## OVER THE BACK FENCE

A popular chant around town is: "My water and sewer bill is too high; and how do they figure it, anyway!"

That's what we wanted to know so we checked on the figuring of our own bill (which was high like the price of coffee and too many other things these days.)

First we discovered that the city is attempting to pay off about \$200,000 to construct our sewage disposal plant. And the natural question is: "Well, for gosh sakes, why charge us now, we aren't getting the use of the plant yet?"

Then we discovered it is like going to a big hospital. You pay first and then they put the needle in your arm or make you say, "Ah." But you must pay first.

We also discovered that interest on the \$200,000 must be paid now, no matter when the plant is completed.

Finally, we went along with the fact that the money must be collected from the residents starting pronto. But that didn't tell us how they figured our bill.

We looked at our bill. The treatment plant rate was \$5.00. Let's say our water used (consumption) read, \$10. These two are added together, \$15. That's your sewer bill. Then they take the water used again (\$10) and add 25 cents meter charge and your water bill is \$10.25. Your water bill (\$10.25) added to your sewer bill, \$15 makes the total \$25.25.

With a gnashing of teeth we discovered that we were paying twice for the actual amount of water we used. That's correct. So don't think they made a mistake. You pay a \$5.00 treatment rate and double for the amount of water you use.

This is the method used to collect \$200,000 from the residents to pay for a sewage disposal plant which the state of Michigan forced upon the residents.

We think the rate is high, we don't like the way of figuring our bill and are mad at the state for kicking up this fuss. But as residents of East Jordan we are paying the bill and hoping the plant will prove a valuable asset to our community.

Two men sat silently across from each other at a big desk in a Chicago office. Out on the business horizon these men loomed large, but in the privacy of their office they were just "Tommy" and "Charley."

Old Man Depression weighed down their sagging shoulders and Mr. Gloom shaded each face. For it was 1933.

The two recent auto accidents on the Mill street bridge over the Jordan River point up the urgent need for yellow caution lights on either end of the narrow structure.

The bridge is maintained by the State highway department since it is on M-32.

In both accidents the autos rammed the steel girders which form the side of the bridge. Both turned over on the bridge, but might have fallen the other way. And someone might have been drowned.

Motorists complain the bridge is too narrow. Large busses and trucks crossing leave little room for a passenger car.

Perhaps future plans for M-32 through the city call for enlarging the bridge. But even so, either side should be plainly marked at night before a serious accident takes a life. —Marshall Sayles, editor

Persons looking for pets, may soon find them if they will register their desires and names at our office. We ask for a small contribution to extend this hu-

mane service, but in extreme cases we will accept any pet to prevent its suffering which will result in a cruel death.

The shelter is at the corner of Burgess Road and Old US 31 and after May 15th; the public is invited to visit the temporary office being set up there.





The extended spring rainbow trout season afforded anglers only spotty results on opening week end, conservation department field sources report.



Generally high, roily water and late winter weather has meant few rainbows on upstream spawning runs as yet. Rains on opening weekend also kept stream waters stirred.



**ORDINANCE NUMBER 87**

**AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE REMOVAL OF DOORS, LOCKS AND/OR LATCHES FROM REFRIGERATORS, COOLERS, CHESTS, CABINETS OR OTHER CONTAINERS ABANDONED, UNATTENDED, DISCARDED OR NOT IN CURRENT USE IN THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN; DEFINING THE SIZE AND TYPE OF CONTAINERS TO WHICH THIS APPLIES; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; AND PROVIDING FOR IMMEDIATE EFFECT AS AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE.**

**THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:**

Section 1. Any refrigerator, cooler, chest, cabinet or other container having a capacity of one and one-half (1½) cubic feet or more and which has an attached lid or lids, and/or door or doors which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch, lock, snap latch, air tight snap lock or other locking device thereon incapable of being opened from the inside shall be within the scope of this Ordinance.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to leave abandoned, unattended or discarded any container as defined in Section 1 hereof, either inside or outside any building, structure or dwelling within said City of East Jordan in a place accessible to children without first removing the snap latch, snap lock, air tight snap lock, latch, lock, or other locking device thereon or without first removing the lids and/or doors from such refrigerator, cooler, chest or cabinet.

Section 3. (a) Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to a fine of not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than Ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

(b) Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

Section 4. The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid part or parts.

Section 5. Whereas many instances of death by suffocation have occurred in other cities, due to children becoming locked in abandoned or unattended refrigerators or other types of self locking containers, his ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and publication.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be published in the East Jordan News-Herald within ten (10) days from its adoption and shall become effective immediately upon said publication.

Section 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

## Orchard Notes

Spring is the most interesting time of the year for the fruit grower. Trees are already growing now. For an ideal orchard cultivator to keep the land level, see the orchard cultivator at the Porter orchard. This cultivator also helps to conserve moisture and puts your fertilizer down. It is also beneficial for sod orchards.

See your local supplier for spray materials. "Malathion" shows much promise for apples as it kills all kinds of aphids, mites, codling moth and curculio as well as other insects. Of course we will have to see whether it does any foliage damage. Follow directions and do not add over the required amount.

## Give Pasture Head Start, Says Rebman

Don't be too eager to turn cows out to pasture this spring, let the pasture get enough of a head start so your cows won't eat it down to the roots the first few days, suggests Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Extension dairyman George Parsons of Michigan State College says that enough of a head start for alfalfa-brome means about eight to 10 inches in height. But alfalfa fields that are to be plowed should be grazed as soon as there is enough growth. That goes for bluegrass

and rye, too. Usually rye pasture is ready for grazing the latter part of April and alfalfa-brome is ready about May 10.

Parsons insists that home grown grains are sufficient feed along with early spring grazing. Although cows often refuse to eat grain when they're first turned out, that's only temporary. And, he adds, don't be concerned if the cows lose some weight. Most of the loss is from the lack of fill and if sufficient feed is given along through the pasture season, the weight soon will be regained.

Best method for feeding hay to reduce the danger of bloat is from a rack right in the pasture according to Parsons. That's so the cows can get to the hay easily when it's needed. The hay should be coarse—like sudan or reed canary hay.

### Get Correct Results From Soil Samples

When you take a soil sample, do it right so the results you get from the soil testing laboratory will mean something. That's a suggestion from Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

He asserts that a ton of fertilizer that the particular soil or crop needs may produce more bushels than two or three tons of "guess fertilizer." Here, according to Rebman, is the right way to take a soil sample:

In fields where soil and the crop is uniform, samples can be taken at three scattered locations to represent the whole field. At each separate location, you should take eight to 10 separate samples within an area five to 10 rods in diameter. Use a clean spade, a shovel, auger or sampling tube to take about a cupful that will represent the depth of a plow layer. Mix the eight to 10 samplings thoroughly in a clean pail, use about a teaspoonful of this mixture for the sample to be tested.

The sample can be placed in any clean container—a tin can, paper carton or paper bag. If the soil is damp and placed in a paper bag, however, it should be wrapped first in wax paper.

And you should make a record of where the samples were taken—which fields and locations in the field. Mark the samples clearly at the time you take them in

the field—to prevent mistakes. Then submit the samples to the Cooperatives Extension office at Boyne City with the information on each sample:

Crop to be grown, crop rotation, when lime was last applied recent fertilizer or manure applications and special problems in the field. This information is needed in order to help Rebman give recommendations.

### Up Planting Rate For Top Corn Yields

Don't be stingy with your seed when you're planting corn if you want the best yields.

MSC farm cropsmen suggest growing 16,000 plants per acre if you have good corn land. That is in contrast to what farmers on good corn ground usually plant—about 10,000 plants per acre. On lighter or less productive soil, however, your planter should be adjusted to put out less seeds per acre.

How do you know you're getting approximately 16,000 seeds planted per acre? You can estimate rate roughly his way: If your planter is using a bushel of medium flat seed corn in five acres, you are planting about 16,000 seeds per acre. If you are using 38 to 40-inch rows, the seeds will be about ten inches apart; if it's 42-inch rows, the seeds will be about nine inches apart.



## East Jordan Smelt King Dies In G. R.

Jay H. Metcalf, aged 60, life long resident of Grand Rapids, died in Butterworth Hospital Friday night, April 23rd.

Mr. Metcalf was well known in East Jordan and March 25, 1935 during the National Smelt Jamboree was crowned the third King of Smeltium. The Metcalfs have a cabin on Cedar River, west of Mancelona.

Mr. Metcalf was a WW I veteran, serving under Capt. Dwight D. Eisenhower at Camp Colt, Maryland before going into service overseas.

His father, Samuel H. Metcalf was one of the earliest morticians in Grand Rapids, whose two sons continued the business under the name of S. H. Metcalf and Company. Both are now dead and a third generation has succeeded to the business.

Mr. Metcalf was a leader in technical research problems and was at one time President of the National Selected Morticians Chemical Research Board.

Surviving are the wife, Klara, two daughters, Mrs. Oliver J. O'Field, Grand Rapids, and Mrs. Arlo W. Pickens of Lake Odessa; and a son, William J., of Detroit and eight grandchildren.

Those wishing to contribute funds or labor are asked to contact Andy Anderson.


It was expected Monday that two deer would be placed in Sportsman's park through the effort of Walt Hickcox.
