

Mother of the family Mrs. Gertrude Bennett will celebrate her 88th birthday Saturday. She was born in Brush Creek, Iowa, and came here as a small girl, marrying William J. Bennett July 4th 1882.

Ten sons were born to the Bennetts, one passed away in infancy. The remaining nine formed the famous Bennett baseball team which played throughout northern Michigan and professionally when they could book engagements. The father hired coaches, bought uniforms and provided transportation so the boys could "go on the road." They played as far away as Grayling.

In 1950 Mrs. Bernett found her wedding ring which had been lost since 1906. Ray Spence, of East Jordan, whose car had been mired in the mud on the old Bennett estate, found the engraved ring while attempting to move the car.

The father, William Bennett, was for many years a member of the Antrim County board of supervisors and aided construction of the court house at Bellaire. One son, Dan, is an East Jordan councilman.

Youngest of the family is daughter Kay whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Donald Cutier. Don, a former East Jordan and Michigan State College football player, now is stationed with the U. S. armed forces in Germany where he has played football for the Army.

FHA Director Gives Answers On Local Home Financing

The federal housing administration does not lend money or build houses, Daniel H. Treleven, director of the Grand Rapids office informs the News-Herald.

"To correct a general misunderstanding," Director Treleven said, "the following facts may be of interest to readers of the News-Herald."

FHA's function is to insure loans made by approved lending institutions such as banks, building and loan associations, insurance companies, and other approved mortgagees.

FHA activities are not confined to large cities. FHA will insure home mortgages on new construction or existing properties in any community where a residential area has been established which is protected by restrictions or zoning, free from undesirable factors, and properly serviced by schools, churches,

and shopping areas. The size of the city or villarge is not a determining fac-

FHA also serves rural communities through the insurance of Title I improvement loans and Title I, Section 8 small home

INTEREST RATE on home mortgages is 41/2 % plus 1/2 of

1% for mutual mortgage insurance. FHA loans may be made with a down payment of as little as 5% and the balance paid over a period up to 25 years.

Title I improvement loans bear interest of 5% discounted and may be paid over a threeyear period.

Title I, Section 8 small home loans bear 5 1/2 % including insurance and service charge and may be paid over a period of 30

Ferry vs. The Fair

Charlevoix county taxpayers paid a little over \$400 per month last year to meet the combined loss of the Charlevoix county fair and the Ironton Ferry.

Ironton Ferry operation loss was more than \$3,000 and the county fair around \$1,000.

Ferry income was \$7,524.70 and the normal operational cost was \$10,696.51.

In actual value to the county we'd say the ferry is head and shoulders above the county fair. Last year it cost taxpayers about \$300 per day to pick up bills for the 3-day fair.

The fairground buildings carry \$7,800.00 worth of insurance and each year it seems that more and more taxpayers feel a fair means

It appears that operation of the ferry has the support of all of the taxpayers for several reasons. We actually need the transportation; it has county - wide advertising value; many motorists drive into the county to take the trip. It is one of a few such ferrys in United

Such value cannot be placed upon the county fair. And unless a larger majority of taxpayers become more interested in supporting a fair or some other attraction through attendance and moral support, the day may arrive when the grounds will be closed the year around. -Marshall Sayles

FARM **GOSSIP COLUMN**

How much do you know about the Michigan Department of Agrialture? What are its duties? How does it operate?

What is the difference between the Michigan Department of Agriculture and the State Board of Agriculture?

The rames have caused much confusion throughout the state for

THE STATE BOARD of Agriculture is the governing body of the Michigan State College of Agriculture and Applied Science at East Lansing. Operation of the college is under control of this state board. Members of the board are elected by state ballot for six year perods. The board elects the president and the officers of the college

In other words the State Board of Agriculture is a politically elected group by Michigan residents charged with the responsibility of operations at Michigan State College,

and appoints members to the college faculty,

The Michigan Department of Agriculture is located in Lansing and its duties are primarily regulatory, having to do with the enforcement of laws to protect the consumer of farm products.

The department is divided into seven bureaus. They are: Finance and personnel; dairying, animal industry, marketing and enforcement; plant industry, agricultural industry and chemical laboratories.

THE PEOPLE OF Michigan elect a "commission of agriculture" whose members in turn appoint a director to head the department, This department carries out continuous inspections throughout

Workers inspect food, weights and measures, farm produce, poulry, vegetables, insect pests, plant disease, Christmas trees and a ong list of other allied farm items.

County farm agents work for Michigan State College and in some cases the county boards of supervisors but are not under control of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. These two state groups "Michigan Department of Agriculture"

have little in common as far as the duties of their offices go, BUT FOR MANY years residents not familiar with the differ-

nce often confuse one group for the other. It would seem that a change in the name of one of these groups would eliminate much confusion throughout Michigan.

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Let's Test, **Not Guess About Soil**

"Let's test, not guess!" That's farm experts' advice to Charlevoix county farmers.

Farm agent Ed Rebman is telling farmers that soil testing takes part of the gamble or chance out of farming; and that the soil scientist uses sensitive scientific equipment in gaining basic knowledge of

Only by testing can we accurately learn whether or not lime is needed, Rebman says. Tests tell us about the quantity of plant food elements in the soil, the balance between the elements and the presence of elements in toxic or poisonous qua-

Charlevoix county records indicate only about 15 percent of the land is needing lime.

Field sampled in the surveys included those that have been limed in the past.

Experiments indicate that one dollar's worth of lime applied where needed will return \$8,00 to \$10.00 over a period of 10 to 15 years, the farm agent says,

In addition testing helps one to use fertilizer economically, possibly to use less fertilizer or

less of the more expensive kind. Test, not guess, is the agent's advice to farmers.

Orchard Notes



Much is being said about spray material lately-at a meeting of growers at the East Jordan Cooperative, at the spring school at Twin Lakes, also in the Eastern and American Fruit Grower papers or

magazines mentions names and uses of the newer materials.

Such names appear as "Malathion" for aphids and mites and other insects. It is not any more dangerous to use than DDT. One thing noticeable at any of the meetings is that the harmful effects to fruit and foliage is seldom, if ever, mentioned. Most of our older spray materials are very harmful to fruit and foliage such as copper-Sulphor, arsenate of lead, etc.

WHILE ARSENATE OF lead is called our standard insecticide, if this material is used on prunes for one application, the second application should be "marlate," "methoxychlor" or DDT or depending on what insects were present. Otherwise most of the prunes drop off if lead is used on all sprays.

We have killed many a sweet cherry tree with arsenate of lead by not having the material well stirred at the start.

It is my belief that there are newer and better spray materials on the market today that will give fruit a finer finish, better keeping and shipping qualities and at the same time the tree and foliage will be healthier and grow and produce better.

Irrigation Fights Frost

Irrigation is not only a crop producer, but a crop saver. Instead of a crop loss on the first freezing fall night, farmers can now gather harvests after many such frost bites, report MSC agricultural engineers.

Many growers have found that sprinkler irrigation was the dif-

ference between total loss and a full crop after using it on their crops. The effect of untimely frosts in the northern part of the state and in low muck areas is disastrous.

Tomatoes, peppers, broccoli and other crops planted late on the experimental farm were protected while the unprotected crops were killed by frost the first week in October.

Oats, Barley Best Legume **Nurse Crop**

Your companion or nurse crop may determine the quality of stand you get from your alfalfa

A study of the effect of varous companion crops on the establishment of alfalfa in a field has recently been completed by farm crops department.

Using various nurse crops, seeral varieties of oats and barley vere used in addition to many other grasses and grain crops.

Best yield of alfalfa was obtained when Clinton oats were used as the nurse crop and cut and barley were about equally satisfactory when cut at three inches and the straw removed.

When sudan grass, millet and sovbeans were cut for hay the resulting alfalfa crop was fairly good. It was fair when buckwheat was used and cut at full bloom and end bloom. The resulting alfalfa yield and stand was very unsatisfactory when sudan grass, millet, soy beans and buckwheat were used as a nurse crop and cut for grain.


