



If you want a man to win an election it is your duty to get out and vote for that man. Don't be too sure "he'll get in anyway."



When you compare northern Michigan back in 1935, 20 years ago, with the northern Michigan of 1954, you catch your breath.

Within the last few years we have not only sold northern Michigan to visitors, but we have also sold it to ourselves. We believe in its future. And visitors are agreeing with us.

Let us not dream of the time when northern Michigan will be a vast modern territory in which people everywhere will want to live and work.

For that day is here now, waiting for us to do with it what we may.

There's a fight on in Lansing to allow school boards to appeal to the state tax commission decisions on property valuations made by the county board of supervisors.

Chairman Louis Anderson, Northport republican of the taxation committee told the House that: Schools in northern Michigan have their backs against the wall because of low tax valuations. They need more money but can't get it because of this situation. Assessments in many of the counties are ridiculously low, he said.





Professor Mitchell says that we cannot say any one spray material is better than another. He says the three leading new ones are in the fungicides "Captain," "Fermate," and "Craig.' If trees are healthly and not set back by drought copper can be used especially where the crop is light or a complete failure.

"Actidone" can be used on young cherry trees to cut the blossoms off—hence better growth of trees. Can also be used for an after harvest spray especially if shot hole appears. This material is not yet released by the Food and Drug Act. However it is expected to be.

The most important — and stubborn — facts confronting the farmer today are: 1) the acreage of the world on which his crops grow is surprisingly small; and 2) the prospects of adding to it substantially are remote.

The two-and-a-half billion acres now growing the world's food represent but two percent of the earth's surface. The remainder is covered by water (71 per cent), mountains (3.5 prcent), ice or snow or land which is too wet or dry to be habitable (5 percent). Twelve percent is very sparsely settled due to rigorous climate, extreme heat, deserts, jungles and other barriers to comfortable living. The remaining areas (6.5 per cent) consist of forests, hills, cities, rocky land, arid and eroded land, swamps—areas so barely settled or so unfit for cultivation that large-scale agriculture is next to impossible.

Add to this the fact that this tiny but vital patch of land must feed an ever increasing world population — 2,400,000,000 at present and growing at the rate of approximately 18,000,000 a year —and one begins to understand the enormity of the job that must be done.


There are tragic overtones. In the last 20 years, the world's food production has edged up a scant five per cent. Its population, however, jumped at least 25 per cent. A different picture prevails in the U. S. where, in the same priod, the population increased 18 percent and its food production rocketed 50 per cent.

Admittedly, herioc and costly conservation, reclamation and irrigation projects can add some acreage, but this will extend our arable area only a fraction. The solution lies in achieving better results in food crops and animal products from the land we now farm.

* * *

IT IS TO THIS task that we must apply ourselves and it is in this area where we stand our greatest chance of success.

The American farmer has not been forced to face his problems alone. At his side, from the early days of this country, have been the scientist, the engineer, the inventor. Growing and flourishing in an atmosphere of freedom, American industrial enterprises provided the farmer with a dazzling array of helpful servants. These range from the steel plow in the 1830's, which allowed the farmer to open the rich bottom lands of the Midwest, to the awesome and fantastic machine called the combine which harvests, threshes and cleans grain all in one operation. —(from "The Story of Farm Chemicals")

Small Grain Crops Often Lack Nitrogen Chances are that most fall-

seeded small grain crops don't have enough nitrogen in Charlevoix county, says Ed Rebman, county agricultural agent.

Experiences and research show that grains can use more ritrogen than that supplied by fertilizer applied at planting time, he explains.

Usually a grain crop that does not follow a good legume sod or receive liberal stable manuring will lack nitrogen. Nitrogen should be applied at from 20 to 30 pounds per acre of wheat and rye for harvest as grain. Forty pounds should go on rye to be plowed down for green manure.

It should be put on in the spring as soon as posible and it is not necessary to get the fertilizer into the soil. Any of the various forms of nitrogen are equally good if applied in proper amounts.

Nitrogen can be purchased in many forms such as anhydrous ammonia (82% N), ammonium sulfate $(20\frac{1}{2}\% N)$, ammonium nitrate (33% N) urea (45% N), and as Nitro-lime, Cal-Nitro, and A-N-L, all containing 16 to 20.5% nitrogen.

Rebman doubts that customer operators will make anhydrous ammonia available in northern Michigan in 1954.

Should You Get To Plant? "What variety to plant?" is an important question in Charlevoix county emphasizes Ed Rebman, county agricultural agent.

Lower temperatures and shorter growing seasons make it important to grow adapted varieties, he explains, if a farmer wants good yields.

In oats, the recommended and Michigan certified varieties are Eaton, Craig, and Clinton. Other varieties may give comparable yields if they are rust-resistant. High-germination, clean and treated seed and early planting are important to a good oat crop. In the barleys. Bay, Moore,

In the barleys, Bay, Moore, and Wisconsin No. 38 are good feed crops, advises Rebman. Grasses as a group are less

selective in their climatic requirements. Brome grass on upland soils and in mixture with legumes for hay or pasture—and reed canary grass on poorly drained soils—are the best bets for the northern area.

Legume recommendations include alfalfa of the northerngrown Grimm types or Ranger for stands staying several years where wilt is a factor. Certified ladino generally will assure a higher purity. Locally-grown red clovers are satisfactory, but seed supplies of named varieties that will outperform present species are being tested and built up for use.
