Employee embezzles \$673,000

The Boyne City police department and the Charlevoix County prosecuting attorney have charged a Boyne City woman with embezzlement from her former employer. Karla Lockman, age 34, was arrested and arraigned last week. Lockman was charged with two counts of embezzlement, at this time.

The Boyne City police department received a complaint from the owners of Northern Preferred Title Company regarding missing money from their business. A lengthy investigation has determined that a minimum of \$673,000 was converted into Lockman's personal bank account, and was used to purchase a new home and furnishings, new vehicles, horses, trailers and other personal possessions or expenses. Karla Lockman had been employed as a closing agent by Northern Preferred Title. Lockman deposited money from closings, belonging to her employer and their clients, into her personal bank account and they received cashier's checks from her band, most of which were used for personal items or services. The em-

Horton Bay expands services

Horton Bay General Store was built in 1876, and it has always been in some incarnation of the same building, and it has always been, at least to some degree, a general store.

It was a central meeting place, a dry good store, and has always had ready to eat foods. Its services changed with the dictates of the time. From 1879 to 1910, the store served as a local post office, even.

Those days are back.

Chip and Claudia Lorenger, former owners of JD's Market in Boyne City, bought the store four years ago. They envisioned a nice store, with the ability to offer fine food. They procured a tavern license for the back, and renovated what were previously living quarters into Morgan's, where they serve that fine food along with beer and wine — the winter months found it cheerfully busy, with local folks gathering for food and conversation in front of a crackling wood fire.

But their vision also extended to the services they would provide Horton Bay by bringing back a genuine "general" store. The store had, through a progression of owners, slipped into a party store motif, and the Lorengers wanted to bring it back to its roots. These days customers can come in for a sandwich or a pound of coffee: a cup of coffee or a coffee cup.


That 40 he shot was the winning game in his age group — 4 years through 6 years — in the State U.S. Kid's Tournament, held at Forest Akers in Lansing.



Scents of time


Is it just me, or are smells truly the most evocative thing in the world? More than sights, I think, because nothing looks the same forever. People don't keep looking the same, landscapes and architecture and decorating styles change. They say you can never go back, and I think maybe that's right - but smells can take you back to a place or a time or a feeling in a flash, sometimes unbearable.


Who hasn't heard a mother complain that a certain smell has bothered her ever since it triggered her first trimester nausea - thirty years ago? Who (except those unfortunate sufferers of allergies) doesn't breathe in the scent of

house. In the summer it went with fresh mown hay, in the winter it warmed the smell of snow.

I bought a new perfume this week because it smelled like the flowering bush that grew outside the basement door when I was young --- a big bush, and unattractive, with shaggy bark and brittle, snagging branches. But on those branches bloomed a little flower with a scent as pungent and delectable as honeysuckle, only with a pinker aroma - no musk, no spice, just rich sweetness, purely floral. Whenever I catch a whiff of myself these days, I am transported, but just for a millisecond.

My husband's Chevy is another smell. Neil's a pretty tidy, organized guy, and the interior of his Blazer never smells like old french fries or spilled sodas. It smells like one of those tree-shaped air-fresheners, which I don't care for, actually, and his is vanilla-scented, which I generally also don't care for (unless it's for baking, and then, of course, it has a scent history as long as my life).

But I don't know. Events influence smells, like first trimester nausea. In this case, the smell is a dating smell. I get in the Blazer, and it's an automatic date, even if we aren't going any place special. It has that sort of masculine attempt at clean smell, and it smells like a special

Christmas trees - so many people have fake ones that the stores sell pine scent at Christmastime. I know why. It's because the feeling of Christmas is captured better by the smell of the tree than its look. I have had a fake one since I got married, and I will admit, it's convenient. And I will also admit, it looks darn nice when it's decorated. People don't even know it's fake. But I do. It doesn't smell like anything. I put it up with about as much enthusiasm as I would set up a garage sale, and take it back down without a pang of nostalgia. In my real tree days, I would drag the tree though the house after Christmas, leaving a trail of needles that burrowed into crevices unknown, and I would be reliving Christmas in June, when the vacuum picked up those straggling and stubborn pine needles and cast their scent out with its exhaust.

Sandlewood takes me to a time in my childhood when we had an IndiaIndian visitor, Kanwarjit Singh Dinghra (we said K.D. Singh), and he gave me a little sandlewood figurine of a snake charmer; lavender takes me to England - and so does diesel exhaust. I won't even tell you what takes me to the streets of Paris, but it is that smell's dubious redemption.

And skunks take me to warm weather.

When the first little skunk gets hit out on the road, and expires in a cloud of atomized defenses, and my car, perhaps still maneuvering an icy stretch, passes by the scene of its demise, I get my first lingering breath of spring. I love that smell.

Skunks are hibernators. They come out in spring. And early every spring, when they are perhaps still groggy with sleep, a few will wander out into the roadway to be struck by hapless drivers. The ensuing scent is one of the surest signs of coming warm weather.

I know everyone says they hate this smell, but I have a theory: when someone hates an odor, don't they do everything they can not to smell it? When you use an outhouse, for instance, you cover your mouth and nose. You rush. You avert your face.

People drive by a dead skunk, breathe in deeply, and say, "Eeeew! Skunk!" Then everyone who hasn't yet smelled it takes a good whiff and there follows an animated conversation about how disgusting that smell is.

Look, skunk spray — up close — is noxious and literally sickening, it's true. I doubt if anyone likes that smell.

But I equally doubt that very many people actually hate the drive-by smell of skunk as much as they profess.

Go ahead, breathe deep. It's a summer smell.



Keeping drivers ed local

TO THE EDITOR:

My name is Darrin Hawes. I am the co-owner of a driver's education company, which makes its home in the Gaylord/Grayling area. The name of this company is Northern Driving School. This company is in no way affiliated with Up North Driving School of Pellston.

Northern Driving School is committed to providing an excellent educational experience to the students of northern Michigan, Northern Driving School's commitment to excellence is exemplified in it policy of only hiring certified, public school teachers—people who have made a lifetime commitment to young people.

A concern I have is the way the Boyne Falls/Boyne City area has been treated by a downstate company. Last year this company charged students \$280 for Segment I driver's education. This was occurring while the same company was charging \$199 for the same course in Gaylord. This year the company is again offering the class for \$199 in Gaylord, but is charging the students of your community \$229 — only because they were forced to try to match our company's price.

Knowing this, I contacted school officials from both communities to make them aware of the fact that we were willing to provide this service for \$230. The Boyne Falls School agreed to allow us to teach within their

However, when I approached the Boyne City High School principal, our company was denied the opportunity to rent space in the school for the purpose of providing driver's education to students. Instead, the downstate company was allowed back into the school,

even though they had taken advantage of the parents and students of Boyne City a year earlier.

Although the downstate company did come in \$1 cheaper than our company's bid, I would have to ask your community, "Why couldn't this company provide the service last year, when gas prices and insurance rates were lower, at the rates they are charging this year?" The parents of last year's students paid over \$50 more for the same service, which is provided this year - by the same company. Should the company, from down state, give the students a refund? Should this company have been allowed back into the district's buildings, when the school administration was made aware of this? I know that I would have a hard time explaining this situation to the parents who paid so much last year.

I contacted the superintendent for Boyne City Schools this spring with these concerns. Unfortunately, I never did receive a response to the letter I wrote. If someone takes the time to write and sign a letter, it needs to be addressed in some manner.

I need to add one last comment here. Since Up North Driving School (of Pellston) is no longer teaching in your community, Northern Driving School is the only northern Michigan-owned driver's education company, which instructs in your community. Do you really want to see your hardearned dollars go downstate to a person who only cares about your money and not your students? I think not.

History of Flag Day

TO THE EDITOR:

The idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the flag is believed to have first originated in 1885 when B.J. Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisc. public school to observe June 14 (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of the Stars and Stripes) as "Flag Birthday." In 1894, the ible, with liberty and justice for all." Thus it was that governor of New York directed that on June 14th the flag be displayed on all public buildings and on June 14, 1894, the first general public school children's celebration of Flag Day in Chicago was held with more than 300,000 children participating.

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially established by the proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3, 1949, that President Truman signed an act of congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

By a joint resolution on June 9, 1966, the Congress requested the president to issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week and calling upon citizens of the United States to display the flag during that week. Mr. Francis Bellamy, an ordained minister of Rome, New York, is credited with the authorship of the original pledge and in material which he nationally circulated,

he wrote, "Let the Flag float over every school-house in the land and the exercise be such as shall impress upon our youth the patriotic duty of citizenship." He also included the original 23 words of the pledge which he had developed. "I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands, one nation indivison Columbus Day, October 12, 1892, the Pledge of Allegiance was repeated by more than 12 million public school children in every state in the union. In 1923, the words "the Flag of the United States" were substituted for "my Flag." In 1924, "of America" were added. On Flag Day 1954, the words "under God" became a part of the Pledge. Thus the 23 words have become 31 words. The idea of the annual pause for the Pledge of Allegiance originated in 1980 and on June 20, 1985, the 99th Congress passed and President Reagan signed Public Law 99-54 recognizing the pause for the Pledge of Allegiance as part of National Flag Day activities. The effect of this simple ceremony, which transcends age, race, religion, national origin, political and geographic differences, is a stimulating patriotic experience at home and a sign of unity abroad.

June 14, at 7 p.m., we showed our colors and joined our countrymen in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag. That day, and this, may God bless America.º

Local artist opens gallery; creates East Jordan poster

Kelly Britt has been painting for a number of years, but when she and her husband, Geoff, bought Swan Valley Marina five years ago, she agreed to put her artwork on the back burner while she worked full-time as a co-owner, occupying herself with book-keeping and the daily details of running a marina on Lake Charlevoix.

As a watercolorist, Britt had a portfolio of painting that she had completed over the years, and she continued to cherish the free time she had to devote to painting, but when Geoff put her paintings in the marina gift store and they began to sell, she realized she needed to do more.

"When a painting sold," she said, "I had nothing to replace it with."

Five years later, Britt was ready to give up her position at the marina and throw herself back into her work. The success of her paintings at the gift store encouraged her to revise the focus

"Up until now, the marina's been my baby. It's a momand-pop establishment," she said. "But this October we will reach the five-year point. I have set aside my dream to paint full-time," but now she says it is time to return to her calling.

"By November, I'm painting full-time, year-round," she said. "I want to create several bodies of work so that when I enter competitions I am prepared." She hopes that by the end of 2006 she will have enough paintings "in stock" that she will be able to send some of her work to studios in other parts of the country.

Out of this dream, a gallery arose.

The Britts decided to do away with the usual gift items at the marina, and concentrate on northern Michigan artwork. Kelly has a dream that her customers will be able to purchase spomething that is northern Michigan to take home with them; something, she says, that they will not turn over and find "made in China" stickered to the back

Recently, Kelly opened Whispering Wings Fine Art Gallery at Swan Valley Marina.

The location on M-66 is great, she said, and while most of her gallery customers have until recently been marina customers as well, she hopes the gallery will "catch people" as they drive by, attracting new customers who are not necessarily in need of marina services.

"I want pieces that are hand-made, unique and reminiscent of northern Michigan," she said.

Currently she is talking to other artists, potters, painters and sculptors, all local, who create works with a theme or thread of Michigan.

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

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

And soon, they will be able to come in for a stamp, or to mail a package, or to pick up their mail.

It happened naturally. Customers would come in and ask if the store had package pickup. Package services would come in to ask directions, or to see if they could leave a customer's package at the counter. Sometimes customers would just come in to see if somebody was going to be running into Boyne to go to the post office.

Over the winter the idea of providing postal service took hold and before long it had gathered enough momentum that Bart Stupak's office was called. You don't automatically know who to call when your question is, "Can we get designation as a post office?" Stupak was helpful: eventually the right person was contacted.



bezzlement took place from the end of January, 2005, through May, 2005.

Northern Preferred Title became aware of the thefts when their checks began bouncing and terminated Lockman's employment when it became obvious she had stolen the funds in question. According to Northern Preferred Title, Lockman also altered closing documents to hide her activities.

As the investigation is on-going, and Northern Preferred Title has reported much more money stolen, the total amount of stolen money will likely increase. The police are waiting for documents from additional financial institutions, which have been ordered under search warrants.

The ramifications of this embezzlement has been devastating to Northern Preferred Title and its clients. Several clients had mortgages that were not paid off when they sold their properties, and other clients have not been paid money due them for properties which they have sold. This has resulted in some properties not having a clear title, and several victims have come forward. Northern Preferred Title has been forced to close its doors because of the financial devastation inflicted upon them because of this crime, according to a press release by the Boyne City police department.

The police and prosecutor's offices are also investigating to determine if any other person(s) had knowledge of the thefts, or may have benefitted from the money taken.

Lockman, mother of three, and expecting a fourth child, had used the story that she had received a large inheritance from her parents in February to explain the amount of money she was in possession of. After the preliminary hearing, the case will be bound over to circuit court for pre-trial conferences and scheduling.

He's a shy kid, doesn't do much talking, and can't think of a hero, except Tiger Woods is his favorite golfer and his dad, Arnold Smith, is his favorite person to golf with.

And he's been at it for awhile, too. He started golfing, by his own admission, as soon as he could walk. He wakes up in the morning ready to hit the green. Lately, now that he's six, and old enough, he takes his pullcart and golfs the course by himself, coming in long enough to ask if he can go again.

He used to chip the ball to his dad, who waited with a baseball glove and tossed it back to hit again. Logan's favorite thing is chipping.

He was three when he first cleared the pond with a golf ball; probably 50 yards, his dad estimates. By the time Logan was four, Arnold and his wife Angela were pretty sure they had a talented golfer in the making.

At home, where his folks run the Mallard Golf Course, he plays on a 3,000 yard course, where he can shoot about a 54, Arnold said.

Last week's win in Lansing was his second state championship, and it leads up to his second shot at a world championship in Williamsburg, Va. Last year there were 28 countries represented in the 680 golfers who played at the world championships; 60 players in Logan's age group. He placed 35th. No one was disappointed.

Arnold and Angela agree that the state championship is a little nerve-wracking. If he wins that, he goes to the world championships — if he doesn't, he's just goes home. While this is also true at the world level, it's, well, the world

level. There simply isn't the same kind of expectation, or pressure.

At the hotel room last week, before the state tournament, Logan told his mother he was taking her to Virginia. How? she asked.

"I am going to win, Mom," said Logan, but pressed, he said he didn't know if he'd win. He likes the tournaments partly because they are quiet and he can think. He is used to golfing with the family dog, Bear Dog, for a companion, and his two-year-old sister, Lauren, providing distraction. Asked what he thinks about when he's playing, Logan answered, "Hitting it far."

The world championship is a three-day tournament, where the kids play three nine-hold rounds. The best total score of the three games wins. Logan will still play in the same age group, representing the State of Michigan.

"It's the best of the best," Arnold said. "It's like watching the pros."

Angela said the opening ceremonies impressed her, with fife and drum corps playing. "It gave me chills," she said.

The Smiths are dedicated to Logan's game, but they try to keep the pressure off. They say that they will support him as long as he is interested in playing.

"As long as he stays excited about it. He's our driving force," said Arnold. "It's up to him. As long as he wants to play, we'll take him wherever he wants to go."

In the meantime, Logan is playing in a traveling tournament started by Jeff Haven to encourage young children to get into the sport. He gets to play on a lot of nice courses and meet children his own age who golf.

Logan said that playing on unfamiliar courses is more difficult than playing at the Mallard, but Arnold said it has been good for him, helps prepare him for the state and world tournaments.

What amazes his parents, though, is how focussed the young golfer can stay.

"It's two and a half hours on the course, and they have to keeps their minds on golf," Arnold said. "When a jet goes by, they can't look."

As a parent, he said, you have to keep their head in the game, keep calming them down.

But Logan, Arnold and Angela agree, is focused in most ways. He likes to listen to a

"He doesn't want to be bugged," his dad said. Spending his first six years on a golf course probably has something to do with Logan's game, but probably some of that concentration and focus is just inherent. 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

CRAZY SALLY A SERIOUS CLOWN

ally Pasque of Boyne City remembers what it was like when her own children were small, and the generosity of their school was what kept them in boots during the winter. Neither she nor her children or grandchildren fret too much about having warm clothes or enough food on the table now, but having lived through it makes all the difference for some people.

So when Pasque was working at the high school one day and saw a student who needed shoes, it didn't just tug at her heartstrings - it galvanized her into action.

Pasque — who doesn't mind her nickname, Crazy Sally has been putting on road rallies for her family and friends for years, and she has considerable experience in fund-raising and helping with benefits for other people, so her reaction was a natural response to the needs she

"I woke up one morning and God put in my head I had to help," she said. "I thought I could give something back."

When Pasque lived in Madison Heights, she worked at Madison Community Hospital, and did a lot of fund-raisers there, though her initial role was modest enough.

"I started being a driver, bringing people to rehab," she said. But there was an in-hospital fund-raiser, and Pasque lent a hand by selling her services to deliver "Granny Grams." It was a success, and Granny Grams became a staple fund-raiser — and Pasque became not just the bearer of grams, but a fund-raising dynamo.

So this time around, acting independently, the first thing Pasque did was make it legal with county, state and federal governments. She has started a 501c3, tax-exempt charity organization which she calls Compassionate Heart.

Compassionate Heart will provide services in a variety of ways. She will be available to doctors, schools, churches and dentists. If, for instance, a youngster needs dental work that his or her family is unable to afford, the dentist may call Compassionate Heart and request assistance to cover the costs.

Pasque plans to do two unique fund-raisers a year one in the summer, one in the fall. The money raised will be kept in escrow until a need arises, where it can be

immediately available. Additionally, Pasque has a few people who are willing to provide money on an occasional case-by-case basis, but Pasque hopes that she will be able to raise enough to avoid asking individual donors for

Her first benefit will take place on Friday, July 8, at the Knights of Columbus Hall, and will fit in with the Stroll the Streets event going on downtown.

Teams of four can purchase tickets at \$20 each person, and assemble in costume at the K of C hall at 6:30 p.m., where there will food and door prizes. At 7:30 the clown teams will leave the K of C to go downtown for a clown search.

In the meantime, Scott MacKenzie at the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce, will have been conducting a clown contest for the Friday night Stroll the Street crowd. who are encouraged to dress up as decoy clowns. (The Chamber will be giving out prizes for its top three clown costumes as well.)

In the tradition of Crazy Sally's road rallies, the contestant teams must find ten specific clowns from among the decoys, and get back to the K of C as quickly as pos-

There will be quirks and kinks thrown in along the way.

"It will be a crazy night --- we're going to have fun." Pasque said.

Teams are restricted to adults, as there will be a cash bar at the K of C after the search. Prizes will be awarded the top two clowns, and there will be a 50/50 drawing. After 9:30 p.m., the doors will be open to the public, with a \$5 cover charge.

Mostly, though, it's about making memories while helping someone. Pasque said that 100 percent of the proceeds will go to help people in need.

Volunteers are needed, before and during the event, and people not wishing to form a team are encouraged to clown around at the Stroll the Streets event.

Horton Bay prepares for commencement

Horton Bay seems to possess a community-wide sense of humor that borders on the irreverent - when it doesn't cross right on over. It's humor may be grounded in something quite serious, however: a basic philosophy that the celebration of the freedom of the nation should not be defined by commercialism and politics.

"No commercial entries is what distinguishes this parade," said John Rohe, spokesperson for the annual Horton Bay Fourth of July event. "We don't want to celebrate this nation's birth with a string of billboards that teach us how to be better consumers."

Rohe thinks the Horton Bay parade is rather a demonstration of the resourcefulness and ingenuity of its participants, though he admits finding

those participants might be a little more difficult under the circumstances

"We welcome entries, (but) without commercial incentives, we have to shake the bushes a little harder." he said, estimating that the current roster of entrants is somewhere under a million.

The Horton Bay Parade also distinguishes itself with an unusual theme. This year's parade will celebrate the "Commencement Ceremony of L'Universite de Bay Horton," an auspicious institution of higher learning fondly abbreviated to UdBH, or "Uh-Dah-Bah." Virtually anyone can receive a diploma. and the parade will reflect the general level of that accomplishment.

As in previous years, the Horton Bay parade will be brought up by the singing of the Fat Lady, which, as we all know, indicates the end of something. This year it is the end, not just of the parade, but of this particular Fat Lady's

A spokesperson for the Fat Lady, Horton Bay's G.T. Long, said that she was unavailable for comment, as she is currently working at finding a replacement. Five Fat Ladies-in-training are waking at 5 a.m. for Tai Chi (difficult, Long said, due to their weight), before they work on marching steps and child/ dog maneuvers.

When questioned about the vocal deficiency of previous Fat Ladies, Long bristled, stating that for the last five years the Fat Lady has been under strict contract with Horton Bay in order to prevent her going on the opera circuit. He cited unmatched vocal skills and passionate lyrics as the defining characteristics of the Fat Lady.

A new Fat Lady will be chosen this year and her installation with the Horton Bay parade will be recognized with a puff of white smoke.

"This represents five or six thousand years of Fat Lady tradition," Long said. "Even the Catholic church has borrowed this tradition." He added that it has not been seen in the modern era in Horton Bay because there has been no need to choose a new Fat Lady for some years.

The parade will begin promptly at I p.m. on the Fourth, rain or shine, "sleet, pestilence, famine ... everyday household pests" notwithstanding.

Entrants are encouraged to arrive early, and submit entry applications no later than July 1.
