woodlots. Farm timber is processed into lumber, veneer, railroad ties, and other products.

The harvesting and sale of these products provides opportunity for farmers to use their farm woods for profitable slack season.

And that's what our Charlevoix county farmers are doing. Many draw on their farm grown trees to build or repair buildings or to provide fence posts and fuel.

OUR COUNTY FARMERS cut about 25,000 fence posts a year. And also in Charlevoix county farmers sell about \$8,500 worth of standing timber to be cut by buyers.

For their own firewood our county farmers cut about 12,000 cords of wood each year. That's real cords, 4' x 4' x 8'.

The total net value of rough timber products either sold or used each year off Michigan farm woodlands amounts to 28 million dollars.

We are a hardwood state, but definitely! For hardwoods occupy the greater share of our commercial forestland with about three-fourths of all timbered acres falling into hardwood description.

OUR FOREST LANDS are so valuable the "Keep Michigan Green" campaign is all-important to farmers in Charlevoix county as well as the rest of Michigan.

## Orchard Notes



By C. Fairman

For the home orchard, in your back yard for your own use I would consider it advisable to try to grow peaches preferable to any other tree fruit.

Because there is at present a shortage of peach trees in Michigan and less being planted commercially.

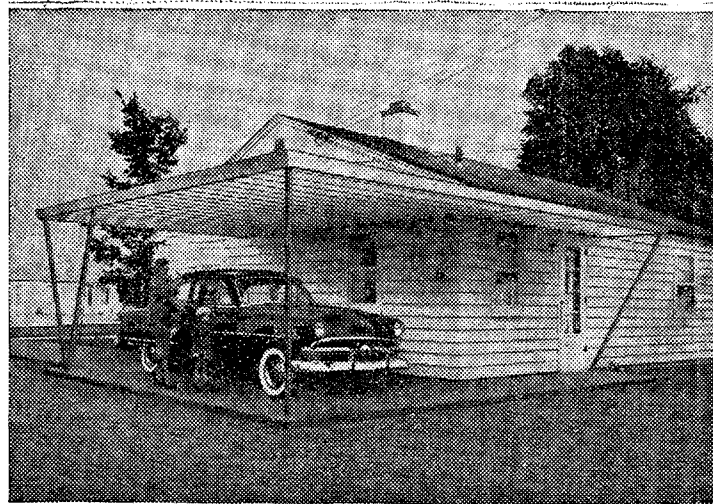
The most important thing about growing peaches here is to be sure to apply a dormant spray early before the buds swell. As a guide, apply before grass turns green the first day the temperature is above 45 degrees and have it dry before night.

THAT IS, I would consider it profitable to raise two or three trees on high ground.

Your local cooperative can supply you with a dormant spray for peach leaf curl.

Good varieties to plant are Red Haven, Fair Haven, Hale Haven in that ripening order, and any later varieties you should choose.

There is a possibility that the "Amber Gem", a cling stone for the canning factory could be grown here. We will try a few of these.

Beaten fluffy for a leavening agent, you'll use them in cakes, souffles, angel foods, sponge cakes and omelets.

As meat extenders or substitutes, you can serve them as curried eggs, creamed eggs on toast, baked eggs in tomato sauce or eggs Benedict, to name only a few possibilities.

And homemakers use them often as the emulsifying agent in mayonnaise and cream puffs, as the binder for meat loaf and croquette mixtures, as the protective coating for fried foods and as a clarifying agent for soups and coffee.

When storing eggs, keep them cold since they spoil easily. Store them in the refrigerator.

However, when you plan to make something which calls for beaten eggs, such as angel food cake, you'll want to take the eggs out of the refrigerator an hour early. They'll beat up more easily if not too cold.

In cooking eggs, the main thing to remember is to cook them slowly at a low temperature. High temperatures will make the egg whites tough and rubbery.

While eggs are plentiful, it is a good time to try different ways of serving them.

## Name State Spud King

Michigan has a new potato king. He is Paul VanDamme, of Rock, Marquette county, in the upper peninsula.

VanDamme raised 868 bushels per acre last summer topping all other state growers.

He took the spud title from Frank Falkies, of Cornell, Delta county. Falkies was four-time winner of the crown. He came in second with 831 bushels per acre.

Back in 1952 Falkies set a Michigan record with 1,083 bushels of spuds per acre. Growing conditions were not as favorable last summer, however.

## Dairy Mag. Reports On Farm Meet

The Farmers Union Dairy Conference at Madison, Wisconsin which the News-Herald covered in a page one story last week) came in for some strong answers by the Dairy Record, a weekly dairy magazine published at St. Paul, Minnesota.

The Dairy Record says: "It was obvious from the start that the 'delegates' came to the session all primed and ready to damn Secretary Benson and to demand continuance of the 90% support program on all farm commodities, including dairy products."

"Even the national president of the organization, James G. Patton, of Denver, conveniently overlooked a previous statement expression his own concern at mounting surpluses of dairy products, and devoted most of his time to attacking Benson."

The magazine said Curtis Hatch, president of the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation slapped back hard at Farmers Union in an address last week and said that "the time has come when we must meet that organization head on."

Hatch mentioned "disgruntled former federal employees whose main purpose in joining the Farmers Union is to get back on the gravy train."

He mentioned former Secretary of Agriculture Brennan, who now is an attorney for the Farmers Union, and said, "I wouldn't trade Kline (Allan Kline, president, American Farm Bureau) for a whole room full of Brannans."

## Toss Control Of State Fair At Supervisors

The State Senate has voted 24-6 to pass and send on to the House a bill developing a new 23-member Michigan State Fair Board. The new board would have complete authority over use of State Fairgrounds in Detroit.

The new board would be picked by delegates from Michigan county boards of supervisors on the basis of Congressional districts instead of by Lansing appointment.

## Report New Variety May Conquer Potato Wilt

The two new wilt diseases of potatoes that caused considerable loss last year may be stymied in the future with a variety that is resistant to their attack.

Michigan State has a breeding project underway that's designed to develop such a hybrid potato. More than a thousand seedlings have been tested in the field and about 50 have shown considerable resistance to the disease.

Both of the diseases are carried in the seed tuber and also live from year to year in the soil. That means they are immune to attack by seed treatment or spraying.

The results of two years' tests in spraying for potato blight show that concentrated spray dosages can be used to an advantage. That means using the fungicide at three times the normal concentration at low pressure.

In areas where water supply and distance are handicaps, the

use of concentrated sprays at low pressure helps the potato grower to cover three times more acreage at one filling of the sprayer tank.

## Farm Notes

Special Bulletin 388, "Inheritance of Farm Property in Michigan," from MSC, describes Michigan laws on inheritance of farm property. It helps farm families avoid difficulties in inheritance process.

Electric pig brooders are a good investment for cold weather farrowing. MSC says that with high early fall hog prices in prospect, farmers should get equipment in shape to save every possible pig farrowed.

If your machinery investment is above \$50 per tillable acre on your farm, it would be wise to examine the kind and amount of machinery you own. See if it can be justified, say economists.

Cheap chicks may be the most expensive. Quality birds may cost you more at the start but you'll be making profits instead of paying out money, say MSC poultrymen.

## Onion King

Duane Baldwin of Stockbridge south of Lansing produced 1,361 bushels of Yellow Globe onions per acre and took the Michigan Onion King's Crown.

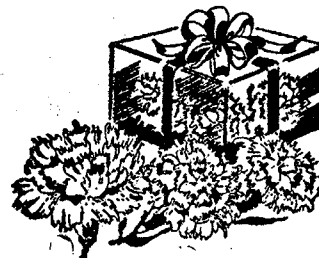

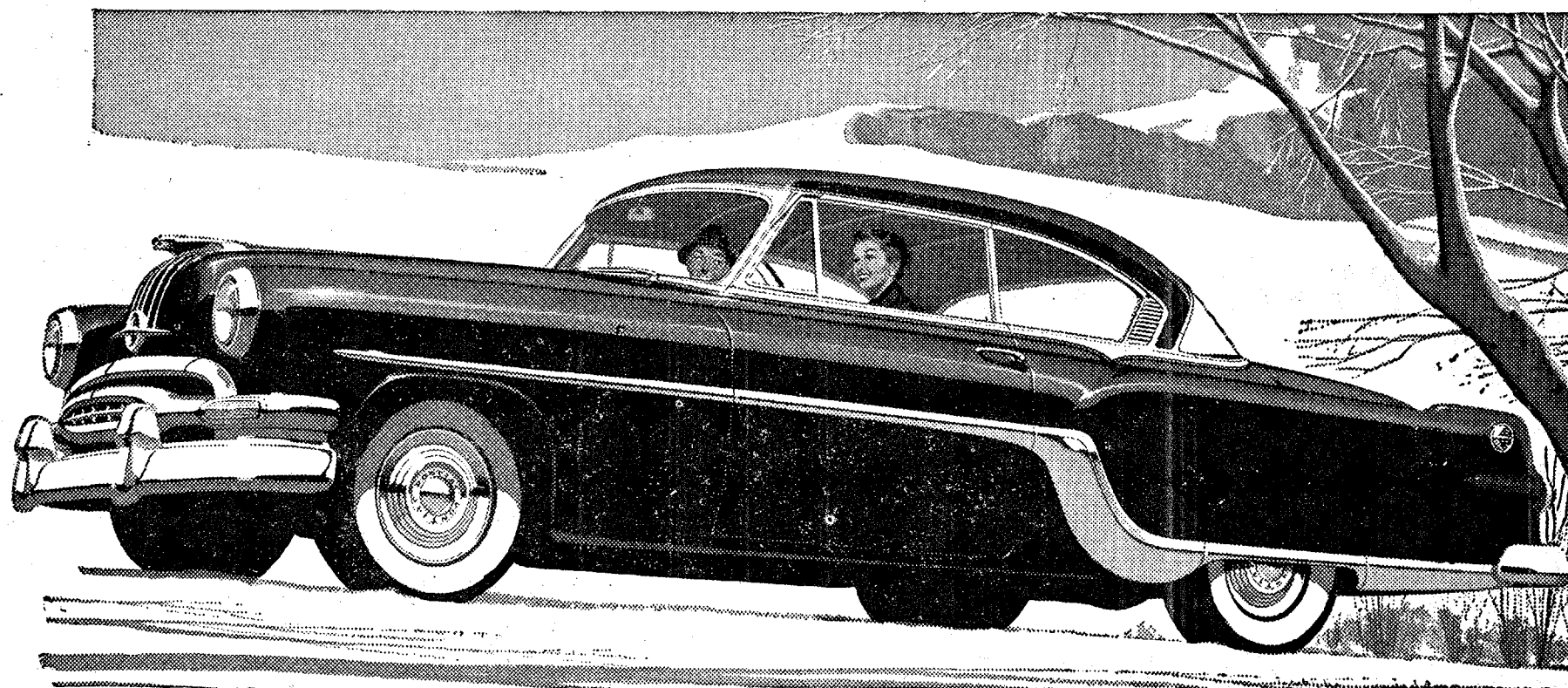

His unit is at Pusan and Bob wants to know just who is in his vicinity. To the best of my knowledge there is only one, Bob. That is Roger Benson who is with the 52nd Ord Ammo Company at Yong Chong. I would like to ask Bob if he had opportunity to see Berton Bunker in Btry D, 933 AAA when he came through Incheon.
