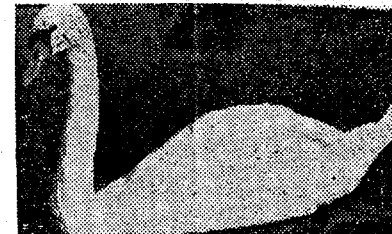

Merchant Association Pushes Development

Current civic development was outlined at the annual meeting of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association when the group met at Cal's Tavern Tuesday night.

Bill Swoboda, of Campbell's Insurance Agency, discussed possibility of a city-wide clean-up campaign sponsored by a group of insurance firms.

Merchants were told that representatives of the agencies will promote and carry out a thorough clean-up drive if the community cooperates.

Swoboda said the insurance association moves into a community and with the help of the schools, Boy Scouts, merchants fire department, Rotary Club, newspaper and others will develop a city-wide clean-up that is well worth the effort.

It is planned to obtain the help of the association for a big campaign next year.

DETAILS OF East Jordan's queen program were explained by Minnie DesJardins head of the association's advertising committee.

A queen to represent the city will be elected at the Temple Theater next Wednesday night. She will attend the National Trout Festival at Kalkaska and the National Cherry Festival at Traverse City.

Vern Whiteford explained the work Consumer's Power Company is doing in northern Michigan to number houses in each county and city.

The company is numbering each dwelling they service with electricity and it is hoped that East Jordan will cooperate with the work to obtain a proper house numbering project.

CHRIS TAYLOR told the group that work of establishing street signs throughout the city will get under way as soon as all signs are on hand.

Marshall Sayles explained the necessity of producing a city advertising folder and establishing a tourist information bureau. An increase in the number of inquiries concerning the community was pointed out. Letters have been arriving from throughout the United States which could be answered with a pamphlet about East Jordan.

Members received copies of the association's by-laws and samples of match covers advertising the city.

Meredith Runs On Slips For First Ward Alderman

In a final hour political move a large number of merchants and friends of Mayor Chris Taylor succeeded in getting his approval to their support of his candidacy in the coming city election, April 5th.

Taylor's decision to allow his friends to campaign for him was the result of a meeting at which a large number of followers urged him to accept another term as Mayor.

Earlier Taylor had said pressure of private business demanded too much of his time. However, his backers agreed that if he would run for Mayor once more they would not insist that he put his hat in the ring a third time.

Name District Manager For Post Offices

Postmasters in Charlevoix, Emmet, Antrim and Kalkaska counties will report to a district manager in Grand Rapids rather than direct to Washington.

This new policy comes under the Post Office Department's decentralization program.

Congressman Victor A. Knox of the 11th congressional district made the announcement this week.

"This will eliminate one of the major bottlenecks in the postal service," Mr. Knox said. "The result will be better service, greater economy, and quicker solutions to our postal problems."

Red Cross Seeks More Drive Money

The campaign is running behind locally and the chairman said the funds are about \$300 short of the \$900 quota.

No admission charge will be made for the all-day event and the public is invited to hear the soloists, duets, trios and other musical groups from northern Michigan communities.

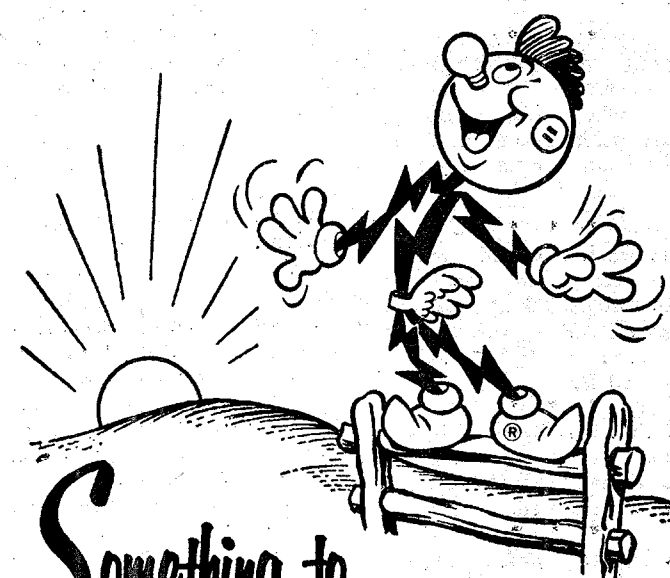

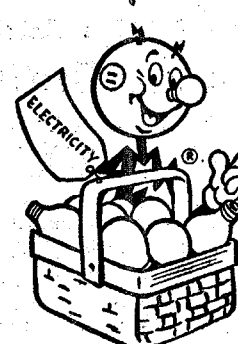

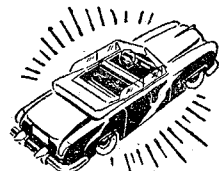

State Plans Its Largest Timber Sale

Auctions for disposal of timber cutting rights on state lands in Michigan's recently-approved record-breaking sale will be held in April and May, foresters report.

Assessed value of timber being offered is \$73,000, largest for a single month in history.

Stumpage in seven state forests totalling more than 19,000 cords of pulpwood, 1,090,000 board feet of sawlogs and 50,000 cedar posts will be offered in the sales.

Sales of timber in Sturgeon River state forest will be held April 16, 23 and 30; on April 28 for stumpage in Menominee state forest; and on April 12 for Houghton Lake state forest.

The Escanaba River and Au-Sable forest sales are both slated April 2 and the Lake Superior sale will be held May 14.

Thus far, no date has been slated for the Ogema forest sale. Details of these sales may be obtained by contacting state district or regional foresters.

Seven Ways To Boost Tourist Business Listed By Furlong

A seven point program to help communities bolster their tourist business is recommended as a feature of the observance of Michigan Week (May 2-8) by Robert J. Furlong, Executive Secretary of the Michigan Tourist Council.

A highlight of the program is the planning of scheduled tours to resorts in immediate market areas by business and professional people of the community.

This would give the townspeople a better knowledge of types of accommodations available and would enable them to provide better information services to their visitors, commented Furlong.

AN ADVERTISING and publicity program on tourist attractions was another recommendation by the Council executive. This would include the production of brochures; the release of news stories and an advertising campaign.

The development of local tourist attractions and entertainment facilities was also included. The erection of markers at local points of interest, picture-displays of these attractions in store windows, and other devices to arouse the interest of local people as well as visitors were mentioned.

Also included in this suggestion was the distribution to business places of mimeographed lists of local points of interest. A general improvement program for all recreational facilities would be advisable, said Furlong.

Improvement of the community's physical appearance would be another worthwhile Michigan Week activity, he said. A paint-up, clean-up and general campaign of beautification would do much to improve the tourist business.

Furlong called attention to the importance of friendliness and hospitality as tourist attractions and remarked that: "tourists return to communities where people are courteous, friendly and helpful."

Another suggestion encouraged a renewed interest in the geography and history of Michigan.

THE OBSERVANCE of Michigan Week would also afford an excellent opportunity for local tourist and resort meetings attended by business professional and resort people.

"One of the purposes of Michigan Week is to make Michigan people better acquainted with the vacation attractions of their individual areas and of the state as a whole," said Furlong. "This coincides with a goal of the tourist industry and the observance of the week will help to focus attention on this important phase of tourist promotion."

Orchard Notes



By C. Fairman

Reading the Grand Rapids Press about the new wonder drugs and the vast amount of them and new ones on the way is somewhat comparable to our new wonder spray materials that are harmless to fruit and foliage yet protects and kills fungus diseases and insects.

Chemical companies are coming out with new ones all of the time. As DDT left a residue when used in stables, a very large and powerful company originated "marlate" and "methoxychlor" that can be sprayed on cows and barns without harm to man. And for fruit trees it kills a larger number of insects as curculio, cherry fruit fly, etc.

While it kills these insects faster and better, this material has to be used oftener than arsenate of lead. It also can be used late on fresh fruit without leaving a harmful residue.

THE COMPANY that originated Parathion that would kill anything and even, at times, humans as well, has come out with a new one called Malathion. So far it is not fully known as to number of insects that it will kill. As of now it is recommended for mites and aphids.

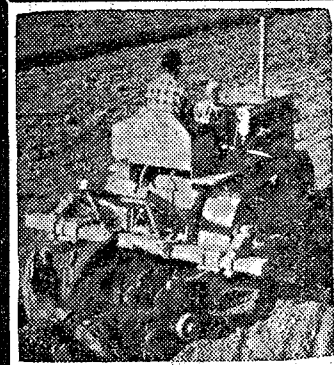

FARM GOSSIP COLUMN



Are there many young farmers in Michigan today? Or are Michigan farmers mostly older people? Many folks have the notion that the average age of our farmers has increased during the past 10 to 20 years. The 1950 Census of Agriculture gives us some answers to these questions.

In 1950 the average age of Michigan farmers was 49.9 years as compared with 50.7 in 1940. Thus the operators of Michigan's farms in 1950 averaged nearly a year younger than they did in 1940.

The Census of Agriculture reports ages of farmers by economic areas within the state. There was little variation in the ages of farmers throughout the state. However, the western half of the Upper Peninsula had the largest proportion of farmers over 65. It was also among the lowest in the proportion of farmers under 45 years of age.

THE LARGEST PROPORTION of younger farmers was in the "thumb area" of Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties. Forty percent of all the farmers there were under 45. The area also had the smallest proportion of farmers over 65 years of age.

For the state as a whole, approximately 22 percent of all farmers were in the 35-44, 45-54 and 55-64 year age groups.

The younger farmers operated the larger farms and the larger farm businesses. In every area of the state, they were on those farms of 140 acres or more and on the higher income farms. The older farmers are on the smaller, low-income farms.

This is as would be expected, because it is when farm operators are young and have an abundance of physical and mental energy that they put the most push in the farm business. In addition the younger farmers have growing families, larger debt loads and thus greater incentives to get the larger incomes that are associated with the larger farms and larger farm businesses.

Poultry farms seem to attract or are adapted to the operations of the older farmers. The census report indicates that in every area of Michigan poultry farmers are older than are farmers on other types of farms. Their average age is 55.2 years, which is about 5.5 years above the average. The specialized crop farmers average the youngest in age.

Dairy Farmers Must Improve Or Suffer

Michigan farmers who have not been able to show a profit from their dairy enterprise in the past year will be in serious trouble after April 1, when the dairy support price drops to 75 per cent of parity.

That is the conclusion of Edwin B. Jones of Michigan State College's agricultural economics department. Writing in the current issue of Michigan Farm Economics, Jones makes these additional points:

Farmers who are unable or unwilling to improve their operations should seriously consider leaving the dairy business. The support price drop will mean that many farmers will have to make major adjustments.

One way many farmers will be able to reduce their costs of producing milk to use more and better quality roughage and less protein and grain.

Since milk prices will decline rather drastically, while some other farm prices will remain about steady, some farmers can profit by turning to other farm enterprises as a means of increasing income.

Milk producers in the Detroit milk shed for example, will have their checks reduced by about \$40 per month if they continue to ship the same amount of milk as in 1953.

Replacement of poor quality cows will be especially important in the months to come. Cull cows which were profitable to keep in 1952 and 1953 may need to be sent to market in 1954.

Strange as it may seem, says Jones, some farmers will find it to their advantage to increase the size of their herds by adding good cows so that land, labor and investment can be utilized better even though the price of milk declines.

"For the months ahead," concludes Jones, "it appears that dairying will experience one of its most competitive eras. Dairy farmers who weather the storm and adjust their enterprises to these conditions will be more efficient producers and thus earn the right to compete for future production."

The business meeting was held in the afternoon. Mr. Walter Chellis told the group several facts about Michigan's Financial Liability laws, and Drivers Liability laws.

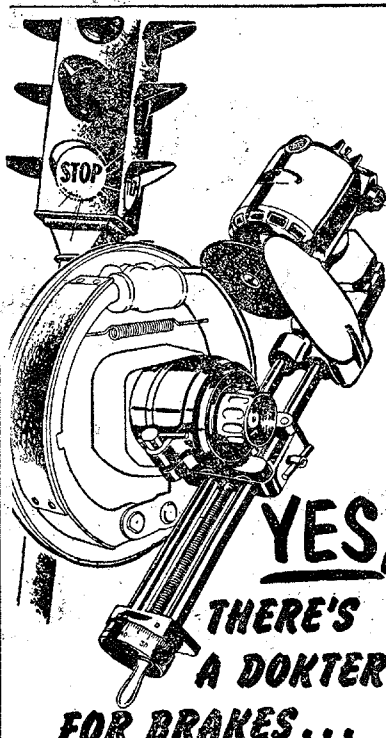

Don't Take Chances With March Seeding

Drill alfalfa seed in established wheat fields in early April instead of taking chances with a March seeding, advises county farm agent Ed Rebman.

He passes along these suggestions from Milo B. Tesar of the MSC farm crops department on how to get better legume seedings in wheat.

Drilling of the legume and fertilization of the wheat can be done in one operation.

Drop fertilizer tubes of the drill between disks for nitrogen application. Extend the legume seeder tubes to put the seed through the seed opening in the drill shoe.

Set the drill to cut from one-half to one inch deep, going crosswise to the direction of drilling the wheat if possible. Digging of the disks will not hurt the wheat yield. When drilling, the nitrogen falls between the disks and the legume seed falls in the drill disk furrow. Spring rains will cover the seed with soil. Separation of the legume seed from the band of nitrogen prevents any possible damage to the germinating seed from the nitrogen.

The earlier the drilling in April the better — but April 25 is not too late.

On droughty, less fertile soils, seedings may need more help for the best stands, Tesar asserts. He says 50 to 100 pounds of superphosphate drilled in contact with the seed will supply in this case the nitrogen would this needed "shot in the arm." have to be broadcast before seeding since the drill will not handle two kinds of fertilizer at one time.

Virus-Free Strawberries Approved

If you're not satisfied with your present strawberry plants, you can better production by buying virus-free varieties, Ed Rebman, county farm agent says.

Offered on the market for the first time this spring, the virus-free plants will survive winters better, are more vigorous, and will produce more runner plants than infected plants of the same variety, according to Rebman.

You now can get virus-free stocks of Catskill and Premier, two varieties recommended for Michigan, from eastern nurseries.

Michigan State College will be introducing virus-free varieties to nurseries next year, Rebman adds. The Michigan Department of Agriculture is cooperating in establishing a certification program for growers who wish to sell virus-free strawberry plants.

The certification program is expected to boost Michigan's already large business of selling strawberry plants to other states.

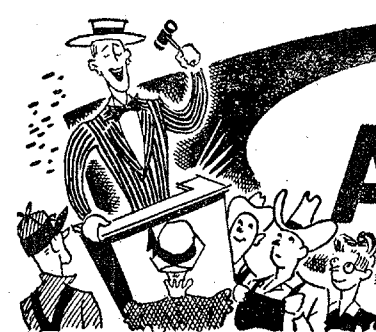

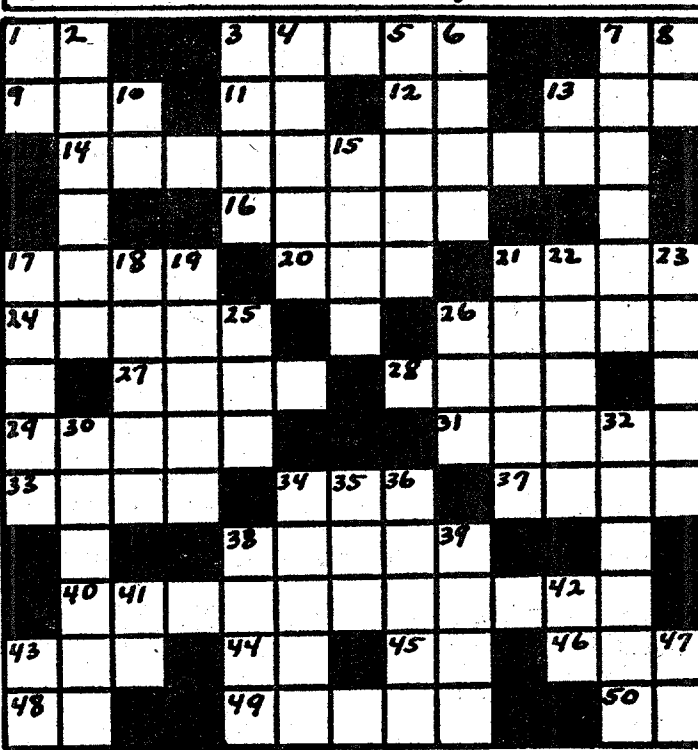
