# Ted Scott, Eric Golke Top Class Of 1954

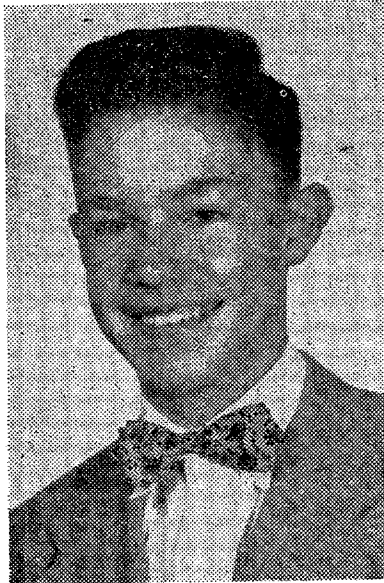

## Fair Head Answers Critics, Explains Board's Operation

Dear Editor:

In defense of the fair board of directors, I feel it my duty to explain as far as possible the reason for the dates we have chosen for the 1954 fair.

In the first place I would like to explain that the directors, 24 in number, are elected by the membership from all over Charlevoix and Antrim counties. They attend all meetings of the board and are always willing to do the extra work outside of the meetings.

They purchase membership tickets for themselves for admittance to the fair. All for which they get absolutely nothing, not even mileage.

The only time a director gets a dime is when he takes a laborer's place during the fair and receives \$5.00 for 13 to 15 hour day, while the laborer gets \$1.00 per hour.

The president gets nothing for his services and the secretary has

The fair at East Jordan for the past six years has been clean. No girl shows, no flat joints. The grand stand shows have been the cleanest and the best in the state. Yet, we have shows in the theater baseballs games and motorboat races all on Sunday, and I have failed to see any criticism in the paper about them.

As to the critics, the Barnard Farm Bureau sent objection by letter stating 31 families objected to the Sunday date. By calling the secretary who wrote this letter, I find that only 7 families were present when they voted on the subject.

THE STUDY CLUB of East Jordan, I don't know who or how many members they have, and I don't know where to get the information as it was not signed personally, the four or five that objected probably I know, and I can't remember of any of them putting their shoulders to the wheel to help the fair.

To the people of Charlevoix and Antrim counties, I would like to say, that I hope I have not sounded too bitter about this, and if so, I hope I will be excused.

For after putting in years of being connected with the fair and seeing (in the past) the Mumbo Jumbo of inquiry of Girl Shows, Flat Joints and what have you, and as in the past 5 or 6 years of cleaning up the mess and making a safe place for your 4-H Clubs and the other sons and daughters of the two counties, the people staying away from the gate in droves (unless they have a fence pass) and on top of it all, this criticism, you really get discouraged.

## Farmer Buell Summoned To Washington

A widely known northern Michigan potato grower Darius D. Buell of Elmira has returned from Washington where he had been called for a U. S. agricultural conference.

Buell received a telegraphed invitation direct from Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson to attend the 2-day meeting.

Buell is a well-known certified seed potato grower at Elmira where for many years he has raised some of the best quality potatoes in the state.

THE MEETING was attended by potato growers throughout United States. It was called for the purpose of reviewing new legislation applying to the spud growing industry of the nation.

Buell left for Washington February 10 and returned last weekend.

The Elmira farmer has 160 acres of potatoes. His call to Washington from northern Michigan was looked upon by farm officials here as new hope that the United States Department of Agriculture is giving due consideration to northern Michigan farmers.

## Pianist Booked For Community Concert, Mar. 25

The third concert in the 1953-54 series of the northern Michigan Community Concert series will bring to the Petoskey High School Auditorium the French pianist, Lelia Gousseau. The concert will start at 8:30 p.m., March 25th.

Born in Paris, Lelia Gousseau was admitted to the Paris Conservatory at the age of ten. There she won a series of prizes for her music, and in 1937 she won the Chopin prize at the international piano competition at Warsaw.

Her career, successfully launched, was interrupted by the war. Since the liberation she has played throughout Europe, as well as in Great Britain, North Africa and the Middle East. This is her first American tour.

Admission to this and all other concerts of the northern Michigan Community Concert Series is by membership in the association. The final concert in this series will be the famed Tuscon Boys' Choir on March 15th.

Gayle Saxton's unpredictable Red Devils ripped off a last quarter lead and copped the game over Mancelona's Ironmen Friday night in a contest that could have been anybody's until the final gun.

Mancelona jumped into a 18 to 12 lead at the beginning and wound up 24 to 18 at halftime.

During late frantic moments East Jordan pulled away 40 to 36 and remained out front to assure themselves second position in the northern basketball C standings, 57 to 55.

Second only to Charlevoix's Rayders the locals have won eight games and lost three this conference season.

EAST JORDAN drew 12 penalties and Mancelona eleven with fans wondering why they both

had not drawn more.

Red Devil Bobby Danforth racked up 23 points to help his team take the contest, while Mancelona's Holstad hit 18.

The little Red Devils eked a two point lead away from Mancelona's seconds to take the earlier contest 48 to 46. Jankoviak was high for the locals with 18 points and Meeder was tops for the Ironmen with 15.

## Red Devil Record

Charlevoix and Pellston are the only northern Michigan Class C teams that have beaten East Jordan's Red Devils this season.

The Devils have played eleven conference games and stand in second place in the north loop league. They wind up their league play Friday night playing host to Boyne City.

The Rayders took the locals 47 to 39 on the local court early in the season and again 45 to 36 when the Devils visited that city.

IN A SURPRISE turnabout the locals dropped a contest to Pellston 50 to 44 after the Devils had beaten them as well as Harbor Springs, Gaylord, Mancelona, Boyne City and Traverse City, S. F.

East Jordan whipped Harbor Springs twice, 50 to 45 and 56 to 53. They also dumped Gaylord at both meetings, 43 to 42 and 51 to 25.

If the locals can turn Boyne City back again Friday night they will have won 9 conference games out of 12 starts. Their earlier engagement was a 55 to 47 success.

INCLUDING non-conference games this season the locals have taken 11 of 14 starts as this is written, to place themselves in second in 1953-54 northern Michigan Class C play.

Earlier in the season East Jordan enjoyed top spot in the league since Charlevoix had not played as many games, but the Red Devils have never been shoved from their second place position.

## Lake Maps Now Available At Ann Arbor

Lake mapping is a full time job in Michigan.

A count, made some years ago, established that the state has more than 11,000 lakes within its borders.

Fishermen, vacationists and other recreation-minded folk want to know about these lakes and it is the business of conservation department lake-mapping crews to provide answers to their questions.

Many things go into a lake map and the job is not an easy one. Water depths must be determined, shore outlines established, islands located and shore installations noted. Workers must check to learn bottom composition and must establish where a sand shore area changes to deep water marl or gravel.

Steep underwater slopes, deep deadheads, spawning ground, in-holes, submerged islands, snags, inlets and outlets; all must be noted on the map.

To date, about 2300 lakes have been mapped, including most of the major or "heavy use" lakes.

Large-scale maps are available to the public at cost from the institute for fisheries research at Ann Arbor.

## Bridge Facts

1. Structure to withstand a wind speed of 120 miles per hour.
2. Cement for anchorage, 85,000 cubic yards each, would build 26 miles of 2-lane pavement, 9 inches thick.
3. Suspension anchorages to resist pressures up to 65,000 lbs. per square foot.
4. Suspension anchorages will shoot up to about as tall as a 30-story building above water level.
5. Bridge will have minimum clearance of about 150 feet, room for tallest masted ships.
6. Suspension portions will be 3,900 feet, second only to Golden Gate's 4,200 feet.
7. Adding length of approaches will exceed overall length of Golden Gate by one-half mile.
8. Toll rates same as present ferry rates for private autos, about \$2.75, including passengers. Any increases will come from truckers on toll rates.

## FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS

### For Best Results With New Chemicals Hit Those Weeds When They Are Small

New weed killers work best when weeds are very small, or in some cases, before the weeds emerge from the ground, the MSC horticulture department says.

For the best weed control, the soil should be moist, but not wet when the chemicals are applied. Air temperature needs to be warm—around 75 degrees.

Don't irrigate immediately after applying weed sprays. If the soil is dry, irrigate and, then spray six to eight days later.

These pointers are offered on grass control in crops: by looking ahead and starting a grass control program a year or so in advance, the grass can be eliminated at planting time. Chemicals such as TCA used with cultivation prior to planting is one way of having a grass-free planting.

How long will weed seeds live?

MSC scientists don't have the answer to that question because an experiment designed to give the facts hasn't been completed. It has 80 more years to run.

The seeds in the test are dug up from the ground every 10 years to determine their viability. The last time they were dug there was a small percentage of viable seeds from 20 species buried 70 years ago.

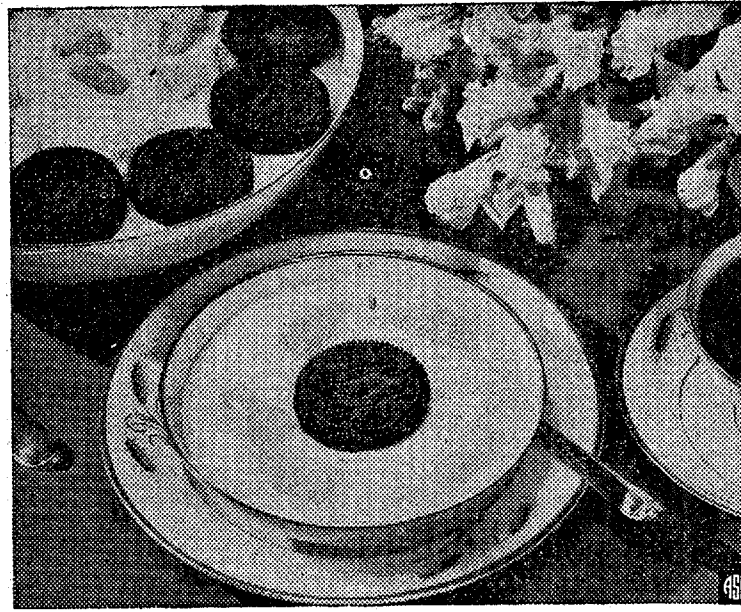
In disturbed soil, however, seeds would have shorter periods of dormancy. But they may persist in a dormant but viable state through several crop rotations. More information is needed on the most effective ways to speed up germination of the more persistent and harmful weed pests so they can be eradicated easier.

### Need Faster Soil Survey In Michigan

MSC sees a need to step up the basic soil survey now being made in Michigan. At the present rate of progress, it will require 80 years to complete the program.

It is being carried on jointly by the State Department of Conservation, the Soil Conservation Service and MSC. Sufficient financing should be obtained at an early date to finish the task in a period of not to exceed 10 years, they say.

A more complete and accurate survey of our basic research—soil—is imperative to continued progress in agriculture.

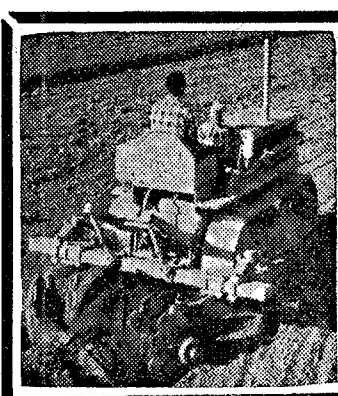

## FARM GOSSIP COLUMN

There's a lot of good farm land in Charlevoix county and there is a lot of poor crop areas, too.

In area, Chandler township is the largest in the county but that doesn't mean it has the most farms. Chandler has a total land area of 23,026 acres.

Charlevoix township is the smallest with 3,647 acres. Marion township is probably the best farming area in the county. Out of the township's some 16,500 acres of rural land, nearly 13,000 acres are in farms on land suitable for continued farming; and there has not been much farming there on unsuitable land.

MARION TOWNSHIP lies south of Charlevoix and north of Ellsworth. It has the least number of acres of any township which are not suitable for farming, about 1500.

Over in Chandler township east of Boyne Falls in the Hardwood State Forest area, there are about 15,000 acres not suitable for farming. There are about 4,400 acres of good farm land being used there, but farm specialists say there is lots of good farm land there not in farms.

Only five of the county's townships (not including Beaver Island) have plenty of good farm land.

They are: Boyne Valley, Eveline, Marion, South Arm and Wilson.

WILSON TOWNSHIP between East Jordan and Deer Lake is third largest in the county, well over 22,000 acres. It has over 11,000 acres of good workable farm land, although there is some fear that a good number of these acres cannot be farmed too long without hurting the soil.

Evangeline township running north of Boyne City has about 2,000 acres of good farming land, but there are another 1,800 acres in farms which farm specialists say may be over worked if farmed too long.

Evangeline and Charlevoix townships have the least total acres and the least number of good farming acres in the county.

EVELINE TOWNSHIP NEAR Ironton and around the Peninsula is a very good farming area. It has over 11,000 acres in tillable land and few reports against how the rest of the land is being used.

South Arm township also rates tops for farming areas, with nearly 13,000 acres of good land under cultivation. It is one of the better known farming districts in the county.

South Arm covers an area on both sides of Lake Charlevoix north and south of the Jordan River. The township has a total land area of 20,626 acres of which 4,686 acres are not in farms and are not suitable for farming.

IF WE WERE TO rate our townships in accordance with their farming importance to the county we would come up with something like this:

1—Marion; 2—South Arm; 3—Eveline; 4—Boyne Valley; 5—Wilson; 6—Norwood; 7—Hayes; 8—Melrose; 9—Bay; 10—Chandler; 11—Hudson; 12—Evangeline and 13—Charlevoix.

As we said before Beaver Island farming was not reported in this discussion of farming by townships.

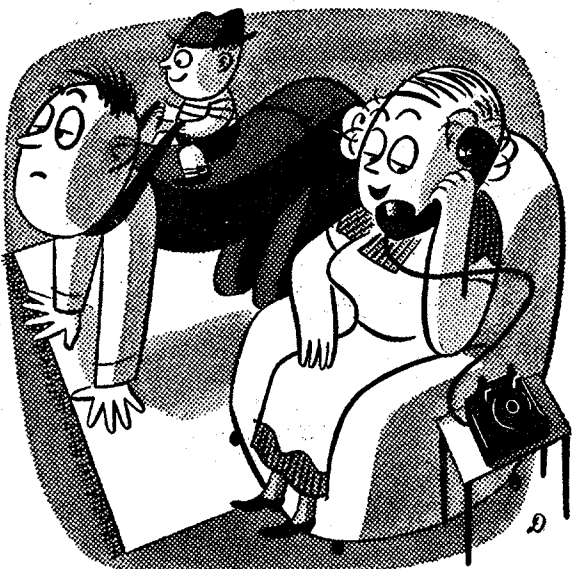

## Ili Fellas:

One more of our men has reached the end of the service road. Jim McLaughlin arrived home last Friday. He has been discharged and is now working for Smith Bus line out of Petoskey. Jim says that in his whole stay at Yokohama he only saw Larry Huckle who looked him

up just a short time ago.

Here's a letter from Fred Holland. "We are well on our way back to the States now. Tomorrow morning we pull into Colombo, on the island of Ceylon, for one day. So far we have stopped at Hongkong for 3 days and Singapore for 2 days. Also, between Hongkong and Singapore

We crossed the equator so now we are all "Shellbacks." One afternoon in Singapore the temperature hit 108 degrees in the shade which sounds a little out of proportion for East Jordan at this time of year. It is still mighty hot as we are only about 400 miles of the equator now.

"While we were in Singapore we anchored about a mile away from a fleet of Russian fishing boats. The next day after we anchored one of the local Singapore papers had an article in it which I have enclosed.

"We are making our way back through the Med. and will stop at one of the American Oil Company enterprises in the Persian Gulf next week before going through the Suez and on up to Genoa. We are due to arrive in Newport on March 10th.

"The paper certainly has been a big help as I sometimes got it less than 5 days after it was mailed. Guess I'll sign off now. Fred Holland RD-2, USS Cogswell, DD 651, Group 1, "O" Div, c-o FPO, New York, N. Y."

The paper clipping mentioned by Fred follows:—US FLEET ANCHORS NEAR REDS. For the first time in Singapore's maritime history, the national flags of Communist China, Soviet Russia, USA, and Britain flew on vessels within an anchorage distance of less than a mile, in the Colony's outer Roads. The Stars and Stripes belonged to the flag ship Ammen of the U. S. Navy Destroyer Division; 182, which arrived in Singapore yesterday morning after operational duties in Korean waters. The hammer and sickle, Soviet Russia's emblem, was most prominently displayed on all 17 fishing trawlers and their "mother" ship which arrived in Singapore enroute to Vladivostok just ahead of the U. S. naval unit. The Hai Hsuan, which celebrates its fourth year at anchor in the Outer Roads today, sported the colours of Red China, while several vessels flying the "Red Duster," were close by. These vessels were joined by other craft that flew the colours of Germany, Holland, Norway, Sweden and France. The U. S. Destroyer Division 182 consists of the Ammen, Cogswell, Ingersoll and Knapp.

Fred, when coming through the Med you will want to watch out for Hammond on the USS LST 533 or Burbank on the Diamondhead, either of whom may be in the Med at this time. Larry Streeter has a new address. As I told you last week he ended up in Greenland instead of Newfoundland. His address is A-2c Lawrence Streeter, 318th Ftr Sqdn, APO 23, c-o PM, New York, N. Y.

A-3c Leonard McRoberts has an overseas address now. He is with Hq, 49th Air Base Group, APO 919, c-o PM, San Francisco California. If you will drop us a line and tell us where you are Leonard, perhaps we can guide someone your way.

Here is a rather unusual letter which shows what some of our servicemen think of us back home. "Guess that now while I have the morning off and with nothing to do I will send a few lines off to you to tell you to stop my paper starting this coming week. Yes, it finally happened. Uncle Sam is about finished with me for a while at least and is giving me my discharge next Friday.

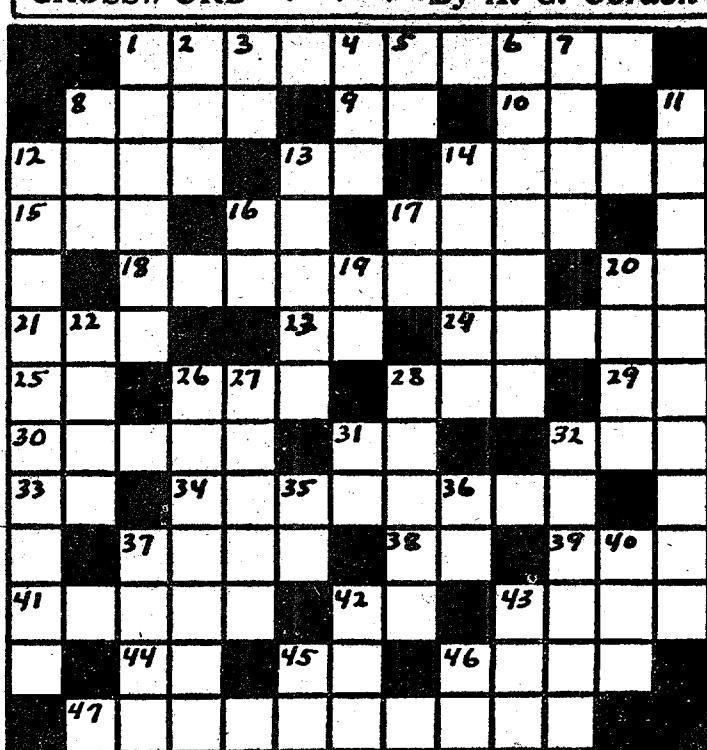
"I would like to thank all the people of EJ that made it possible for me to receive the paper. It is the only way fellows like myself and all the others in the service can really know what is happening back home. You see, to me East Jordan is more than just a town. It is my real home where I was practically born and raised. It is the kind of town that I would like to live the rest of my life in and raise my family in. It makes me proud when I'm asked where I'm from and I can say, "From a little town in Michigan called East Jordan." Of course, very few know where in Michigan it is situated but it still makes me feel good to tell them I am from East Jordan.

"I read many articles in the paper about what an outsider would see should he look about E. J. and I would like to say a few words on the subject. I believe a person in my position that has known E. 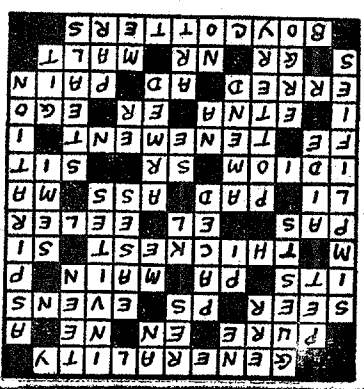
"I start Tech school in 3 or 4 weeks. As far as I know I am taking up electronics, which is the wiring of airplanes.
