Taylor Becomes Mayor Of Akron, Michigan In State Celebration

Local Committee Explains Plans For East Jordan

Mayor Chris Taylor will move from East Jordan May 5th to become Mayor of Akron, a small community outside Bay City. It is all part of the state-wide celebration of "Michigan Week" which is being observed throughout the state May 2 to 8.

While Taylor is "Mayor For A Day" at Akron, the Akron Mayor will take Taylor's place in East Jordan.

East Jordan's Michigan Week celebration committee reports plans for window decorations of every store in the city.

The committee has ordered window banners and cards and banners to be fastened on the bumpers of automobiles. They will ask that each merchant put a flag out in front of their place of business.

The committee is making plans to welcome the Mayor of Akron and to hold a small luncheon while he is here.

Local chairman of the Michigan Week committee is Ole Hegberg. Other members are Chris Taylor, Minnie DesJardins, Rev. Edward DeHaven and Marshall Sayles.

FIRST MEETING of the committee was held at the city hall Monday night. A second meeting is planned before the celebration. Churches, the school and other groups are being asked to take part.

Plans Shaped For Local Youths Summer Outing

Following a meeting of recreational men from Petoskey, Boyne City, Pellston and East Jordan held at Petoskey high school April 7th, dates for the 1954 Summer Recreation Camp for Boys at Camp Ocqueoc were announced. The dates are: June 14-19 and June 21-26.

BIG HIGHWAYS SOUGHT BY ROAD COMMISSIONERS

Jordan Inn Scene Of North Conflab On Straits Bridge

Northern Michigan road commissioners are seeking a state survey of roads in the straits area before the straits bridge is built.

Meeting at the Jordan Inn Tuesday noon members of the County Road Commissioners Association of the 29th senatorial District expressed desire for new roads leading south from the bridge when the structure is finished.

The commissioners pointed to the expected influx in traffic even before the bridge is finished.

State Representative Emil Pelts, of Rogers City, chairman of the roads and bridge committee of the house, agreed with the commissioners that now is the time to start the survey for new roads.

It was claimed that a large number of businessmen along US-27 from Gaylord to Lansing are asking for a 4-lane highway to funnel traffic to the bridge.

JOHN BARR, engineer - director of the county road association of Lansing said the further you go south the less interest there is in new roads in the straits area; and that the association would have to fight for them.

Rep. Pelts told the men that it would probably take an act of the legislature to get a new highway started so soon, since present funds or plans do not provide for it.

Mayor Chris Taylor, of East Jordan, welcomed the road men who came from Alpena, Cheboygan, Emmet, Montmorency, Charlevoix and Presque Isle counties.

Also attending the meeting were: Ben Jeffs, secretary of the Northern Michigan Road Commissioners Association, of Lake City; Claude Yackey, of the state highway department, of Alpena; Lew Burridge, consulting engineer for seven northern counties, of Cadillac.

SAM ROGERS, of East Jordan, a member of the Charlevoix county road commission, was host and responsible for meeting arrangements. Others from the county road commission were Tim Reynolds and Lyle Wangerman of Boyne City; and Karl Erber and Ralph Hamilton of Charlevoix.

County supervisors attending included: Barney Milstein, William Bashaw, Robert Barnett and Ben Smatts.

Bill Trojanek Named To Co-op Board

The quarter million dollar farmer-operated East Jordan Cooperative Company held its 36th annual meeting at the high school Monday night, studying the annual report and electing a new director, Bill Trojanek of East Jordan.

One of the north's largest cooperatives, the organization under the management of Bill Stanek showed a 1953 total asset report of \$300,354.51. Last year it was \$273,040.62.

In addition to selling farm supplies the cooperative also acts as northern Michigan distributor for the famous Sunoco gasoline and oils.

The firm's 1953 gross profit on sales totaled \$183,133.68, according to the annual statement released at the meeting.

About 200 farmer members attended the meeting which was followed with refreshments.

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EASTER SERMONETTE

"Who Shall Roll Away the Stone for Us?"
"And When They Looked, The Stone was Rolled Away."

The Gospels record for us a journey of a few women, early one morning, to the tomb where the body of Jesus had been placed after the crucifixion. Certain stark facts confronted them. Jesus was dead. He had been crucified as a common rebel. His friends had placed the body in a borrowed tomb. The entrance to the tomb had been sealed with a great stone and a Roman guard set over it. Their dreams had ended. Out of their great love for Him they now went to prepare His body for the final repose in the tomb.

What happens when a dream ends? Especially when it has had all of the realities of love and compassion and goodness woven into it? When it has been pleasant beyond all usual imagination? Can we look into the hearts of these women and find an answer?

Surely there must have been futility in their hearts. It is even said here that they were wondering among themselves, 'who would roll away the stone for them.' Here was the symbol of their broken dream, the unhappy ending to their happiness as they had known it because of Jesus. They would have to go back to the lone plodding of the old ways and even carry the sting of laughter and scorn from others because of the folly of following their dream.

There must have been bitterness also in their hearts. If others had only known Him as they knew Him! If others had only known of His love and compassion and care as they knew them. Others treated Him as an intruder into their well-worked plans but they knew Him as one who had set their lives in high places out of degradation and given to them aspirations and hope. All this could now only be seen in the bitterness of defeat.

Nearer and nearer they came to the place where he had been laid and their hearts grew heavier with grief. The stone would always separate them from the companionship and understanding of this One whom they loved. They could only draw near enough to look upon this symbol of separateness, the tomb. The considerate voice was still. The compassionate hands would no longer touch in kindness. Their grief was great.

But they went to minister unto Him! While others looked themselves behind doors or fled the city in fright, they went to minister unto Him! With all of the burden of futility, bitterness and grief, they sought to do their duty. And when they looked, the stone was rolled away.

This is Easter. This is what God says about Himself. Its no longer a secret or even a supposition. Those who seek him, in spite of the burdens they bear, doing their duty unto Him because they Love Him, find the great revelation of His love and care and eternal concern for them.

We live in a world of futility. The "Awful Arithmetic" of the H-bomb is beginning to be spelled out. And people carry the burden of futility of life in their hearts today.

We live in a world of bitterness! Half of the world looks upon the other half as, "intruders into their well-worked plans" and with it comes the bitterness of distrust, and hatred and greed.

We live in a world of grief. The painful, grief-stricken blots on humanity are all over the world. Hungry, homeless, helpless, in the midst of the ravages of war and greed, there is enough grief all over the world that it cannot be silenced with big talk.

It must be assumed that all of this need not be. It was assumed by God, that mankind need not suffer. So he sent Jesus into the world to show us the way. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, that whosoever believeth (loveth) Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

In the final chapter of the Gospel of John, there is recorded the meeting of the risen Lord with His disciples on the old favored shores of the Sea of Galilee. Again it was early morning and after they had eaten breakfast, Jesus speaks to Peter. What did He say? "Simon, son of Jonas, Lovest Thou Me?" Three times He asked the question as though he were asking, How are you going to be my disciple?

Well, how are you? Because you live in a Christian land? Because your parents were Christians? Because your friends are? Because you feed people? What do you feed People? No, because they loved Him. And because they loved Him they served Him. And when they looked, the stone was rolled away.

The most unfortunate developments concerning construction of the straits bridge, according to Prentiss Brown, bridge authority chairman, is the rapid spread of misinformation about employment. First employees will be skilled workers provided through unions. He does not advise anyone to come to the straits looking for a job.

North-state cities to exchange mayors are: East Jordan with Akron; Ellsworth with Augusta; Bellaire with Plainwell; Boyne City with Freesoil; Boyne Falls with Romeo; Mancelona with Carson City; Central Lake with Rogers City; Charlevoix with Portland; Mackinaw City with Trenton; Kalkaska with New Buffalo; Gaylord with Salline; and Wolverine with Garden City.

Cut Cost Of Your Legume Seed

The cost of legume seed is a big item on the expense ledger on most northern Michigan farms and anything farmers can do to reduce it is money in the bank. Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county farm agent, says.

By preparing clean seedbeds and using proper methods of seeding, the cost can be cut. Rebman adds that proper seedbed preparation means getting one that is relatively free of competing weeds, like quackgrass.

Quackgrass can be removed by the use of clean cultivated crops in the rotation and by leaving fallow the previous season.

The use of the band seeding

method, where the seed is deposited behind the opening shoes on the grain drill, directly over the fertilizer and grain seed is best. Many farmers now firm the soil over the seed after it is planted.

The best practice is to have special tubes on the drill to carry the seed about 15 inches behind the opening shoes. This allows the soil to fall back into place and it leaves the legume cultipacking will not get it too deep. Ask for Folder 180 explaining how to correct your present grain drill for band seeding.

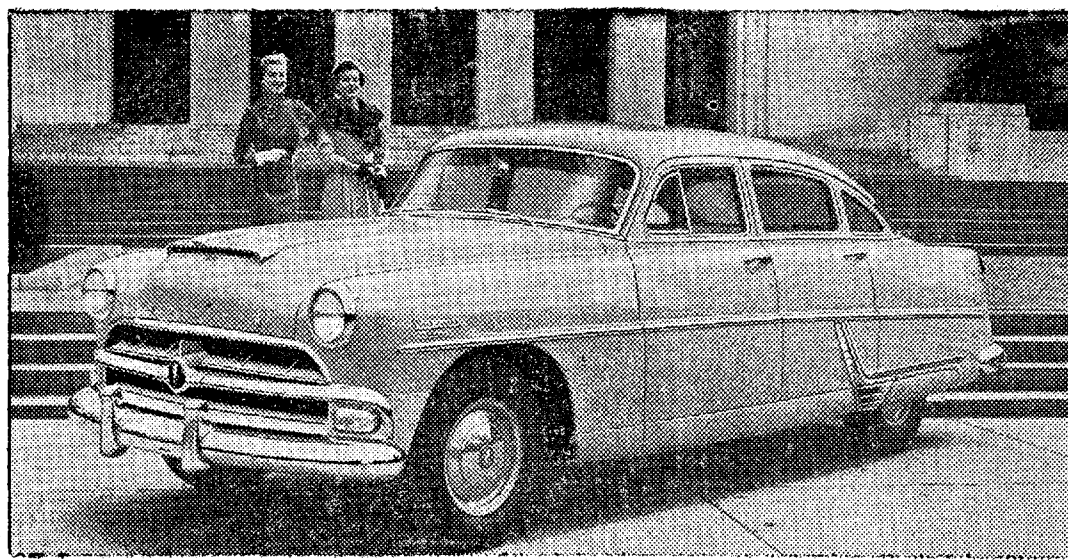

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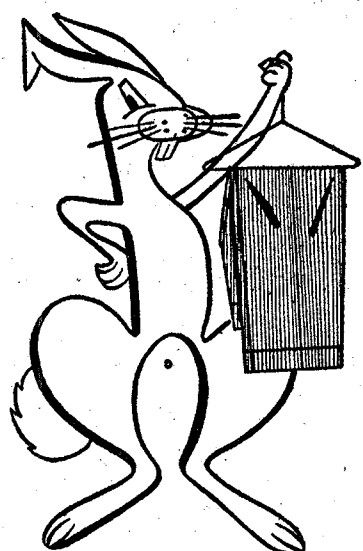

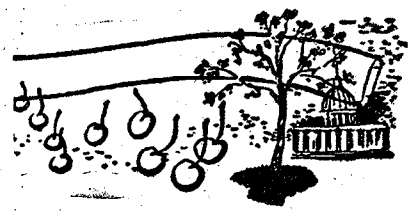

SWEET CHERRIES AS COMPARED TO MONTMORENCIES

It is not always possible to get a full stand the first year. The sweets live twice as long as Monts. Takes twice as long to get them in full production and when well grown, they produce twice as much yield.

While the sweets usually do not freeze at blossom time as the Monts sometimes do, the sweets will freeze out or die back from low winter temperatures that will not affect Monts or apples. Thirty below zero is bad for sweets.

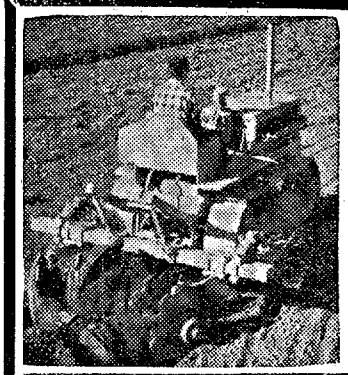
Sweets need pollinizers. Deacon and Black Tartarian are the best for that purpose. Sweets require more fertilizing and barnyard manure is the best for them. Sweets cannot stand harsh spray materials. Today Fernate as a fungicide and Marlate for insects is the best for sweets.

On an average sweets sell for a higher price either as fresh fruit or to canneries.

Watch your location as to temperature, birds, coons. Sweets do not wind whip.

As to the size of the tree and yield, the Windsor is in first place. It takes its color when full ripe and hangs on the tree well and does not lose its flavor when fully ripe. On soils that it does well on, it is the best money maker.

Each variety has its good and bad points. Do not trim sweet cherry trees, or very lightly, if at all. Before planting heavy, call on sweet growers.



FARM GOSSIP COLUMN

Nearly 2 million dollars worth of farm products last year were raised and consumed on Michigan's 15 prison and hospital farms.

The State Agricultural Department co-ordinates activities on the state's institutional farms.

Figured at 1953's lower wholesale prices \$1,525,060 was the value of dairy poultry, swine, fruit, potatoes and garden stuff raised. Other field crops produced and consumed by farms totaled \$217,001.41.

The state owns between 2,100 and 2,400 head of purebred Holstein dairy cattle and is one of the biggest Holstein owners in the world.

The state is pretty much in farming business with 11,121 acres under cultivation last year at the 15 institutions. The largest farm operation was at the prison at Jackson where 2,918 acres were worked. Other leaders were the Kalamazoo State hospital with 1,149 acres, Lapeer State Home & Training school 1,096 acres, and the Newberry State hospital with 1,040 acres.

All of the products raised on these farms are consumed by those and other institutions.

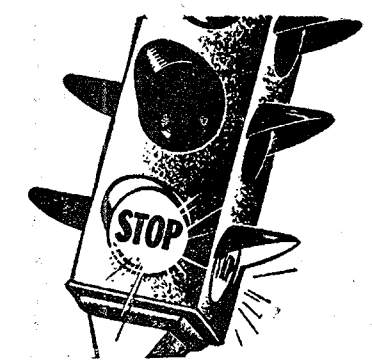

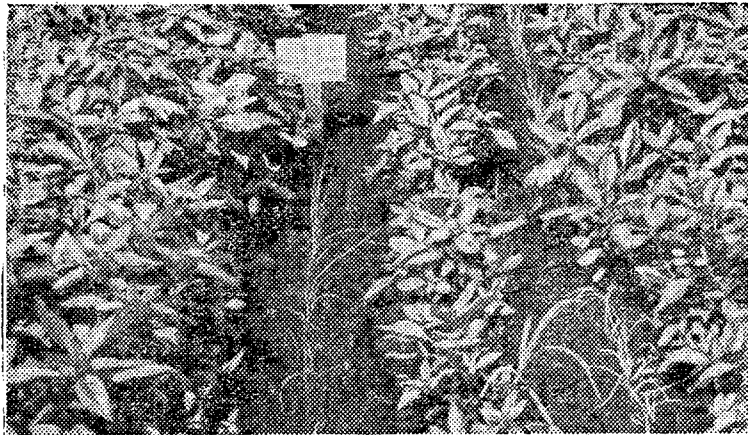

Results of post-emergence weed control are shown in onions

Weeds are responsible for greater losses to farmers than any other single factor except soil erosion, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Annual cost of weed damage is figured at over \$5 billions.

This damage may not involve actual crop destruction. Greatest losses may come from failure to reach maximum yields. C. Allan Shadbolt and Dr. L. C. Holm, University of Wisconsin horticulture department, point out. Also, weeds may harbor insects or diseases, and interfere with normal cultural practices.

EARLY CONTROL VITAL

Two years of experiments at the Wisconsin university on weed damage show that "it is extremely important that most weeds be removed within the first three weeks after crop emergence to prevent losses of yield and quality," research assistant Shadbolt and Dr. Holm report. While crops vary in resistance to weed competition, as with the carrots, beets and onions in the Wisconsin experiments, "timeliness in weed control on vegetable crops cannot be overestimated."

It was also found that "a 15% weed stand can do nearly as much injury as a 50% stand" because each weed plant, if allowed to compete freely, will grow much more vigorously.

Such research focuses even greater attention on weed control, especially by chemicals. However, Professor Charles J. Noll of Pennsylvania State University advises that chemical weeding is an additional method, not a substitute for cultivation, crop rotation or other good weeding practices. "Where chemical herbicides are used successfully, number of cultivations and cost of weeding are reduced and control improved."

On canning crops, Professor Noll feels "weeding should not be the sole responsibility of the grower. For crops such as peas and lima beans losses due to weeds may result primarily from increased costs of cutting, hauling and vining. With other crops weed losses are due to increased harvesting costs, increase in disease, decrease in yield and quality..."

Dr. S. K. Ries of Michigan State College points out that while chemicals are as practical today for controlling weeds as for insects and diseases in processing crops, certain environmental limitations affect most

weed control chemicals. Temperature of air or soil availability of moisture, soil type, for instance may influence their effectiveness.

KNOW HOW TO USE

"Those persons who expect to use weed control chemicals effectively," says Dr. Ries, "should observe certain fundamental principles of application... which should be followed even more closely than other cultural or cropping practices."

Professor E. M. Rahn, University of Delaware, comments that 1954 will see a "tremendous increase" in use of herbicides on canning crop asparagus, lima beans and peas, and a "moderate increase" in treated acreage of potatoes, snap beans and pickles. "Pre-emergence sprays will be used on all these crops except peas, to which dinitrophenols will be applied when pea plants are about 6" tall."

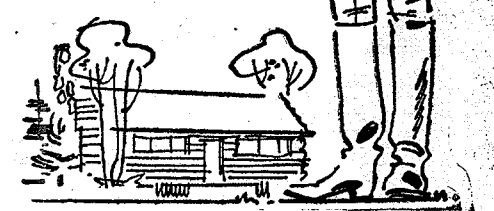

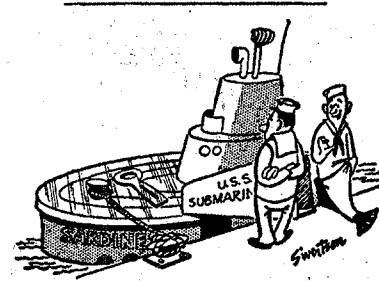

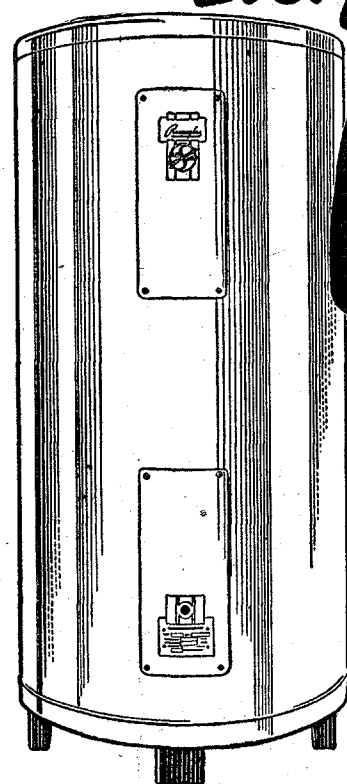
